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

Mr. Chairman, Lady and Gentlemen,

I beg to submit my Annual Report for the year 1965, the contents and arrangements of which are in accordance with the regulations of the Ministry of Health.

During the year 94 cases of Infectious Disease were notified and of these Measles accounted for 90. It is worth noting that there was only one new case of Respiratory Tuberculosis within the Urban District and one of the Non-Respiratory form.

There were 155 deaths in the district. Once again diseases of the heart and circulation accounted for the majority of these while deaths from cancer showed a slight increase.

I would like, in conclusion, to thank the Heads of Departments for their co-operation at all times. I am especially grateful to Mr. Pallister, Surveyor and Public Health Inspector, and to Mr. Ward, Additional Public Health Inspector for their help in all matters concerning the health of the District. Finally I wish to acknowledge the great help and hard work of Mr. Nuttall and Miss Fox in the District Health Office.

The General Provision of Health Services in the District

1. Laboratory Facilities

This work is now done at the Public Health Laboratory, Middlesbrough, only the biological test for tuberculous milk being carried out at the Public Health Laboratory, Northallerton.

2. National Health Service Act, 1946

With certain exceptions the Guisborough Area Health Sub-Committee of the Health Committee of the County Council exercises the functions of the Local Health Authority in supervising the day to day administration of the services provided under this Act. The Committee met every two months. It is composed of members of the County Council, of the three District Councils of Guisborough, Skelton and Brotton, and Loftus, and of certain co-opted members. Among the services administered are the following:—

3. Prevention of Illness-Care and After-Care

The work previously carried out under this heading by the Voluntary Care Committee is now being undertaken by the Guisborough Area Health Sub-Committee. 4. National Assistance Acts, 1948 and 1951 - Section 47.

It has been possible to avoid advising the Local Sanitary Authorities to have recourse to the procedure laid down in these Acts.

SECTION II

Water Supplies

With the exception of some outlying farms, water is supplied by the Tees Valley and Cleveland Water Board. The supply to the area throughout the year has been of satisfactory quantity and bacteriological purity.

Inspection and Supervision of Food

Ice Cream

Under Section 16 of the Food and Drugs Act, 1955, all premises used for the manufacture, sale and storage of ice cream have to be registered by the Local Authority. The number registered for the storage and sale of pre-packed ice cream is 46. There is one cold mix ice cream manufacturer in the district. Regular routine inspections have been carried out during the year.

Food Poisoning

No outbreak of food poisoning has been notified during the year.

Bakehouses

There are two bakehouses in the district. 8 inspections and visits were made and no defects found.

Fish and Chip Shops

There are seven fish frying premises in the district. These were inspected on fourteen occasions.

Food Hygiene Regulations, 1955

Regular inspections have been carried out during the year and informal action was taken on several occasion, the requirements asked for being provided.

Food Retail Premises

6 premises are licensed under Section 16 of the Food and Drugs Act, 1955, for the manufacture of sausages, brawn, pies, etc. 85 visits of inspection were made during the year and 319 tins of various foodstuffs weighing approximately $495\frac{1}{4}$ lbs. were voluntarily surrendered as unfit for human consumption.

Meat Inspection

100% inspection of all animals slaughtered for human consumption has been carried during the year and for this purpose 699 visits were made. 575_4^3 lbs. of meat and offal were condemned as being diseased or otherwise unfit for human consumption and the whole of this amount was voluntarily surrendered.

Drainage and Sewerage

With the exception of outlying farms and villages, the District is served by public sewers discharging into various sewage disposal works, with the sewers of the Wilton parish discharging into the sewers of Eston Urban District Council.

Normal extensions to the sewerage system in the District have taken place in connection with private house development.

The extension of Guisborough sewage disposal works, including the diversion and renewal of various sewers, has been satisfactorily completed.

No further progress has been made with the sewerage of Yearby Village.

The Council's consulting engineers have been instructed to prepare a new scheme of sewage disposal for the village of Newton-under-Roseberry, tenders have how been accepted and work is to commence early in 1966.

Closet Accommodation

1 sanitary pan closet was converted to a water closet.

The whole of Guisborough is now on the water carriage system.

Several properties in Yearby Village still require conversion, the work being delayed owing to the lack of adequate sewage disposal facilities.

80 water closets were provided for new buildings in Guisborough during the year.

Public Cleansing (Refuse and Disposal)

A weekly collection of house and trade refuse is maintained throughout the District. Refuse is disposed of by means of controlled tipping.

Smoke Control/Clean Air

No complaints of smoke nuisance were received during the year.

ATMOSPHERIC POLLUTION TESTS

Prevention of Damage by Pests Act, 1949-Rodent Control

During the year the Council's sewers were treated twice in accordance with the technique recommended by the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food. Routine surveys have been carried out in connection with farms, business premises, dwelling-houses, etc. and at the year end 34 houses, and 4 other premises, including business premises, had been treated. The poison used has been 'Warfarin' which gives good results and is used to deal with almost every infestation.

There are 2 licensed sites. These were inspected on 3 occasions.

Shops Act, 1950

81 visits were paid under the above Act. One unsatisfactory condition was found; this was remedied by informal action.
