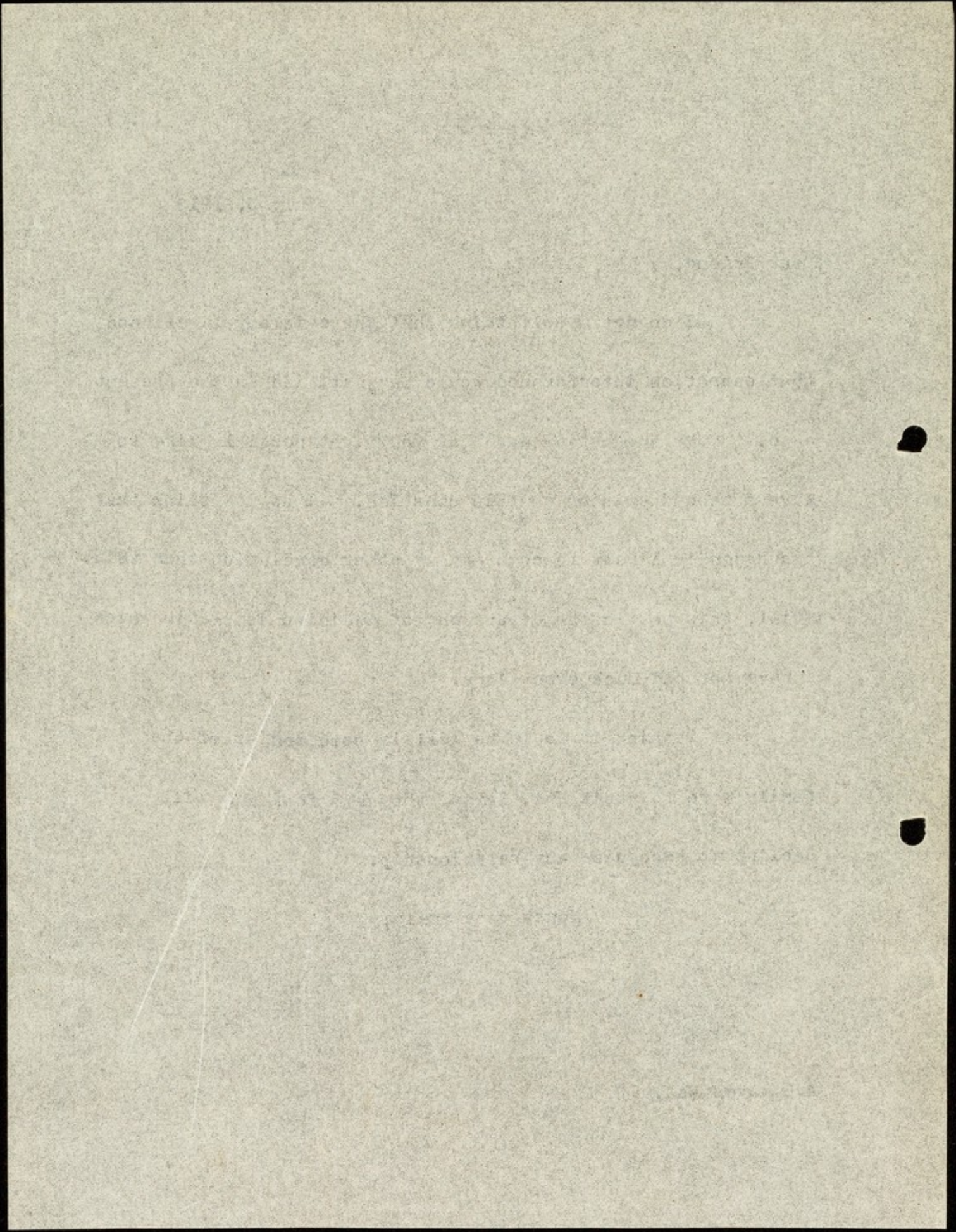
Dear Friend,

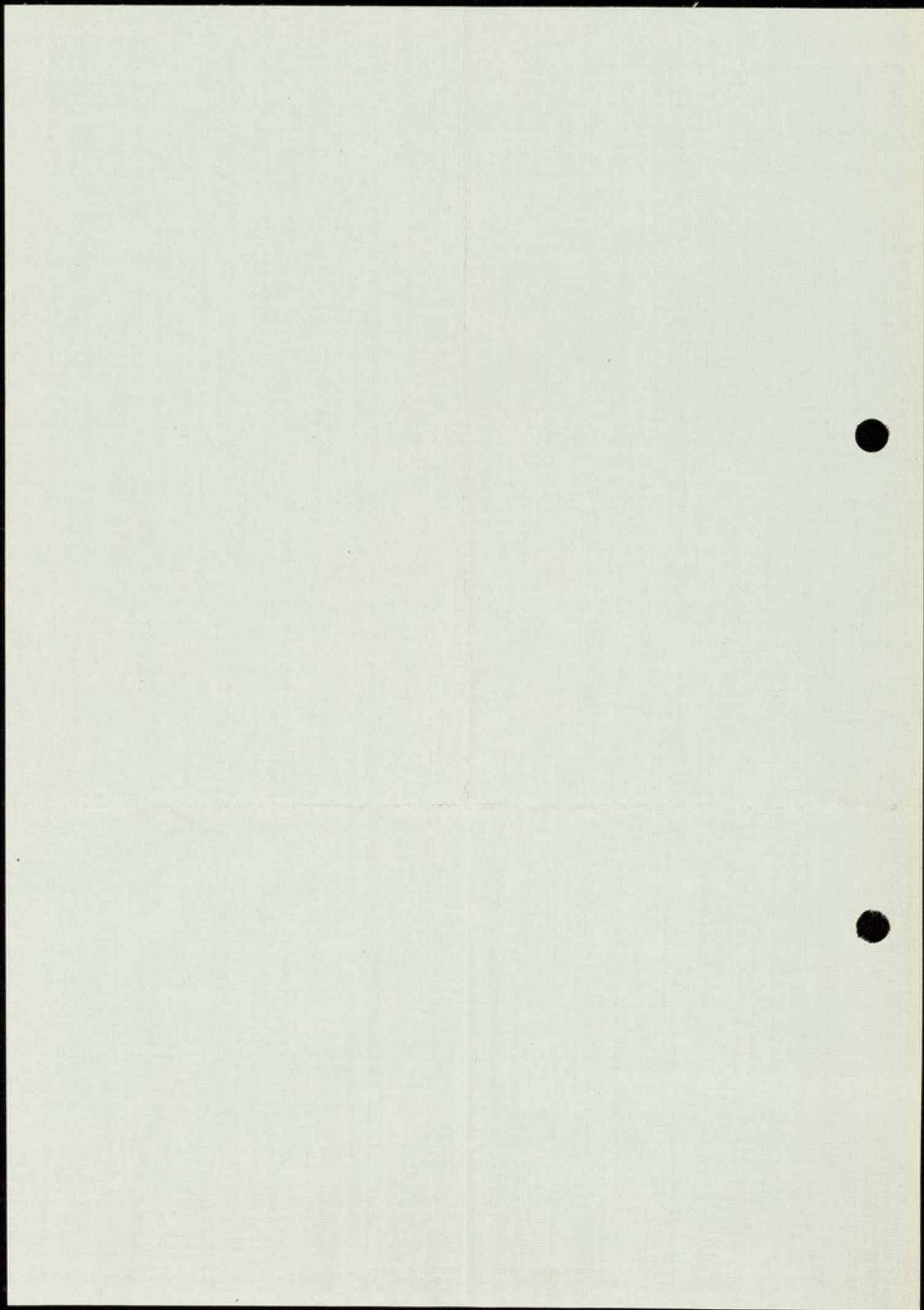

Dear Friend,

Thanks for your letter of advice as to meeting of Committee of Retreat to consider grants from Endowment Fund.

It would be a great relief if the Committee felt ours to be a proper case for relief. As you know Brighouse M. M. help us already with payment of half the weekly charges. This leaves the family with a charge of 6p weekly and the extras.

Father has a small income purchased by Friends in Brighouse M. M. which is helped up by an Old Age Pension under the Act. He is not able to contribute.

There are four of us. I am a working journalist with five children, one only of whom is bringing anything in. My brother is a chemist in business at Ferry Stratford with 3 young children and he finds it difficult to meet the quarterly payments.

My elder sister keeps house for father and is struggling with a most unsatisfactory sweet shop on the outskirts of Bradford, my younger sister is "companion" in a Friends' family at Budgewater and she regularly sends half the "extras." My brother and I share the regular weekly charges and I pay the other half of the extras.

We have kept up our payments as well as we could and I got some arrears cleared off a week or two ago. The necessity of these payments is a strain but I must leave it with the Committee to consider whether there are other families in worse case than we are. So far as I can reckon it we must have been contributing for twelve years.

In the event of a grant being made it would, I take it, be proper to report the matter to the consideration of the Committee of Brighouse M. M. Yours faithfully
