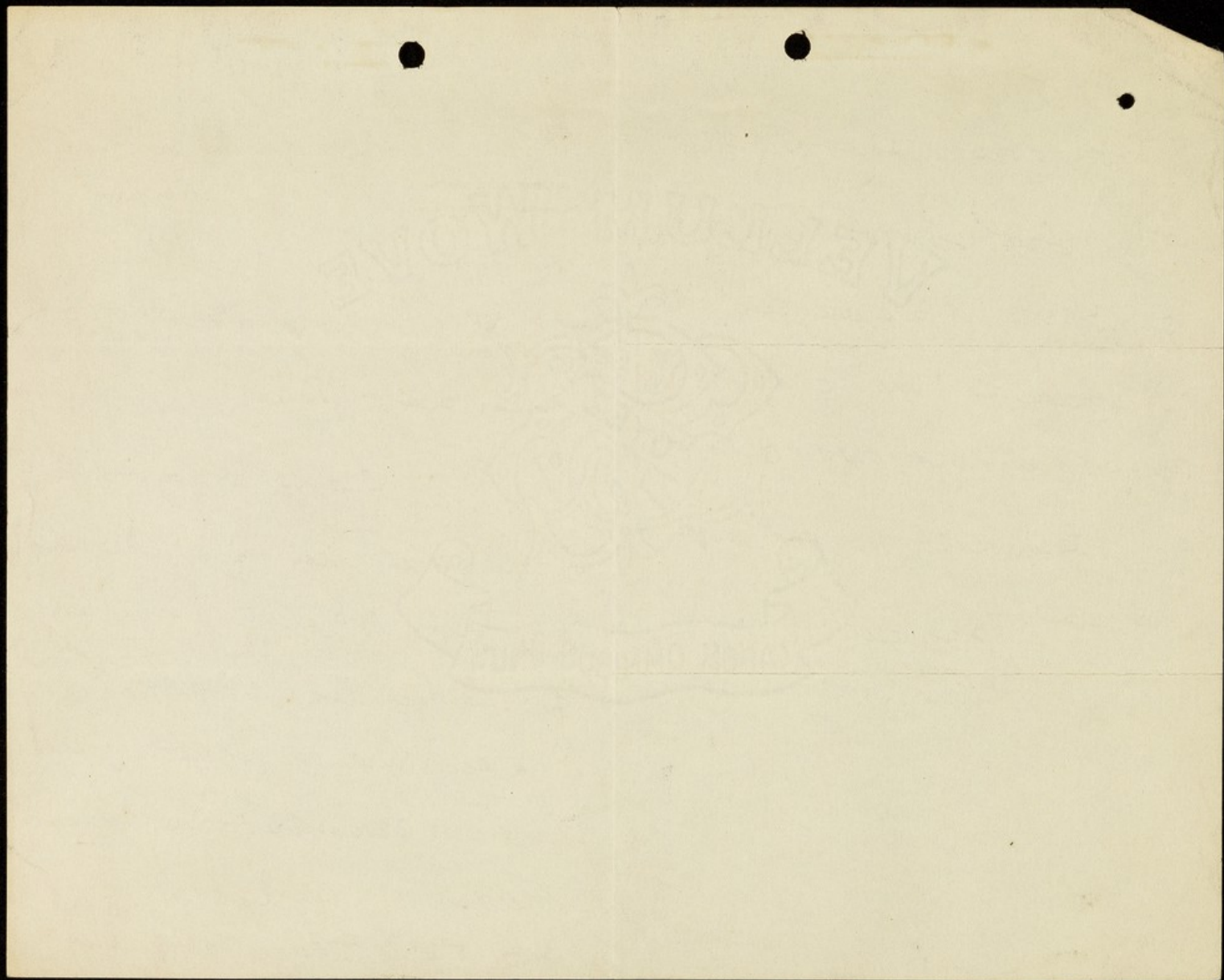

