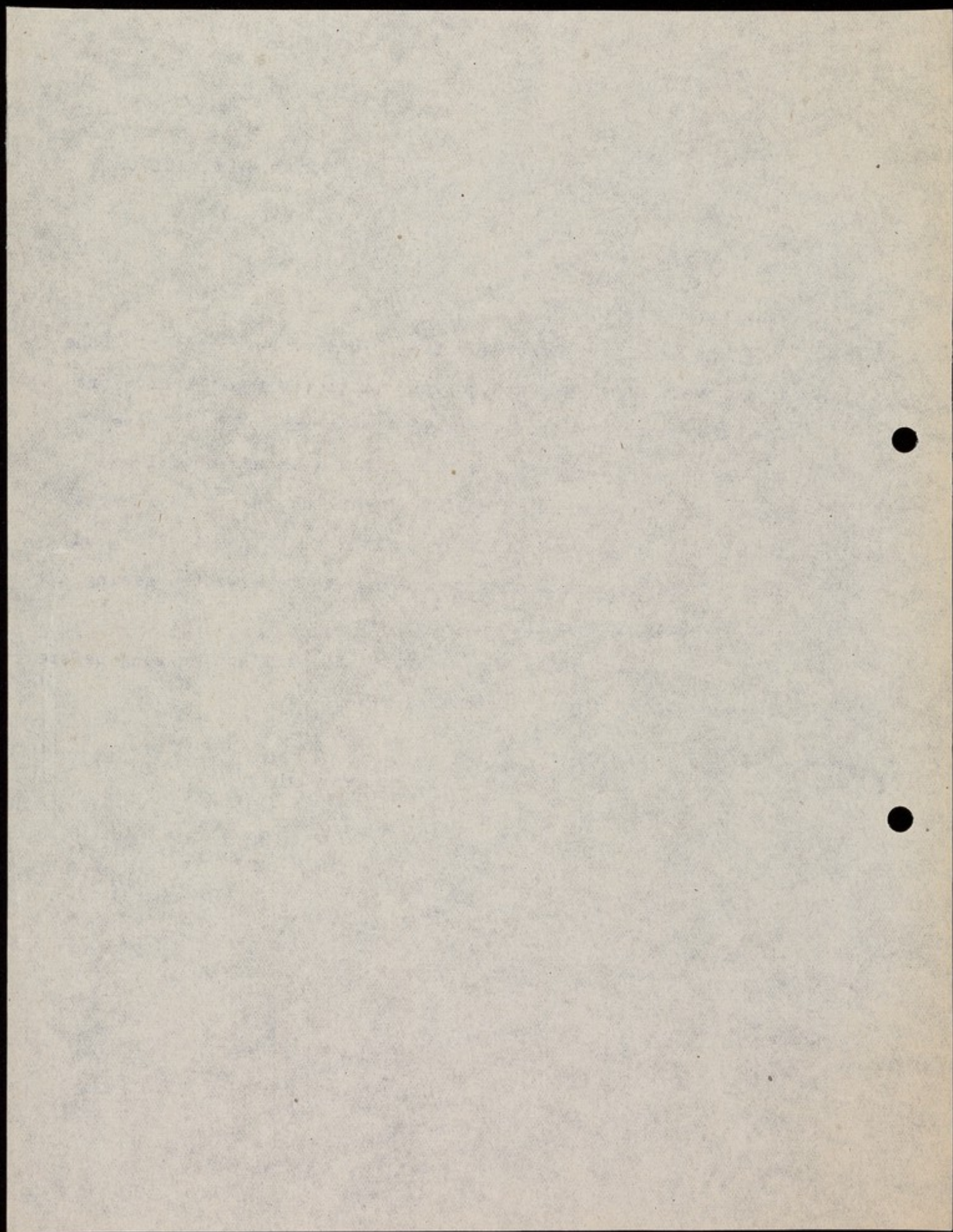
Dear Mr. Everatt,

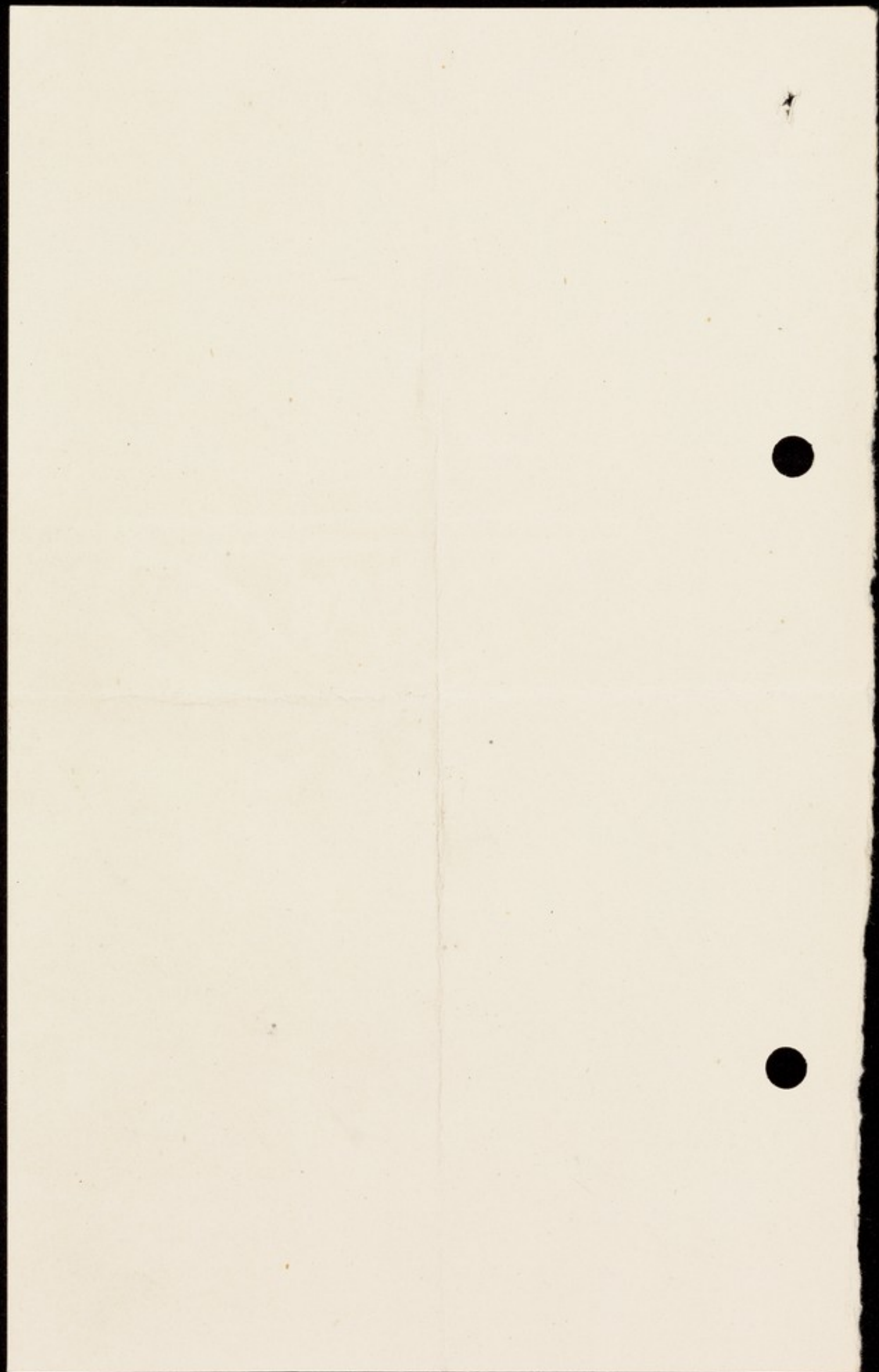

