I think I have had a fairly good test as I am still

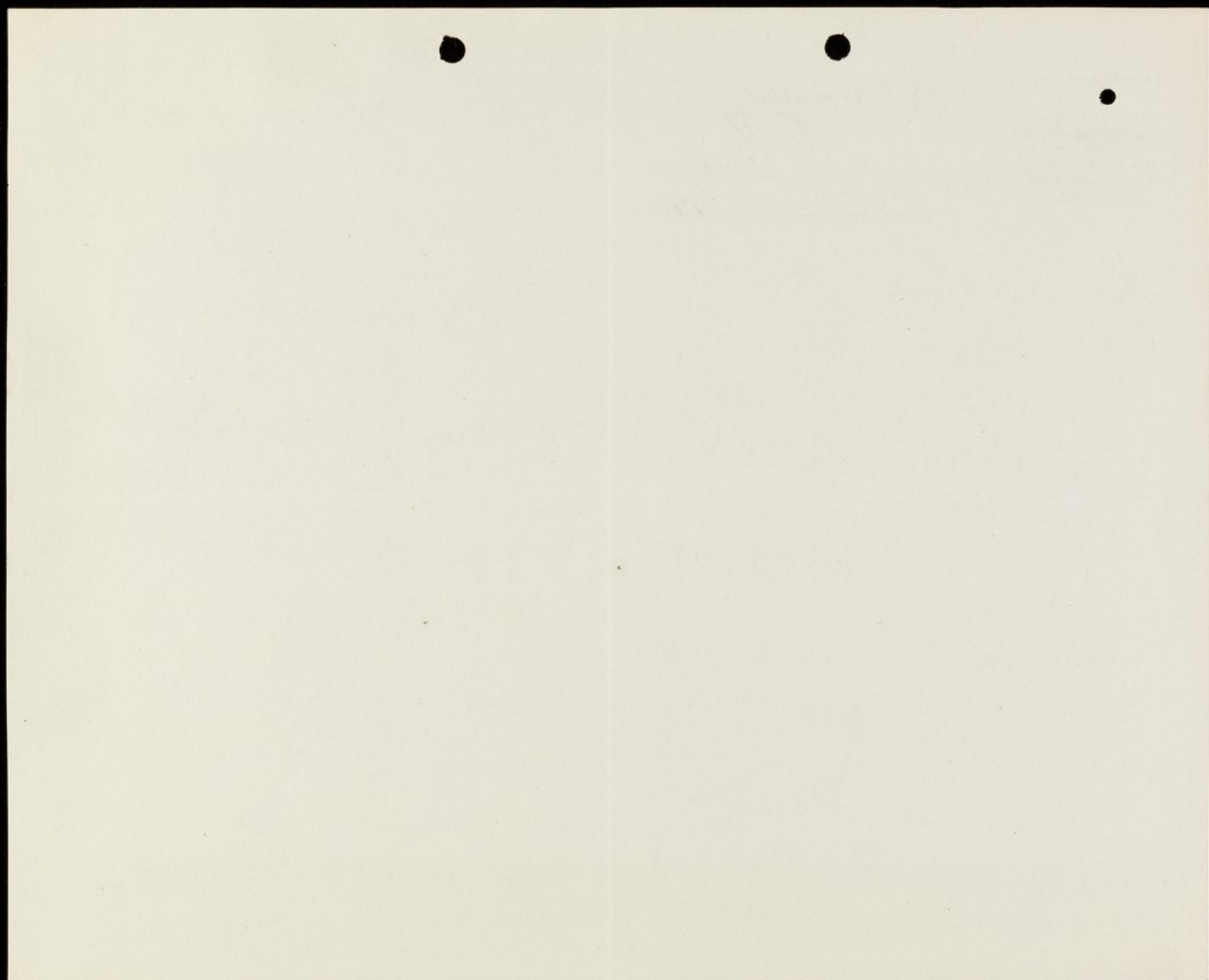
managing the wine business, pending the sale thereof.