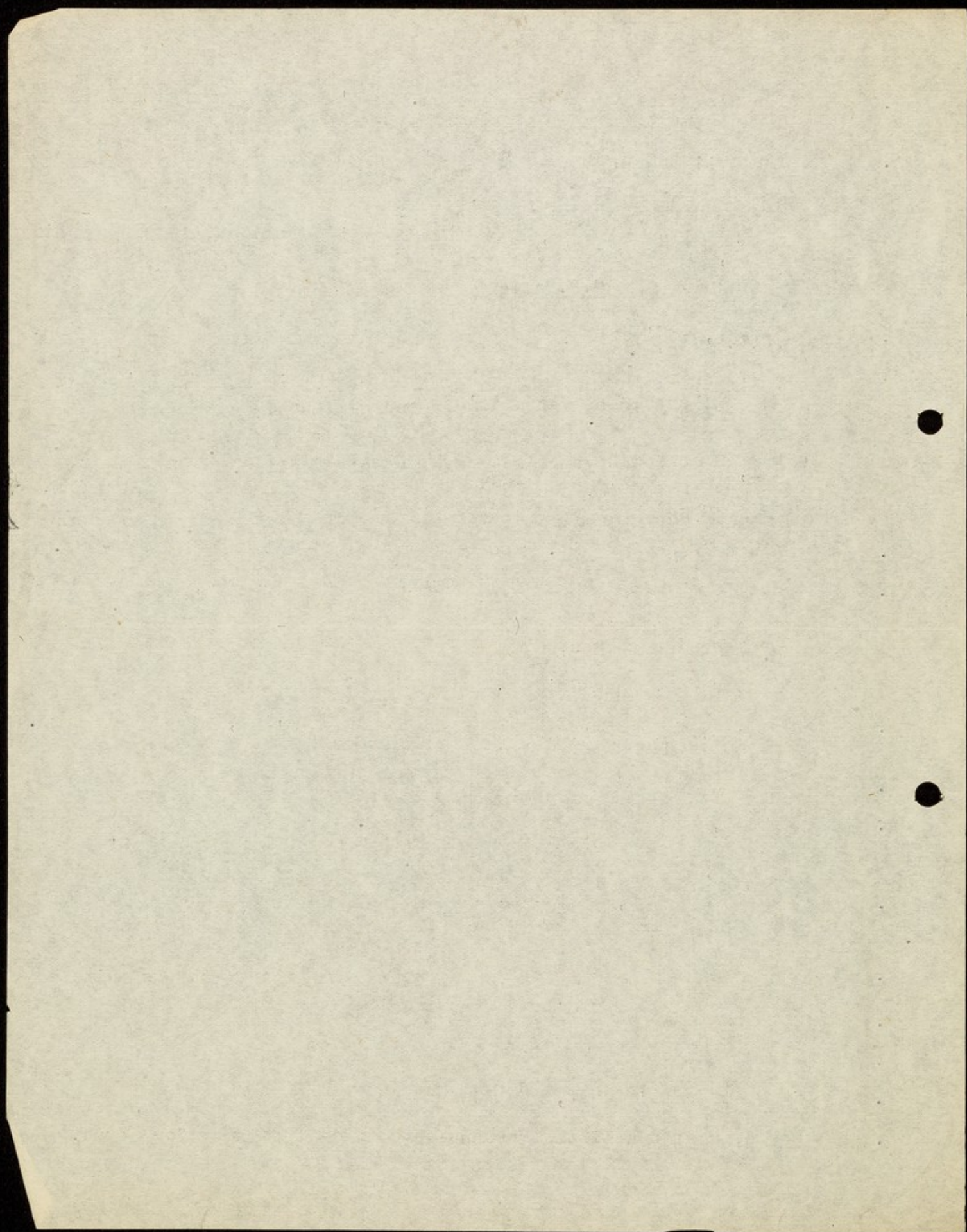

