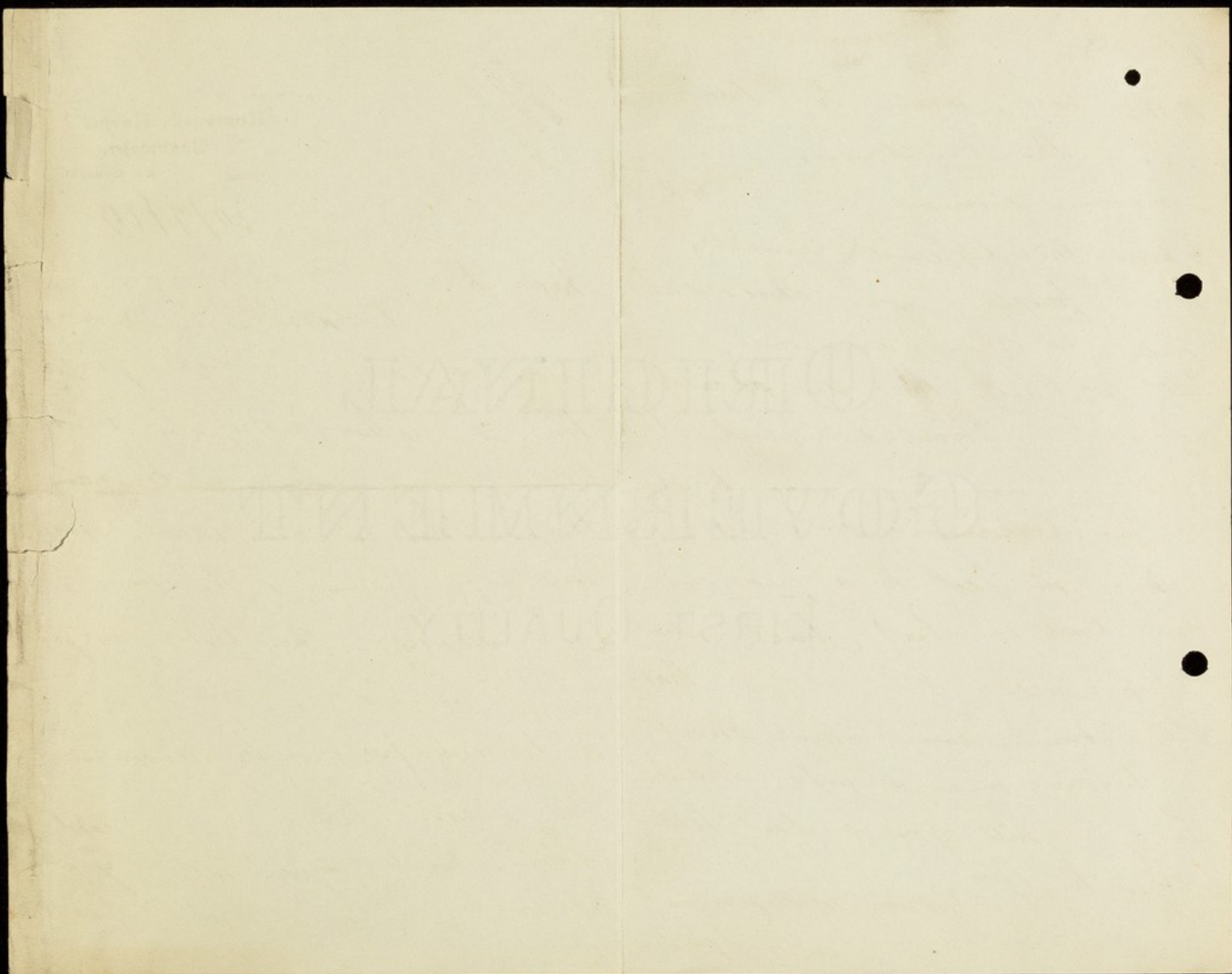

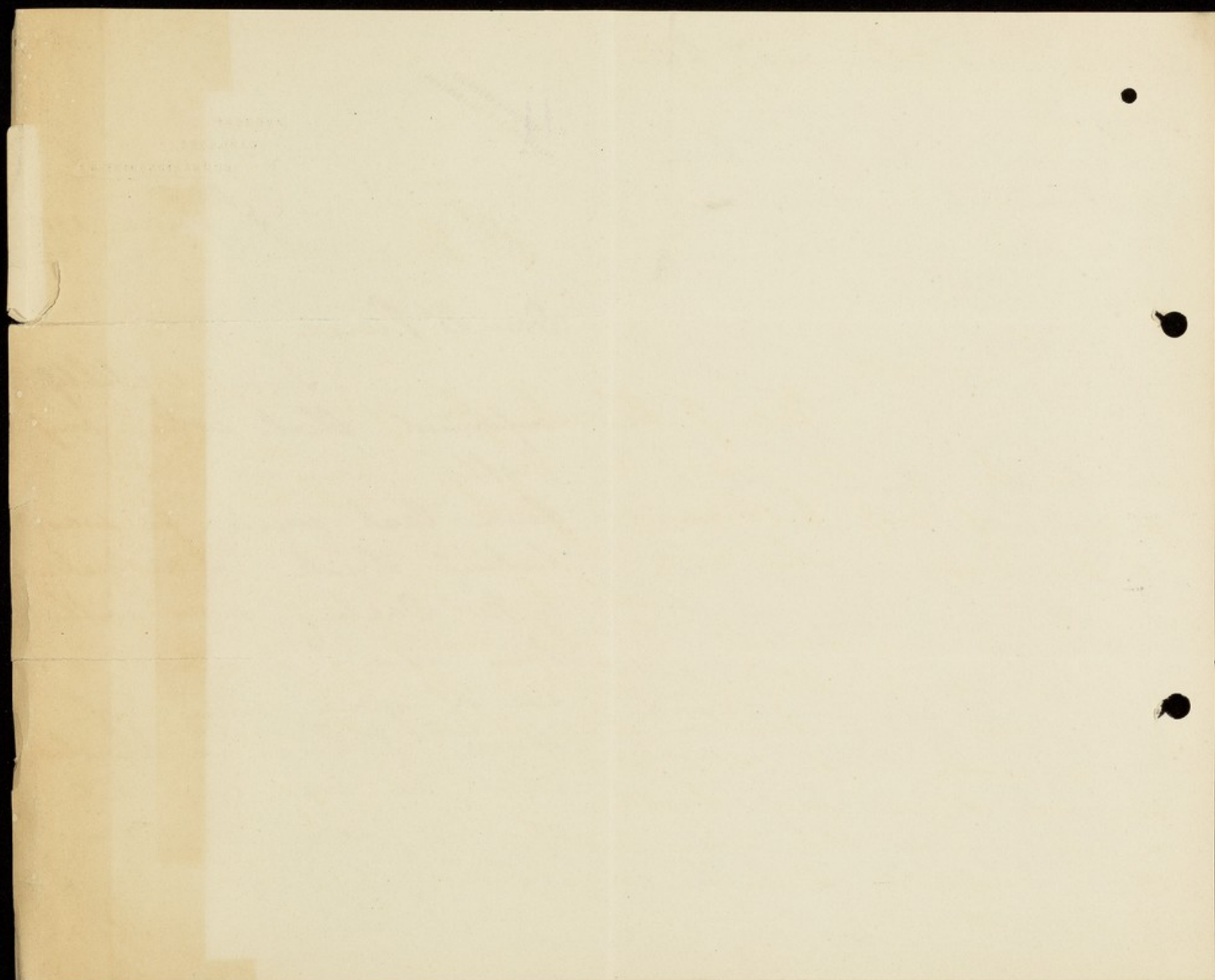

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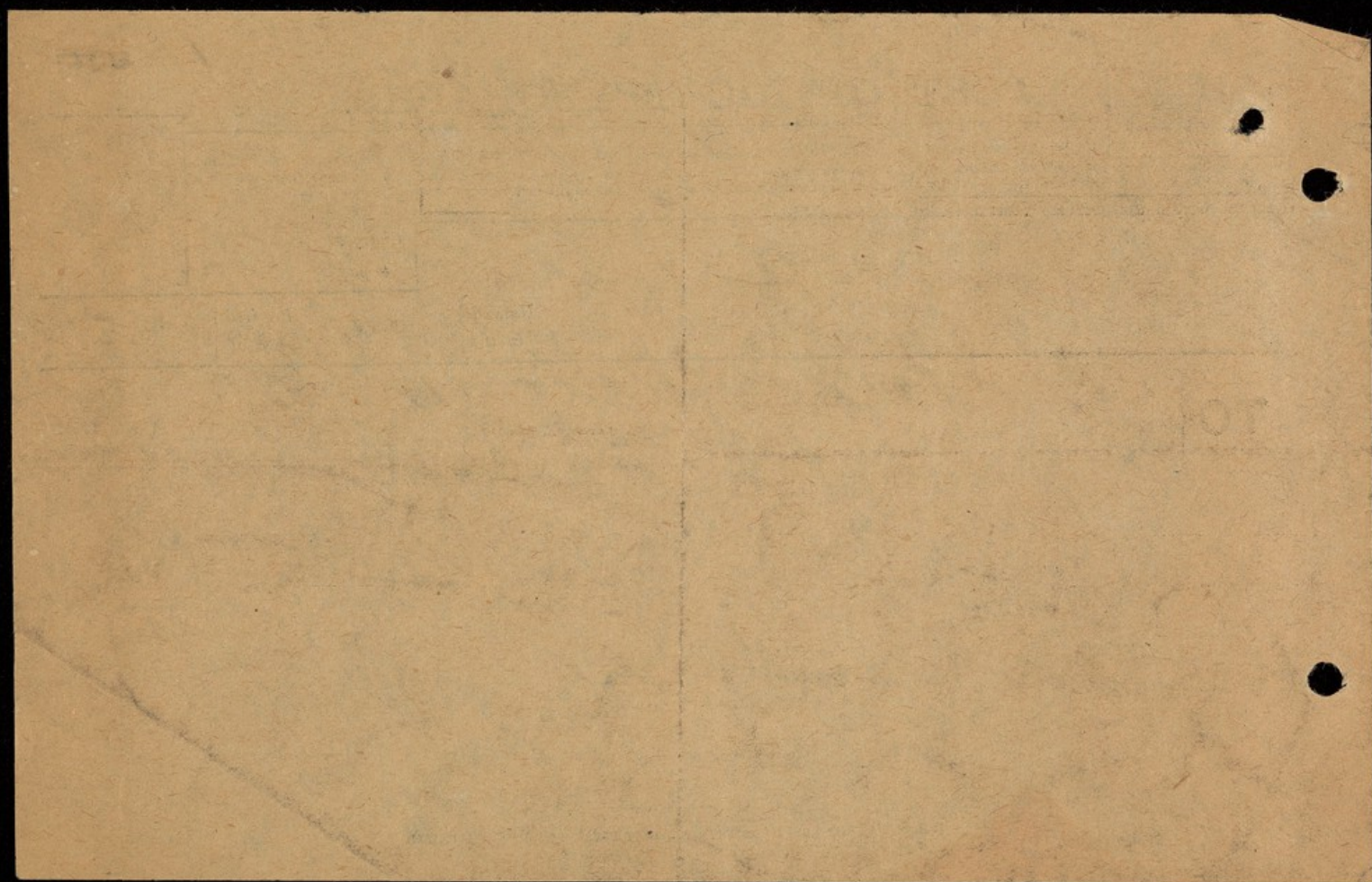

Many thanks for your letter about Mr. Fulton.

He duly turned up, and it is clear as you say that he is a thoroughly good fellow. He does not give any trouble, and seems quite willing to do anything that is suggested.

I fear he is going to have a bad time of it during the next few days as the withdrawal of alcohol may possibly give him an attack of delirium. At any rate he is more tremulous than he was when he first came in. We will gladly do all we can for him; and I can see that he will be an interesting patient. He will find here people that he can get on with nicely, but of course there are not many here who are all round as intelligent and take such an interest in things in general as he does.

We are thinking when he is a little better of giving him a course of atropine with strychnine which he does not appear to have had in the past, though he has had a good many other drug cures.