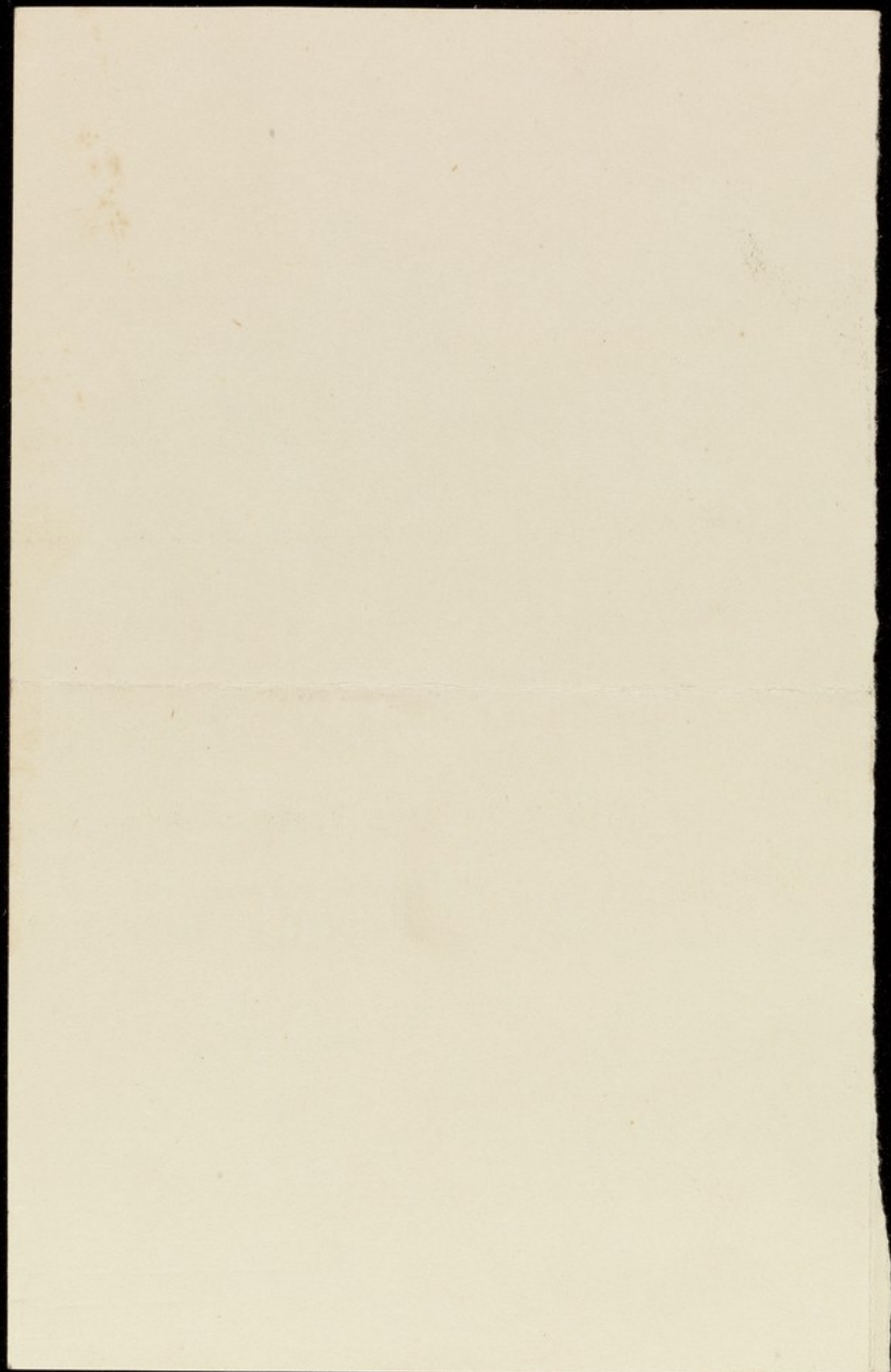

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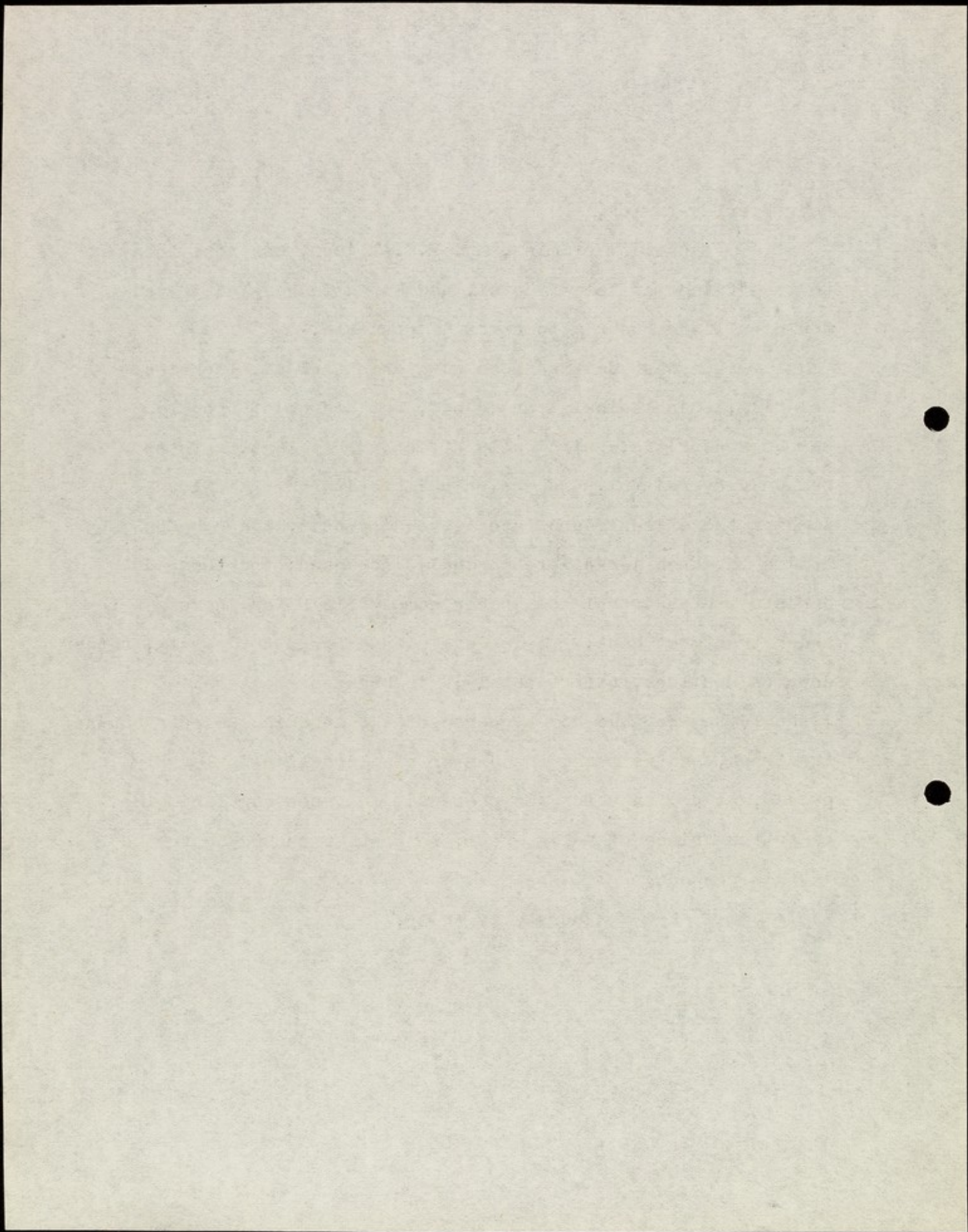

Dear Everley Taylor,

A patient of mine, Mr. J.S.Allison, has gone today to the "Prince of Wales" Hotel, and he would be glad if you would call and see him tomorrow if possible.

He was admitted here with an attack of alcoholic delirium, which quickly passed off, but his chief trouble has been neuritis, principally affecting his legs. These remain very painful, and are only improving very slowly. I think there is no doubt about the diagnosis, although for a time the knee jerks were markedly increased; and there is a history of a troublesome ulcer some while before he came under treatment here. He is a pleasant man to do with, rather down on his luck, unfortunately, in business matters. I should say we gave him a course of the atropine and strychnine treatment, and we think the danger of alcoholism is largely passed, at any rate for the present. I encouraged him to go to the Prince of Wales Hotel, so that he should be tested in this respect.

Dear Sir,

In reply to your enquiry, I may say that Mr. J.S. Allison was discharged "recovered" mentally shortly before Christmas, and he remains thoroughly sound in mind. There is no reason why he should not attend to business so far as his mental condition is concerned.

