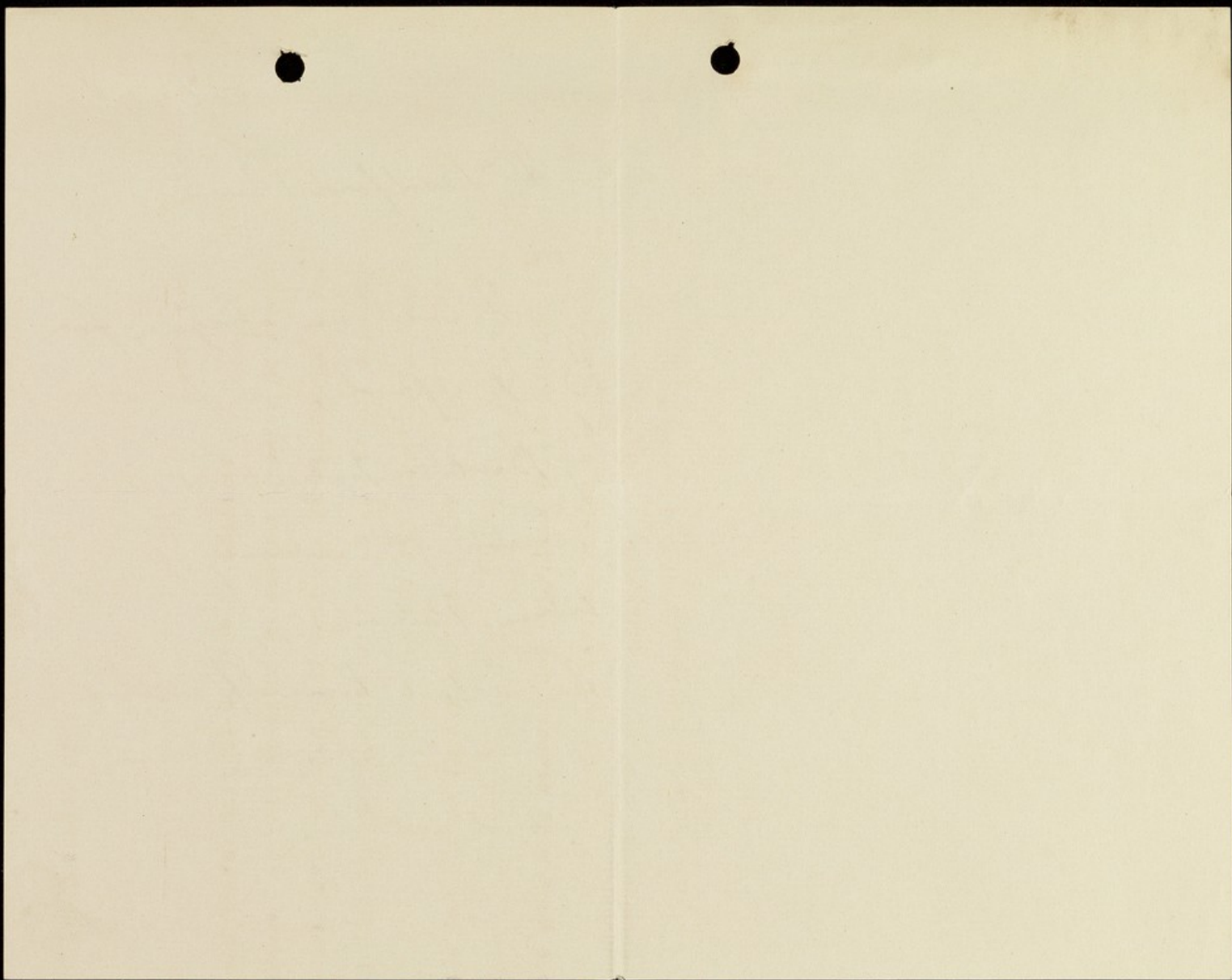

