




I wrote to your colleague, Dr. Smith, respecting Miss Buckler, and there is no reason for me to say more.

Miss Buckler is depressed and has been so ever since her admission to the Retreat on June 21, 1902. She had a previous attack and recovered. There is no evidence of dementia, and it seems to me not unlikely she may again recover, though how long this may be one cannot say. She is not suicidal, and spends a great deal of time alone in the garden. She is however frail, and having a lame leg can only walk with difficulty. I am advising her friends to transfer her on the ground that a longer stay here is likely to do her no good, and also in particular because we have at present too many chronic melancholic patients. Miss Buckler pays us 48/- a week. She was formerly a missionary in Syria and is an intelligent person.