Unfortunately the neuritis is still troublesome, and he cannot walk very far. He has a good deal of pain, and I do not think it would be prudent for him to attempt to conduct business continuously at the present time. There is, however, no reason why he should not return to Louth within the time you mention, and undertake the purchase of seeds when this becomes necessary, but I have suggested to him that it would be better for him to arrange his business so that after attending to it he shall be able to go away to some boarding house or hydropathic institution within easy reach of Louth. I fully expect that an arrangement by means of which he only attends to business for a part of the time in the first place would be satisfactory and not interfere with his ultimate recovery.

I may add that he fully understands the necessity for his remaining a total abstainer from alcoholic beverages,



and his general attitude on this subject is so reasonable  
that it promises well for the future.

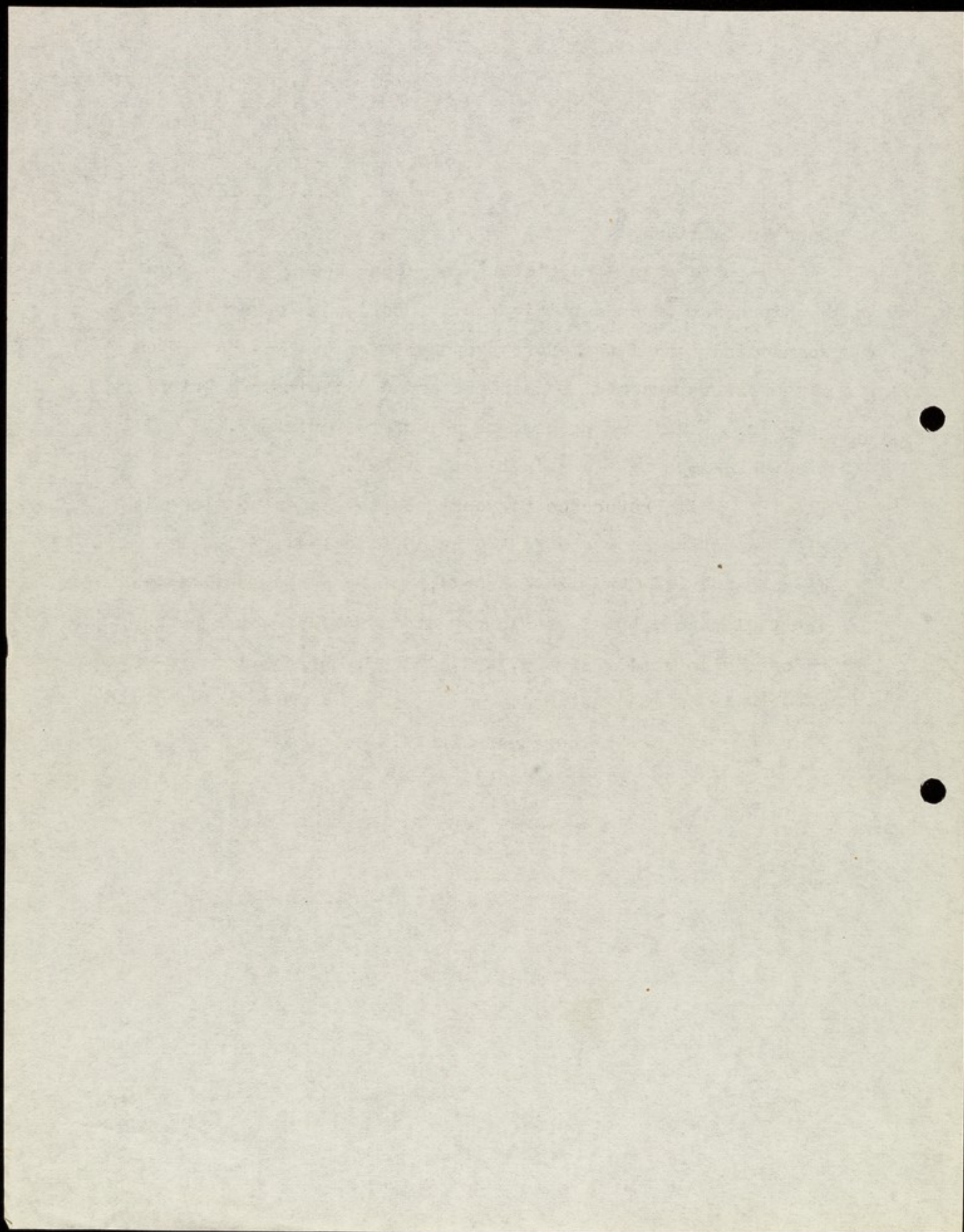
Dear Mr. Allison,

We think the time has now come when your son must be discharged from certificates. He is no longer of unsound mind, and I therefore propose to remove his name from our books as a certified patient and admit him as a Voluntary Boarder. This we propose to do before Christmas. It will make no change whatever in his treatment.