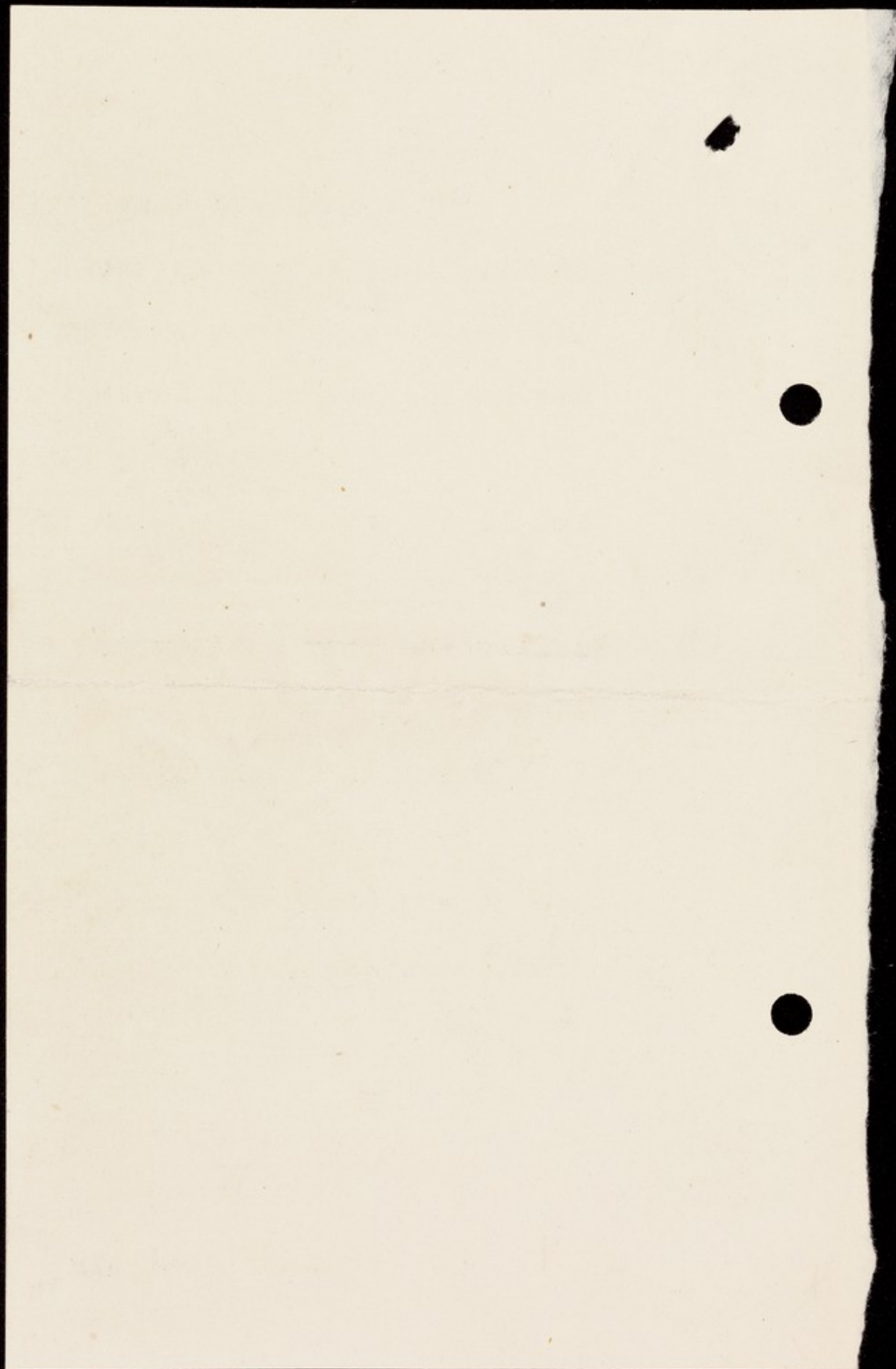

It will be quite suitable for you to come to see her at any time, though I fear the interview will be an unsatisfactory one.