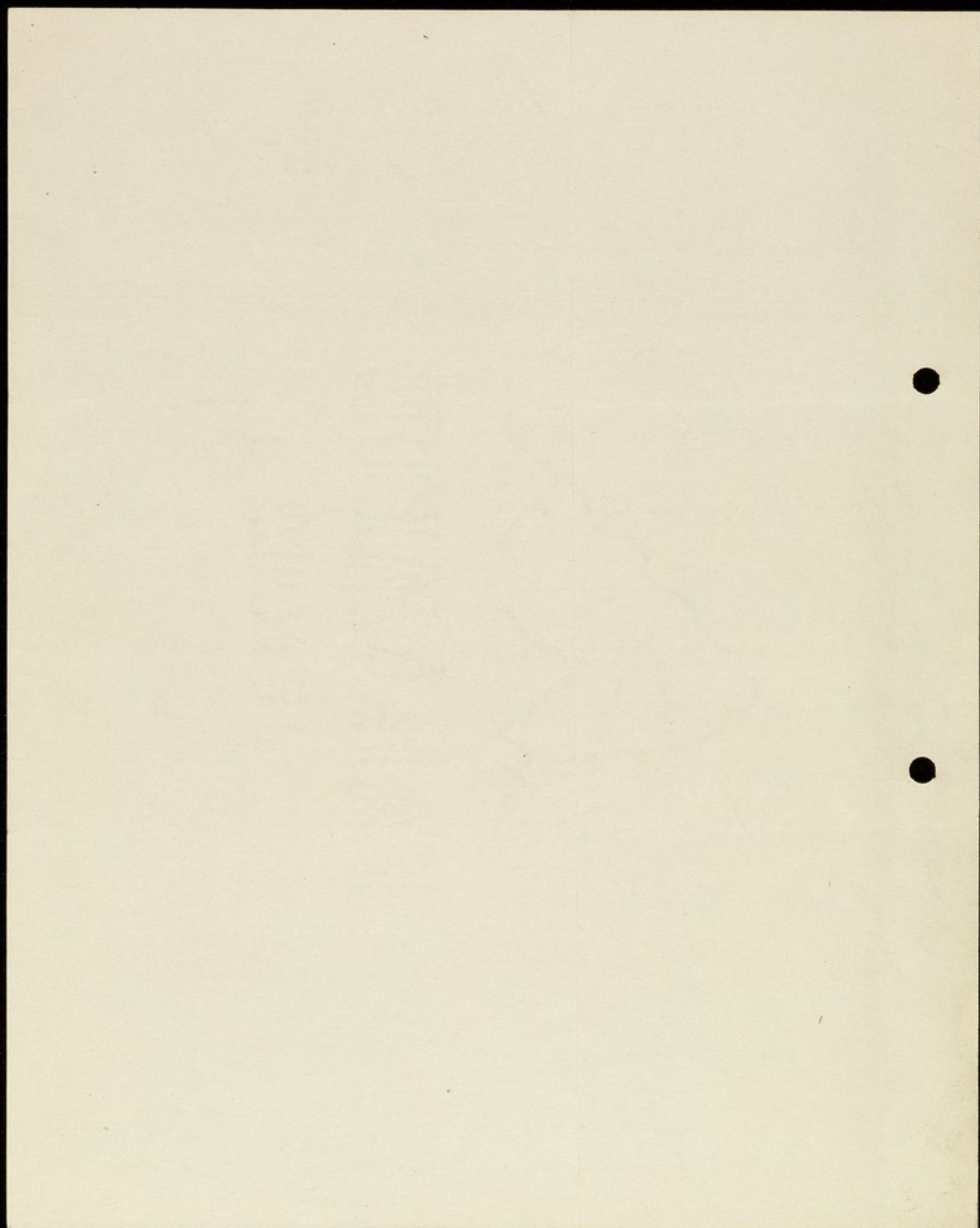
My Brother was in your