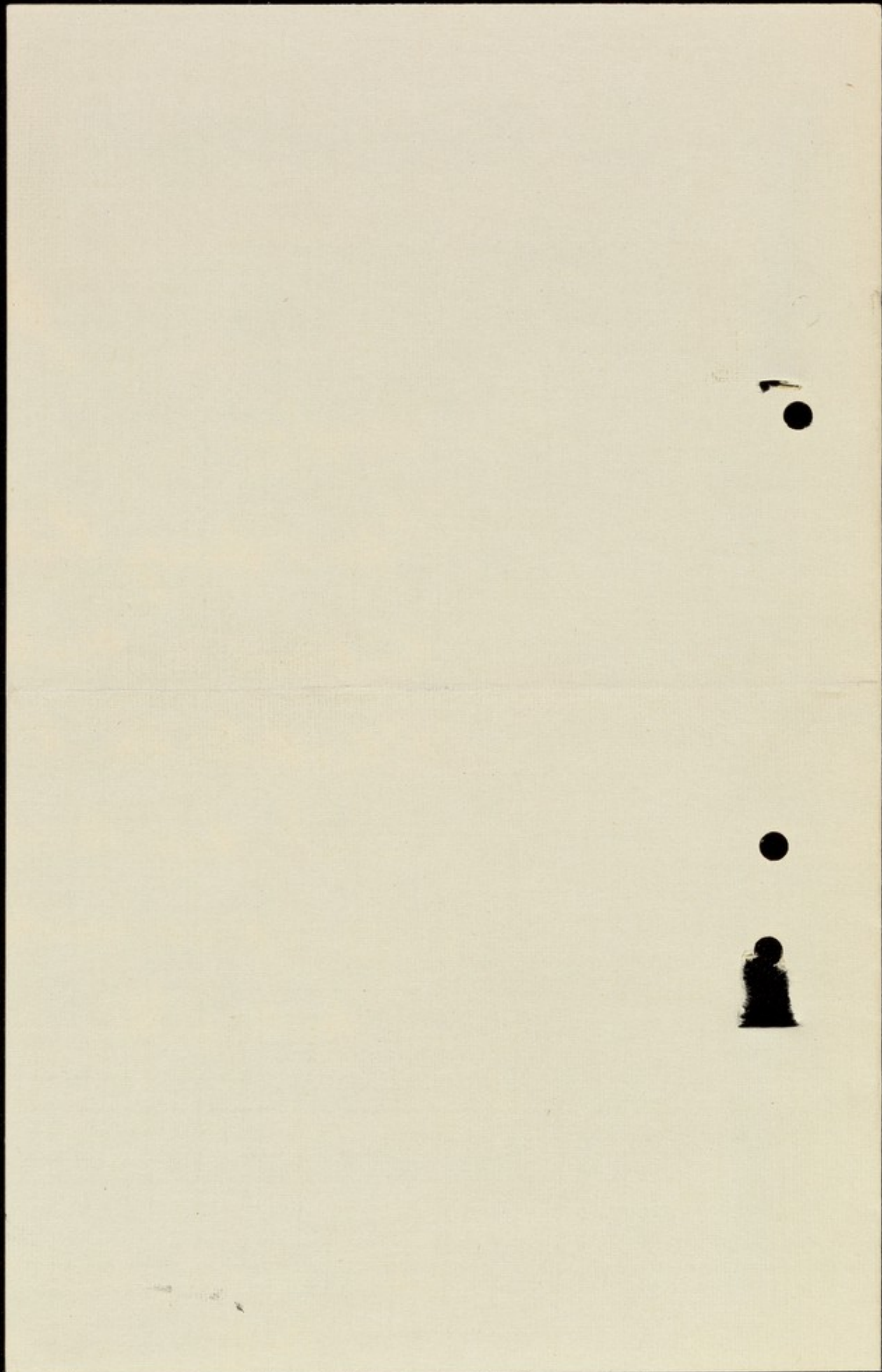

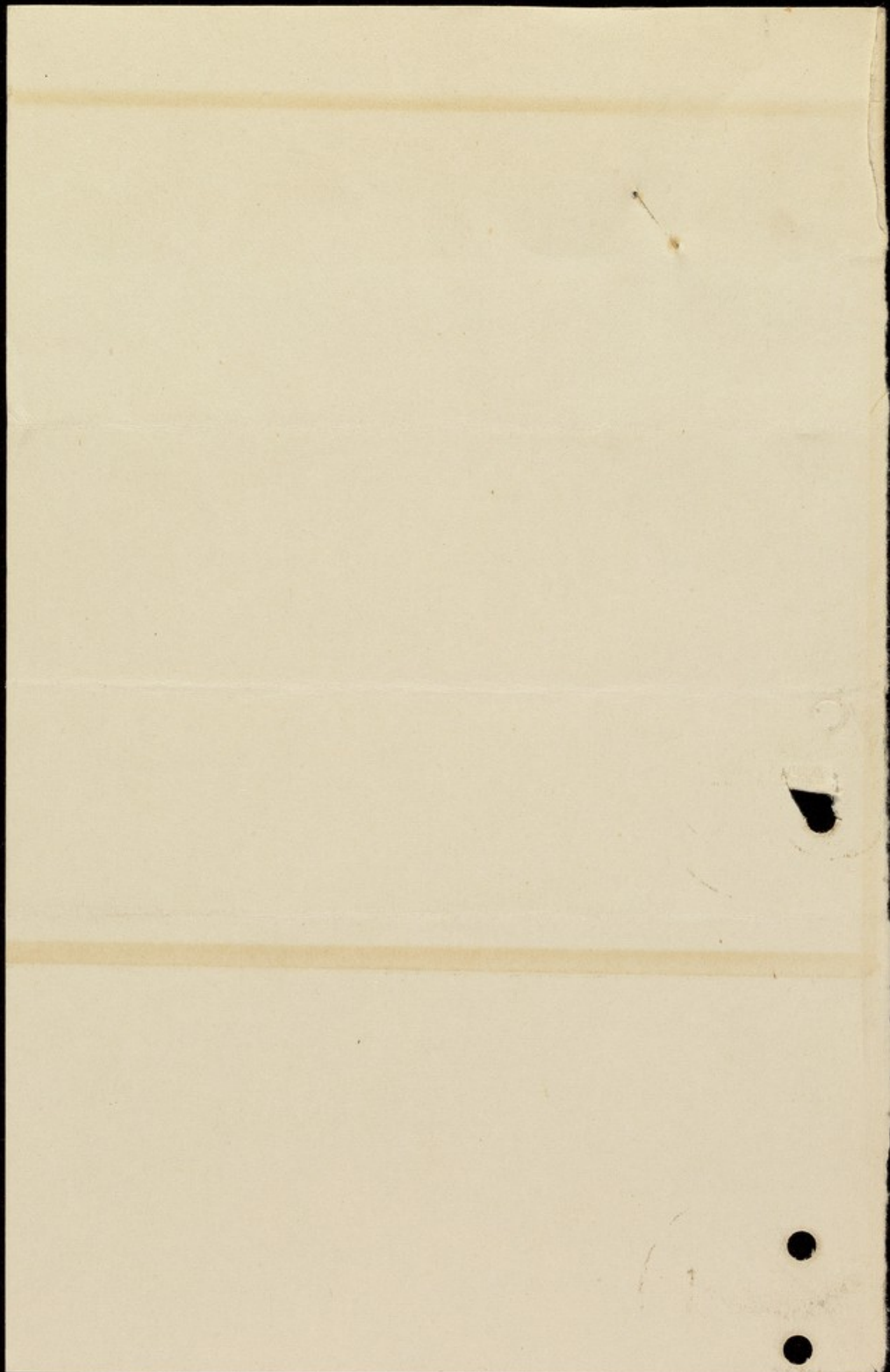

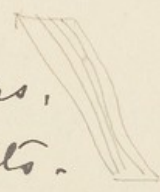

w^o be refunded in the event of Miss Blacklock
leaving (as she was free to do) before the expi-
ration of the 4 weeks. I have of receipt
for 12 guineas - You say in of. letter that
of. Committee have recently fixed my daughter's
terms at £3.10 - weekly, & you enclose an ac-
count apparently made out for that amount
from Apr^l 25th to the month for wh^{ch} I have already
paid - of. Committee also have no excuse

in fixing any charge without first con-
sulting me & ascertaining that I was
willing to pay it - It is obvious that a
Success might have been decided upon wth was

On arriving at York, an official from the Retreat met the train & informed them, that as they were too late to see the Doct^r that appl^y they must go direct to Throstleby, where my daughter was expected - Accordingly they did so, took a cab to the Hall, were rec^d. pleasantly by the Matron & given a meal - The Matron was told about the message at the Station, & that the Doct^r had not been seen.

upon which she absolutely declined to keep my daughter who had to go back to York, leaving her luggage already sent in advance, at Throstleby. They were again met - this time by 2 Officials at York Station - Mr. French took leave of my daughter who went alone with the Strangers to the Retreat. From that time, until Tues. Aftn, when Mr. Coates, our D., kindly telephoned to you, I never heard a word either of or from her. I very strongly re-sent, not only the extra cost of travelling, which she could not afford, but the fatigue & annoyance my daughter must have felt - & the needless anxiety we all experienced. I shall be greatly obliged if you will kindly enquire fully into the circumstances & let me know the result. If Mr. French's statement is not correct I shall require an explanation from her - If it is correct, I feel sure that your Committee will be anxious to take steps to prevent any future patient being put to the same unnecessary inconvenience -

I am very glad to hear my daughter was kept in bed during her stay at the Retreat - I trust you will be able to give me a good account of her shortly, & that her stay at Throstleby will be a permanent benefit to her -