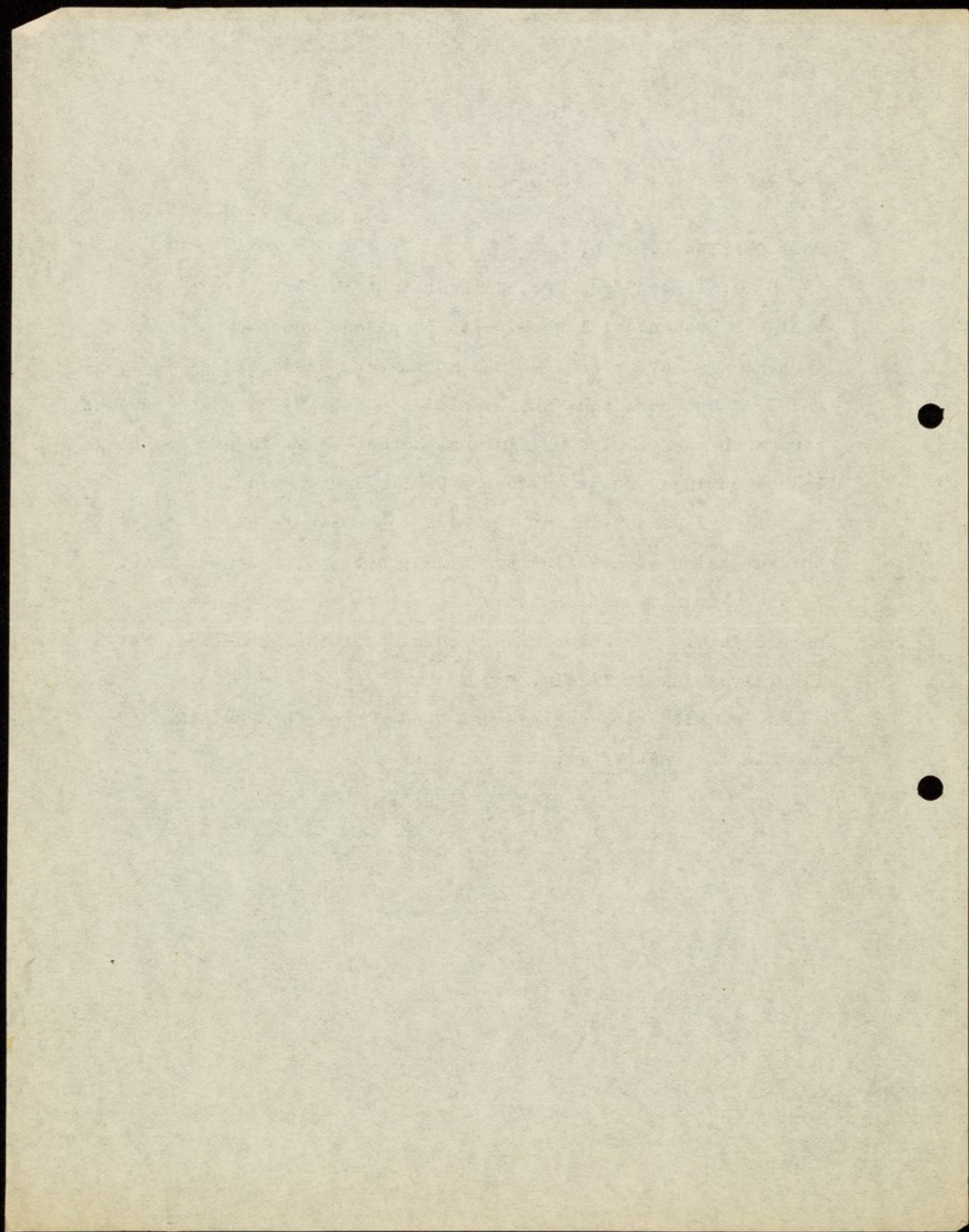
Dear Charles L. Smith,
