With regard to your letter I can certainly say that Mr. Carr is unfit for duty in India and that it is absolutely necessary for the state of his health that he should not attempt work, and that his leave should be extended.

With regard to the difficulties as to his ability to give receipts he certainly is not fit at the present time, but I question whether it is necessary for you to apply for a Receiver to manage the property in this case. I have two patients receiving Government pensions, one in the Indian Office and the other in the Navy, and it answers every purpose if I fill up the form provided saying that he is unfit to manage his affairs and stating that he is alive on a certain date. I think you will find that there are special provisions for persons breaking down mentally. If there is other property involved I fear it would be necessary to apply for a Receiver, but in an uncontested case this ought not to cost more than £30 or £40. However this is a very great deal to spend when the income is limited.
