It is a pleasure to get your letter and hear you are so well. It must have been a very happy Christmas once more to be with your own people.

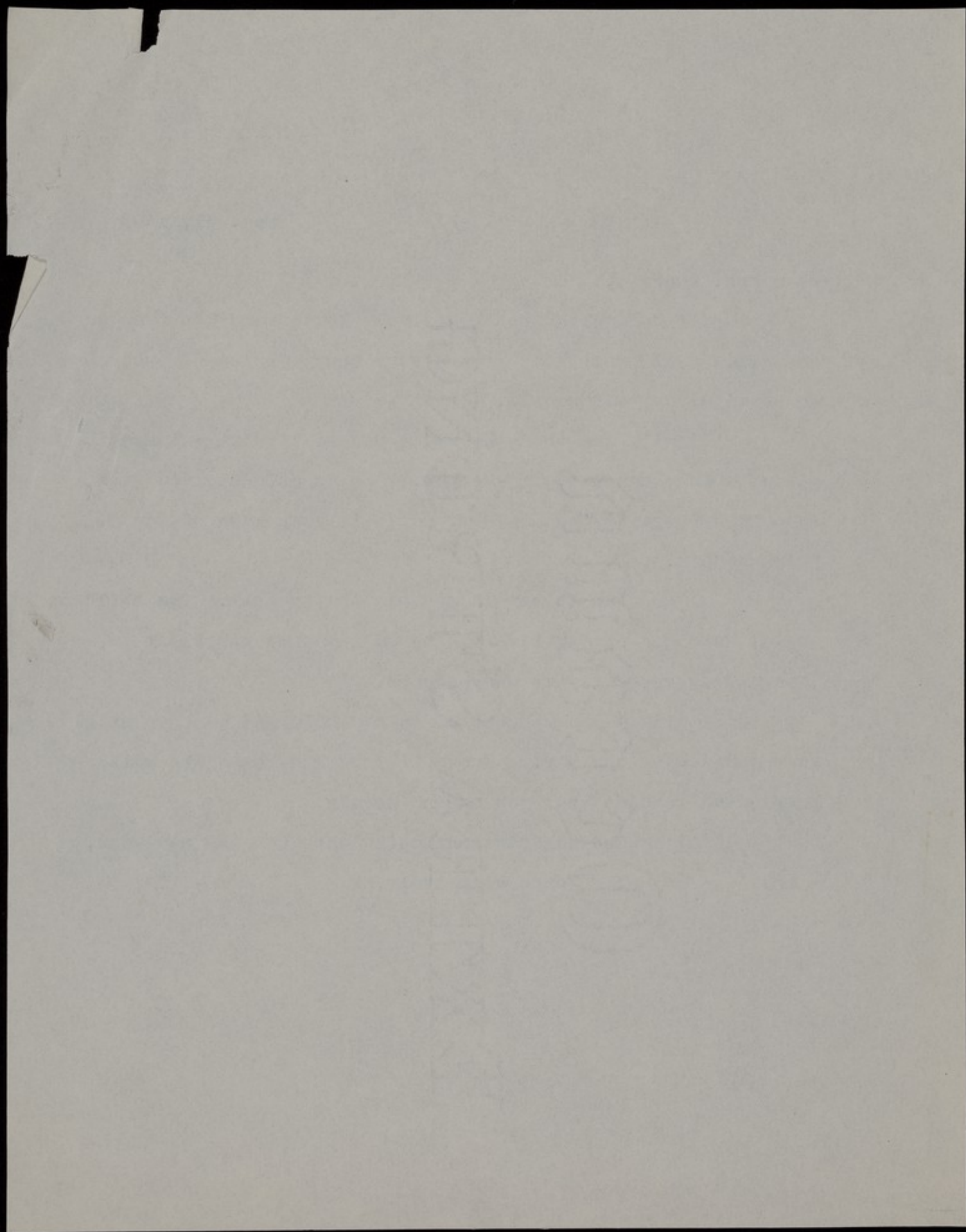
I will see that the cuffs you so kindly sent are given to Longhorn the gate-keeper. He is off duty today or I would have given them to him. It is very kind of you to think of him.

I am pleased to say
that Mrs Andrew is
now getting on very well.
She was rather unsettled
for a week or two, but

this has passed off, and she has ^{now} settled down very satisfactorily, and is getting on quietly and happily.

Beyond a tendency ^{to} worry over small things, (which I think we may put down as constitutional) the mental state seems perfectly normal.

There has not been the slightest trace of any suicidal tendency since she returned, and I think the delusions have gone.

I quite agree with you that she might be certified as recovered.

With regards to her physical

health, this continues good on the whole. She does not complain so much of the noise of the car, and is sleeping fairly well. She does not seem to have quite so much energy for walking, &c, and becomes tired sooner; but is getting on every day for walking. Her iron is still down, and is working after her very well.

Mother often talks of the time she spent in the Retreat and of the great kindness of every one to her. We are indeed all most grateful, and most thankful that the means used have been blessed with her restoration. With kind regards,

YORK RETREAT HOSPITAL FOR THE INSANE.

