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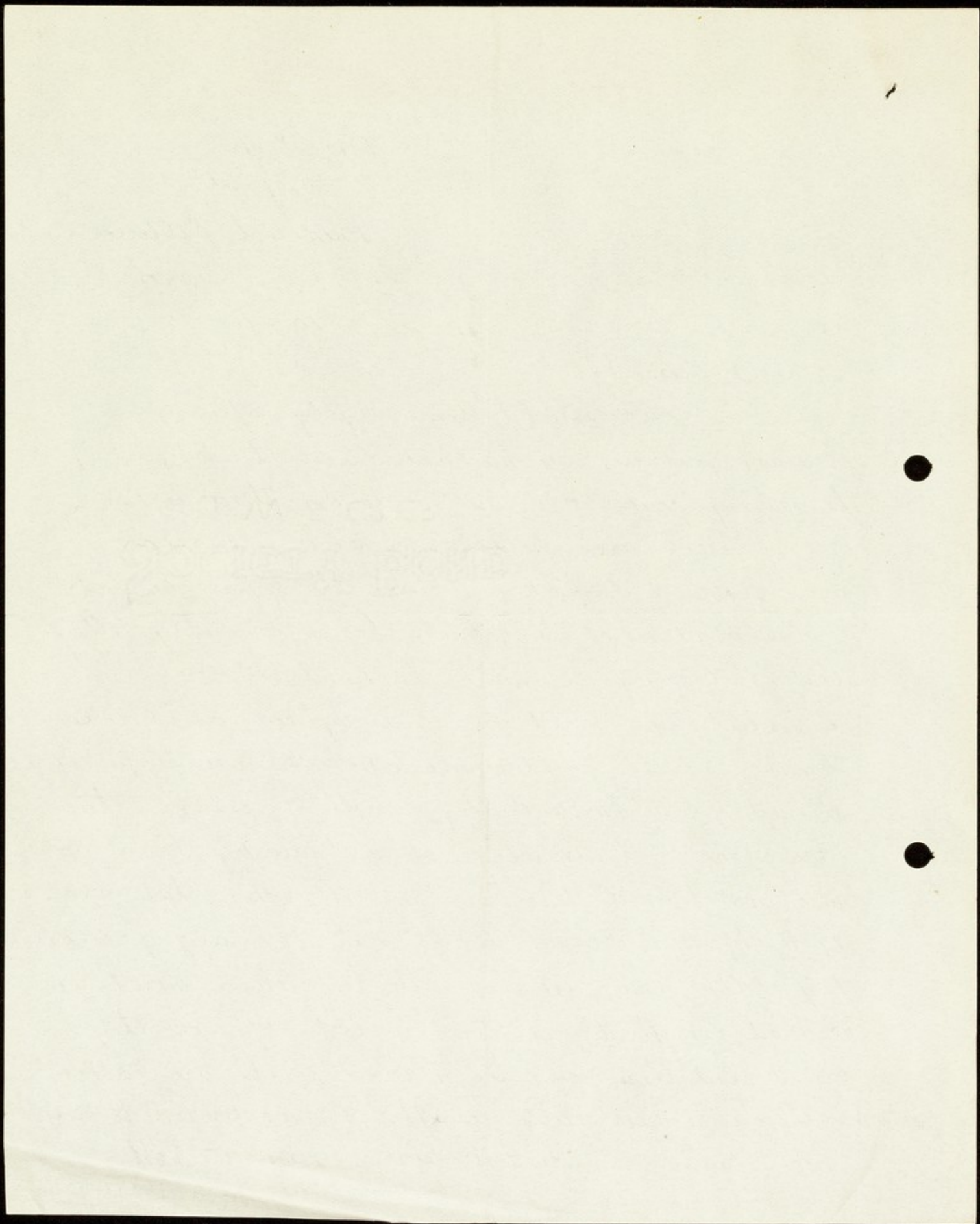

Dear Dr. Pierce,

Dr. de Beauvais, about whom you write, is rather an unusual case of General Paralysis. I have had him under observation since January, 1911, when he had all the physical signs of early G.P.I., including marked lymphocytosis of the cerebro-spinal fluid, amounting to 53 per c. mm. in January, 1911, and rising to 82 per c. mm. in July, 1911. In 1913 the number of cells fell to 56.3, and on June 2nd of the present year they had fallen to 5.1. His speech has been tremulous throughout, and he has had very slightly progressive mental enfeeblement. In the end of 1910, he had slight right-sided hemiplegic attacks with transient aphasia.

His treatment has consisted mainly in urotropin grs. 30 daily. The case is interesting in view of its long duration - over 4½ years since the diagnosis was first established. He is materially ^{only} very slightly worse after this long period, and his cerebro-spinal fluid has actually improved.