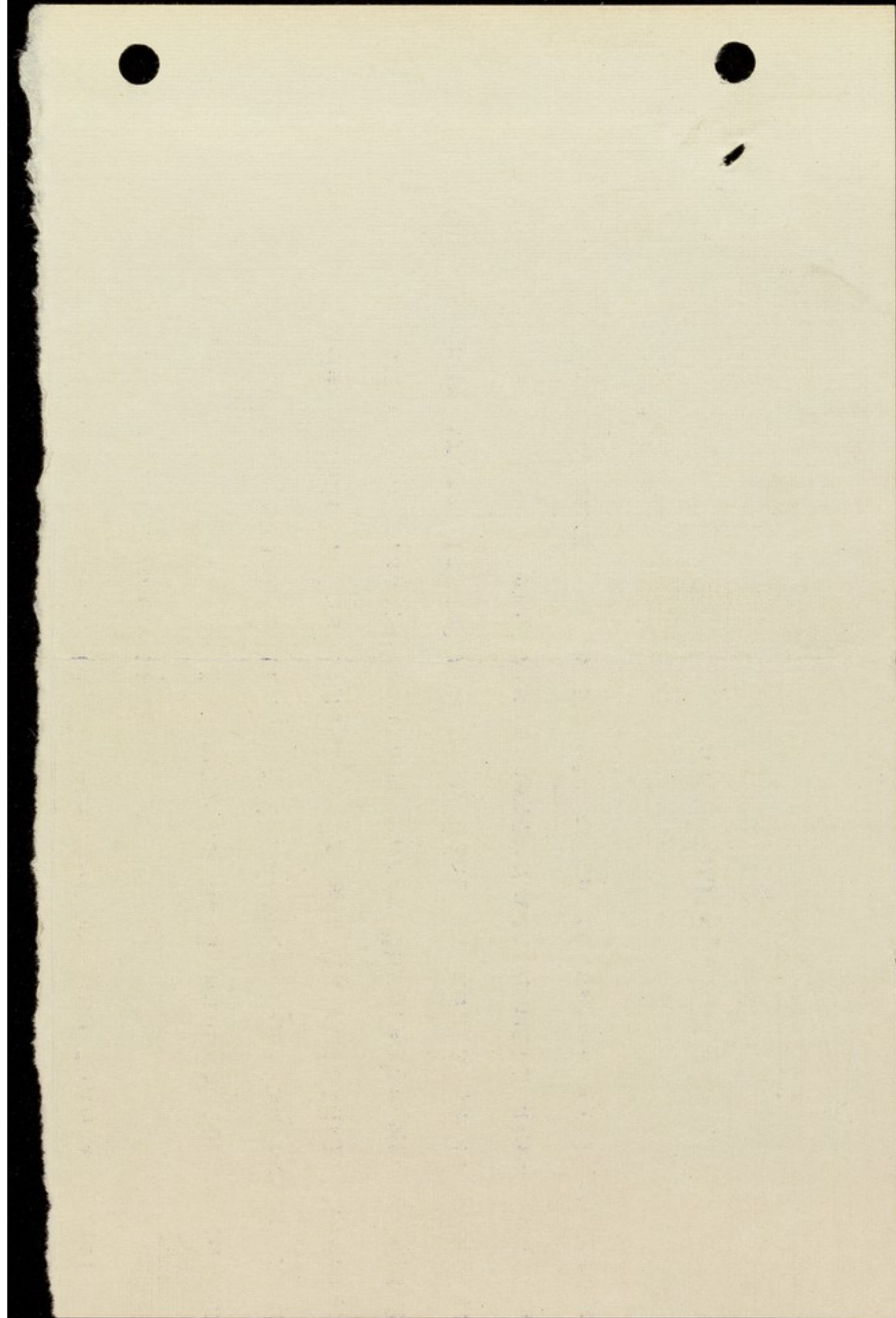

as a patient in the said Hospital, I HEREBY UNDERTAKE AND AGREE with Richard Thompson of Dringcliffe, The Mount, York the Treasurer of the said Hospital, to pay or cause to be paid, to the said Richard Thompson as such Treasurer, or to the Treasurer for the time being of the said Hospital, all such Sum or Sums of Money as shall from time to time be or become due and payable for the Lodging, Maintenance, and care of the said patient in the said Hospital, or whilst under the charge of the Authorities of the said Hospital, and all such Sum or Sums of Money as shall be paid or disbursed by or on behalf of the said Institution for any articles of Wearing Apparel, or other necessities, or extras supplied to, or provided for the said Patient, or the repairing or mending and washing of the articles of Wearing Apparel of the said Patient, so long as the said Patient shall continue in the said Hospital, or be under the charge of the Authorities of the said Hospital, and also to pay or cause to be paid the expenses in respect of the Funeral of the said Patient, in case the said Patient shall die in the said Hospital, or whilst under the charge of the Authorities of the said Hospital.