In consideration of the Directors of the York Retreat Hospital for the Insane agreeing to receive Mary Hannah Andrews of Burky Wood Dore in the County of Derby as a patient in the said Hospital, I HEREBY UNDERTAKE AND AGREE with Richard Thompson of Derby the Treasurer of the said Hospital, to pay or cause to be paid, to the said Richard Thompson as such Treasurer, or to the Treasurer for the time being of the said Hospital, all such Sum or Sums of Money as shall from time to time be or become due and payable for the Lodging, Maintenance, and care of the said patient in the said Hospital, or whilst under the charge of the Authorities of the said Hospital, and all such Sum or Sums of Money as shall be paid or disbursed by or on behalf of the said Institution for any articles of Wearing Apparel, or other necessities, or extras supplied to, or provided for the said Patient, or the repairing or mending and washing of the articles of Wearing Apparel of the said Patient, so long as the said Patient shall continue in the said Hospital, or be under the charge of the Authorities of the said Hospital, and also to pay or cause to be paid the expenses in respect of the Funeral of the said Patient, in case the said Patient shall die in the said Hospital, or whilst under the charge of the Authorities of the said Hospital. AND I FURTHER AGREE to pay Interest at the rate of five per cent. per annum on any accounts due from me as above, which shall not have been discharged within Twenty-eight days from the receipt of such account from the Treasurer, Secretary, or Clerk of the said Hospital. AND I ALSO UNDERTAKE AND AGREE, at my own expense, to remove the said Patient from the said Hospital within Fourteen days after receiving Notice in writing from the Treasurer, Secretary or Clerk for the time being of the said Hospital, requiring such removal.

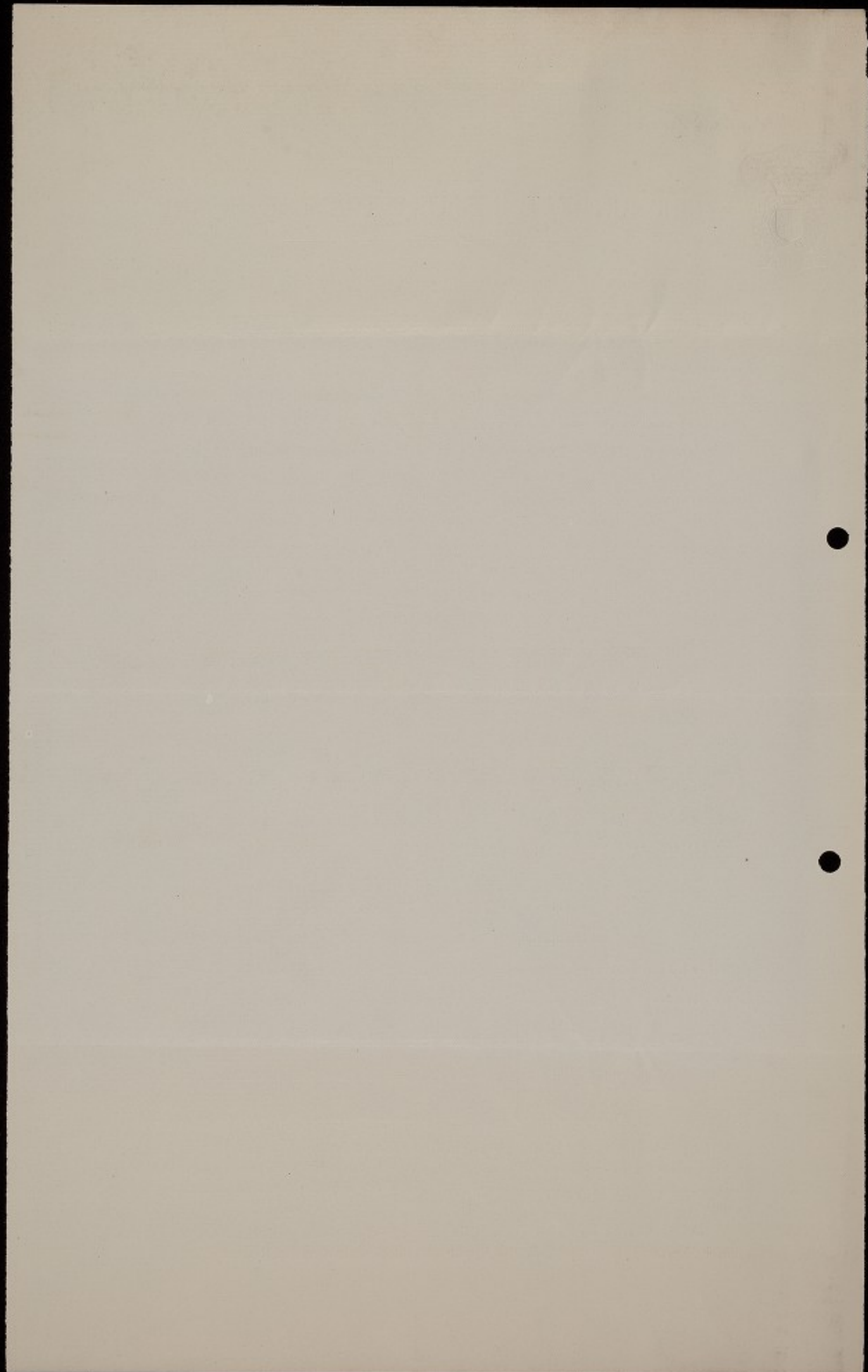