Retreat

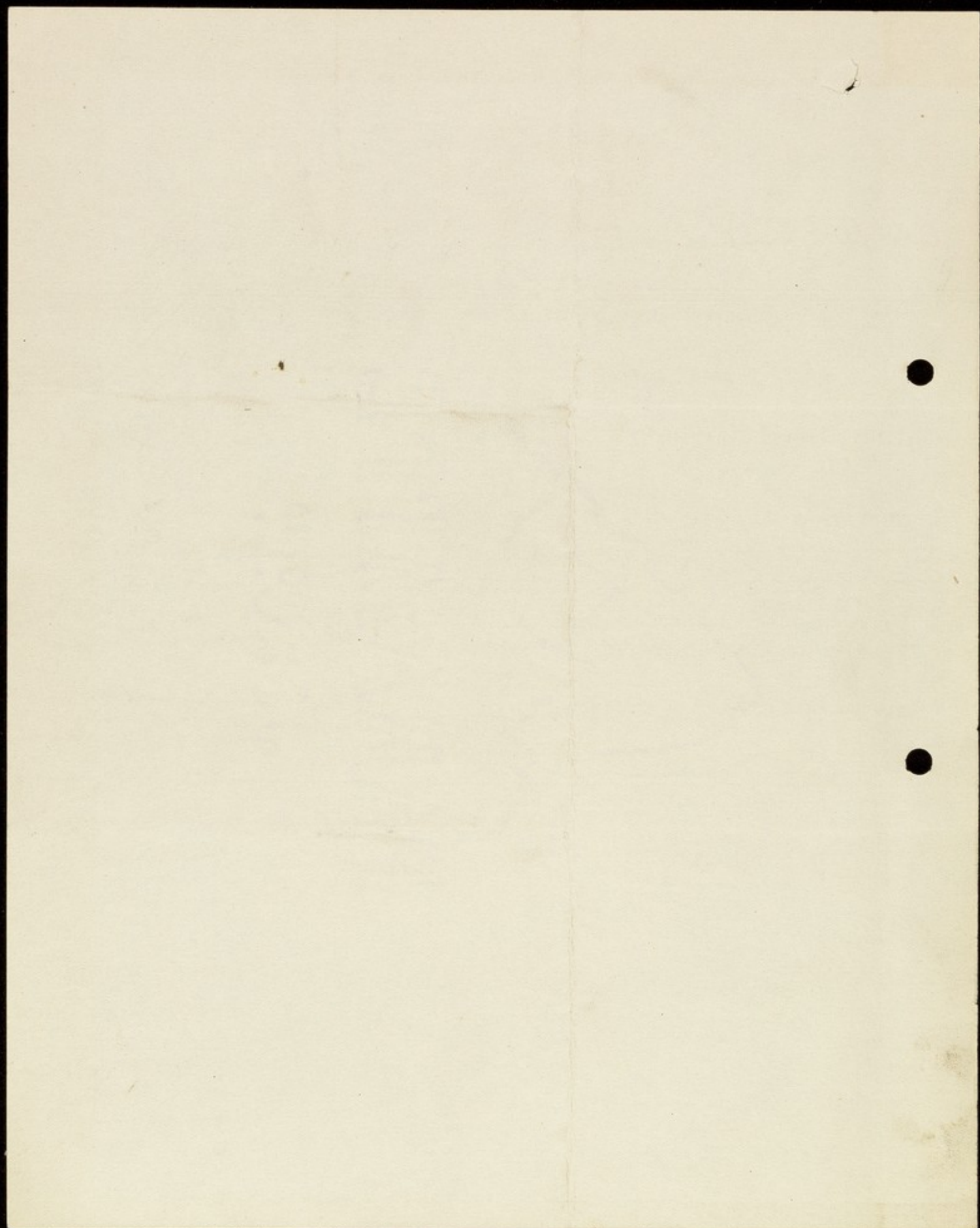
