possibly continue to pay so much. —

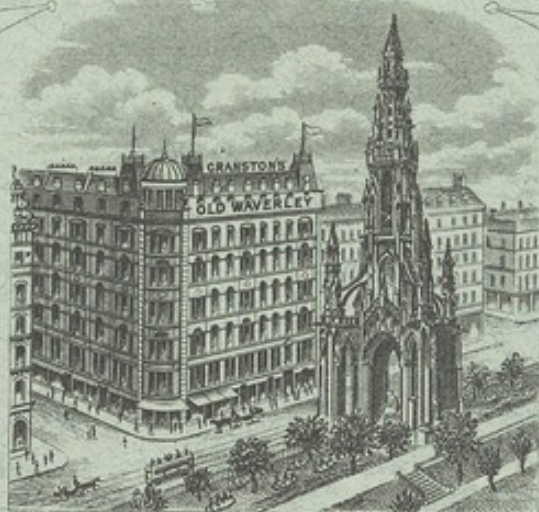
As to the Apr;—please ask Secretary to send me the

Re item 2/. for Xmas Cards, surely Alick did
not send any. no letters have reached me or
his Uncle; & you know our wishes as to his not
corresponding with anyone: please enquire into
this, & let me know. — If you will run through the
Sundries, you will see several are quite unnecessary: &
perhaps by the 1/2 ream (about 2/6) would be the cheapest way
to buy it, as Alick uses so much. — Hoping you will soon be