With reference to your question as to how long it will be before he recovers the use of his legs, I really cannot say. They are improved, and he can walk already a short distance, but I should expect it will be some months before he is really strong, and, indeed, the complete recovery may be long delayed.

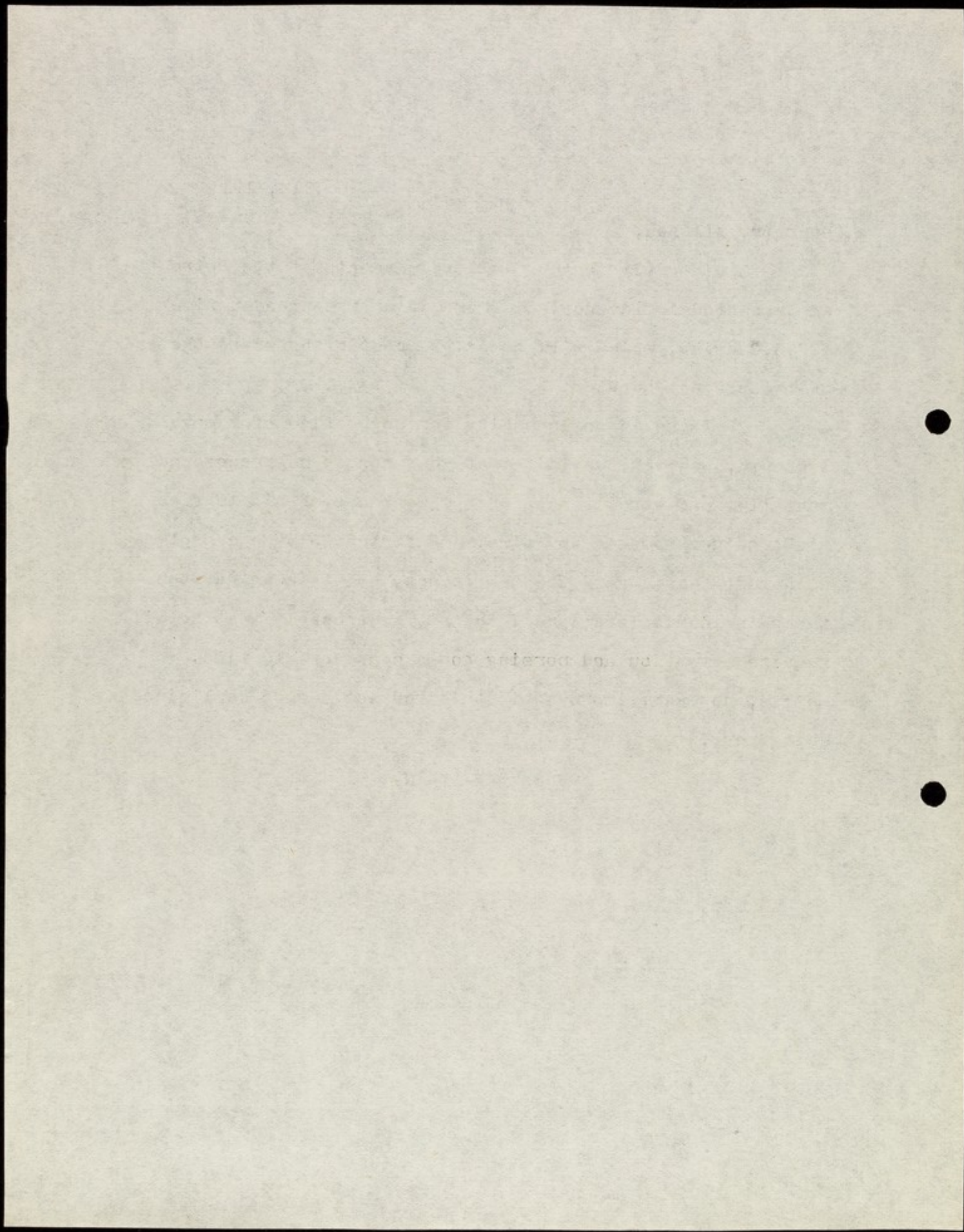
Dear Mr. Allison,

In reply to your letter, payments at the Retreat are expected in advance. There is at the present time £27.6.0 owing, which will cover the cost of board to the end of the present quarter.