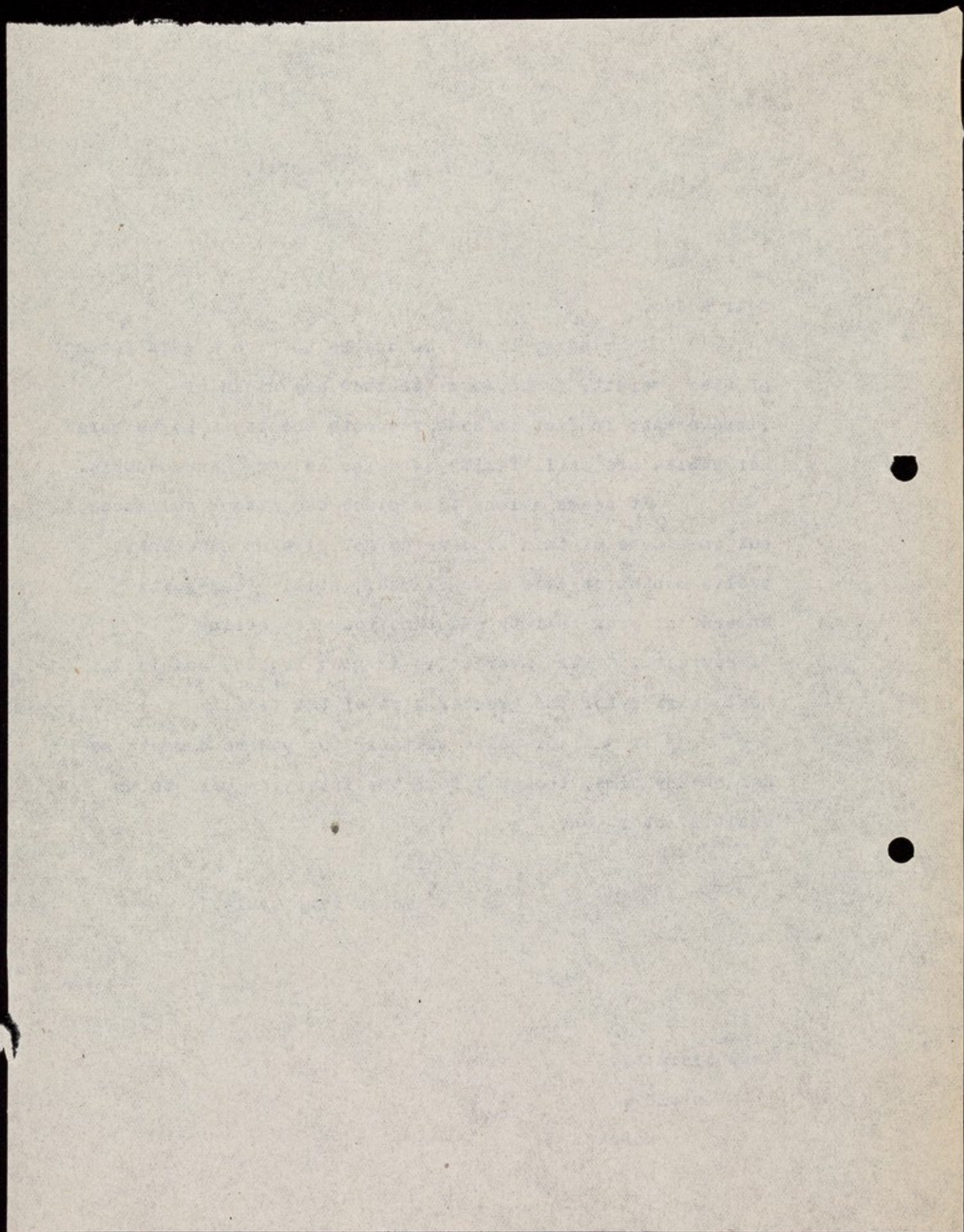