There is no necessity for any notice of removal. I should, however, explain that your son is now recovered mentally, and were it not for the weakness of his legs he might return home at any time. Unfortunately he cannot walk more than a very short distance, and this aggravates the pain in his legs; and I fear it is probable that he will require attention and nursing for a considerable time. He has, however, improved in this respect a good deal since being here.

Dear Mr. Allison,

I am pleased to say that your son is now quite clear mentally, and the course of treatment I suggested is now nearly completed. He seems fully to understand the gravity of his recent illness and to be wishful to abstain entirely from alcoholic liquors in future.

He quite understands that his position as regards the business is one of great difficulty. He tells me that he would be quite willing that the Wine and Spirit part of the business should be closed down, as he realises that, under the circumstances, he ought not to have any tasting to do.

The condition of his legs is less satisfactory. He still suffers a great deal of pain, and he can only walk a very short distance. Nervous troubles of this kind are very tedious, and I can give you little or no idea as to how he will go on. At the best I fear it will be months before he will be able to get about well.

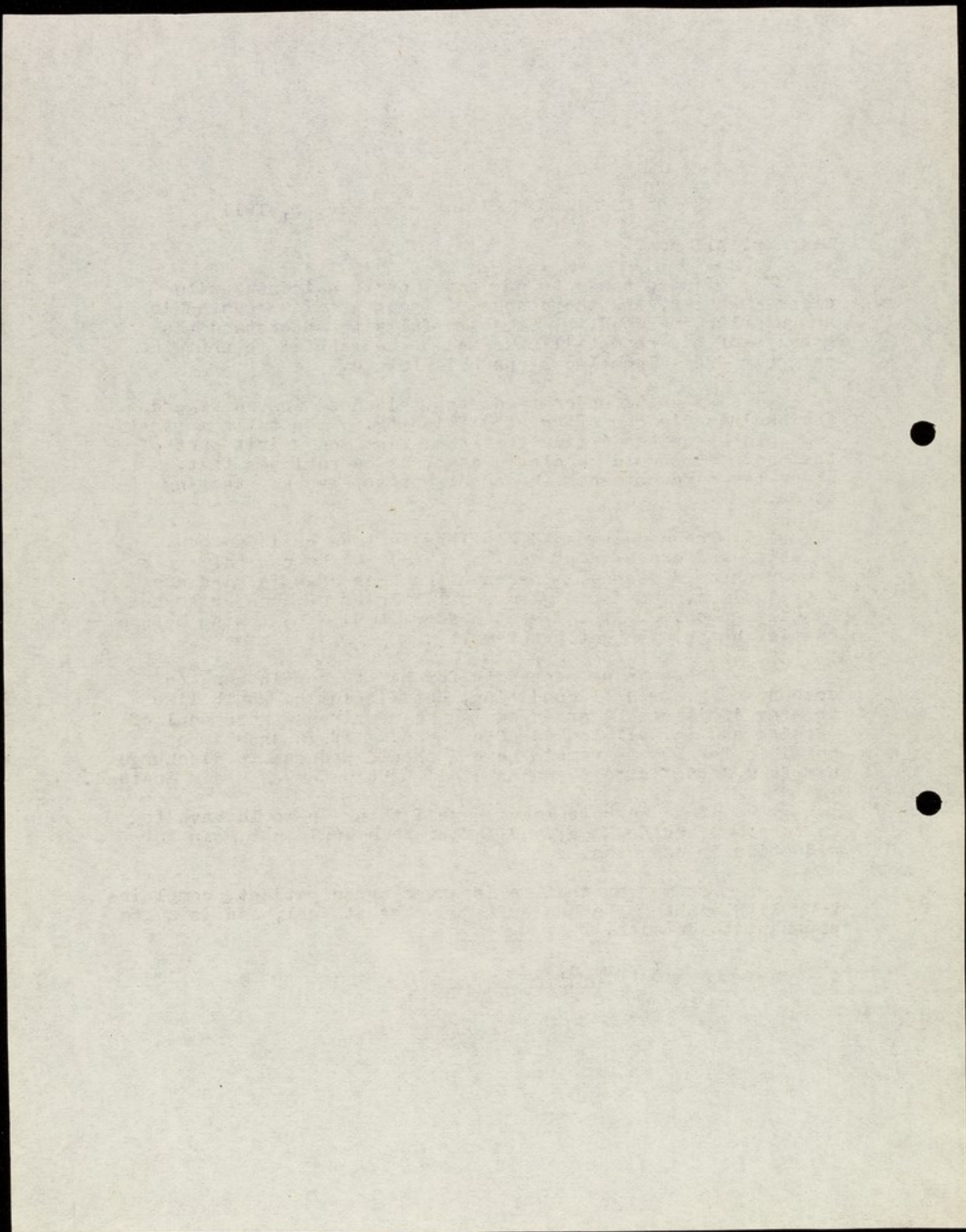
There is no necessity for him to remain here on account of his mental condition, but I think he would like to stay if it can be arranged, as he requires a good deal of nursing and is well looked after here. If it should be possible for him to remain here I should propose to discharge him from Certificates, and make him a Voluntary Boarder instead.

If he were to leave here I think he would have to go to some Nursing Home, and I fear this would not mean any reduction in expenses.

Let me say that he is a very good patient, complains very little though he has suffered a great deal, and is quite pleasant to do with.

Dear Mr. Allison,

I am able to give a fairly satisfactory report of your son. I have had a plain talk with him, and he tells me that he really did not know that the neuritis was due to alcoholic intemperance until he went to Harrogate. He admits taking for some time, more than was wise, habitually, but says that he was never the worse for drink.

He is quite willing to remain here of his own free will, in order to undergo a course of treatment; and we are now regularly giving him systematic treatment with Atropine and Strychnine. It will take six weeks before this is complete, and though I do not feel free to say much as to how he will be at the end of this time, I think it extremely probable that he will be well enough to leave here; and very possibly another six weeks after that he might go away to some Hydropathic to re-establish his health further.

He is very wishful to see his brother, as he thinks he can explain matters respecting his business, and help to keep things together. I see no reason why his brother should not come.

I should add that he is gaining strength, and we do not think the neuritis is quite as bad as it was, though his legs are often very painful and interfere with his sleep.

## YORK RETREAT HOSPITAL FOR THE INSANE.

In consideration of the Directors of the York Retreat Hospital for the Insane agreeing to receive John Sidney Allison of 59 Westgate, Louth,  
Lincolnshire as a patient in the said Hospital, I HEREBY UNDERTAKE  
AND AGREE with Richard Thompson  
of Dringcote, The Mount, York the Treasurer of the said Hospital, to pay or  
cause to be paid, to the said Richard Thompson  
as such Treasurer, or to the Treasurer for the time being of the said Hospital, all such Sum or  
Sums of Money as shall from time to time be or become due and payable for the Lodging,  
Maintenance, and care of the said patient in the said Hospital, or whilst under the charge of the  
Authorities of the said Hospital, and all such Sum or Sums of Money as shall be paid or disbursed  
by or on behalf of the said Institution for any articles of Wearing Apparel, or other necessities, or  
extras supplied to, or provided for the said Patient, or the repairing or mending and washing of  
the articles of Wearing Apparel of the said Patient, so long as the said Patient shall continue in  
the said Hospital, or be under the charge of the Authorities of the said Hospital, and also to pay  
or cause to be paid the expenses in respect of the Funeral of the said Patient, in case the said  
Patient shall die in the said Hospital, or whilst under the charge of the Authorities of the said  
Hospital. AND I FURTHER AGREE to pay Interest at the rate of five per cent. per annum on any  
accounts due from me as above, which shall not have been discharged within Twenty-eight days  
from the receipt of such account from the Treasurer, Secretary, or Clerk of the said Hospital.  
AND I ALSO UNDERTAKE AND AGREE, at my own expense, to remove the said Patient from the  
said Hospital within Fourteen days after receiving Notice in writing from the Treasurer, Secretary
