I thought I would let you know that there is a prospect of Miss Goulder leaving the Retreat shortly. She is a good deal better, indeed at times she seems to be almost well, but I cannot say that she has thoroughly recovered. She gets into a miserable whining state, crying at night in a emotional childish way. She does not exhibit any definite delusions, and is for the most part of the time perfectly well and ordinary, and if she is entertained and goes about as she likes she is pretty nicely, but there appears to be a lack of stability and grit.

I am inclined to think that a longer stay here is not ~~likely~~ to help her very much, so I am sanctioning her going away with her mother and sister before very long.

The Committee of the Retreat avail themselves of this opportunity to give additional publicity to the reduction in the terms for "recommended" patients, which came into force on the 1st inst., in accordance with the 4th minute of the Meeting of the Directors of the Retreat, held 29th April, 1896, a copy of which is annexed.

*The following minute of the Retreat Committee, held 21st April, 1896, has been read:—*

"In view of the improving financial position of the Retreat, and the  
"kind response given by Friends in different parts of the country to  
"the appeals which have been made on behalf of the Institution, the  
"Committee are of opinion that a reduction in the terms of recommended  
"patients from 14/- to 12/- per week may be made. It is proposed that  
"the reduction shall date from the 1st of July next. The sanction of the  
"Directors' Meeting is to be asked for the proposed reduction."

*After careful consideration, this meeting decides to adopt the recommendation of the Committee.*

Dear Dr. Husband,

I am sorry I cannot give a very good report of Miss Goulder. She is a decidedly unsatisfactory patient, making persistent accusations against the members of the staff, and it makes it very difficult for us to help her in any way. She says that the nurses force food upon her with worms in it, that she is given sour milk and bad meat, and that the worms are now alive inside her. She also says that her clothes are stolen.

I incline to think that she must suffer from hallucinations of taste, but there is no clear evidence of this. You will understand the the food question under such circumstances is a constant difficulty.

The matter is not improved by the influence of the relatives. Mrs. Goulder very seriously hurt the nurse's feelings by tipping her a 1/-; this was done in the presence of the patient, and at her last visit she practically accused the nurse of misappropriating the fruit she had brought for her daughter. Making full allowance for natural distress of mind at the daughter's illness, this attitude of the parent cannot but prejudicially affect the patient in relation to the nurses. I was much put out when I first heard of it, and was on the point of writing to Mrs. Goulder to ask her to remove her daughter, but one has to remember the

Jan 23<sup>rd</sup>. Pt. admitted on the 5<sup>th</sup> Jan. Quiet for the first few days. Bed-treatment ordered. Out on the balcony through the day. From Jan 8<sup>th</sup> very depressed, & complaining troublesome with food. Jan 22<sup>nd</sup> Very troublesome threw her breakfast. Struck the nurses, & abused them. Said she was treated like a dog, & the food was filthy. Removed to the 4<sup>th</sup> Gall for the day. Has been fairly quiet since. Is sleeping very well.

30<sup>th</sup> Jan. Pt. has had bed-treatment until 29<sup>th</sup> Jan: & has been out on the balcony. She has been quiet although complaining about the food - she says it is not fit to eat & that it tastes horrid; Got up today after breakfast, in the garden twice, reading & doing a little needlework; complains that she cannot see distinctly, also that somebody has taken some of her clothes; Has written a letter today - home. Sleeps well, average 6½ hrs.

Feb: 3<sup>rd</sup>. During the past week Miss Goulder has been very difficult with her food, she says she is unable to swallow it - that it will choke her - also that there are worms in it. She has been spoon fed at times but occasionally has refused to swallow it. She is very suspicious & deluded, says that the nurses steal her clothes & help themselves to her belongings, today she says that somebody has cut the detached lining out of her dress - the dress had an attached lining. Visited by mother & friend on Feb: 3<sup>rd</sup> had tea with them, suspects me of having kept them waiting for an hour before allowing her to see them, although she was by me & heard the maid tell me that they had come. She goes to the work room for about an hour daily. She is sullen & does not enter into conversation with other patients, at times she will reply when questioned, but complains about everything in general.



Miss Goulder continues deluded & suspicious - she complains 3<sup>rd</sup> Feb:  
of her treatment here - says that she was given a  
worm in a fish-ball which she had for breakfast  
& that it is eating her head away - she says that  
all her clothes have been soiled by the nurses - she  
is very troublesome over meals - has to be spoon fed  
at times - then she is very agitated & noisy - sleeps  
well. No longer goes to the work room.

Patient continues deluded & suspicious - she rarely 28<sup>th</sup> "  
ceases talking about the worm which she says  
was given to her - she is very noisy at times &  
has struck the nurses repeatedly - repeats the  
same sentences all day long - "It's eaten all my  
inside away," & "I wish I had never come" She  
accuses the nurses of ill using her & trying to  
blind her. She sleeps fairly well but when awake  
is very noisy as a rule.

Patient continues suspicious & deluded - is very 28<sup>th</sup> "  
noisy at times also violent.

Patient continues about the same only that she 5<sup>th</sup> March  
is quieter. At times she walks the room in a  
very agitated manner but at other times she  
talks sensibly - then a few minutes later she  
will say "Are you sure my clothes are all right."

Patient continues deluded & suspicious but has been 14<sup>th</sup> "  
much quieter although she paces the room with her  
head in her hands saying "They have spoilt my life".  
over & over again. Taking No. 545 pills thrice daily.

Patient has been very noisy during the past week - 20<sup>th</sup> "  
walks about the room saying "They have ruined my life"  
repeatedly. She has been very suspicious & full of  
accusations - uses bad language occasionally & is very  
rude to the nurses. On 18<sup>th</sup> March she was very  
bright & quiet while her visitors were with her,  
but after they had gone she was troublesome &  
took three nurses to undress her. On 19<sup>th</sup> March  
she was very troublesome to dress took three nurses



Contd. and she had to be spoon fed with her breakfast. All day she did not cease crying noisily & stamping round the room saying over & over again "I wish I had gone home with them." Sleeps & eats well - is noisy generally before going to sleep.

21<sup>st</sup> March Noisy, troublesome, resistive, full of accusations & miserable.

22<sup>nd</sup> A quiet day but deluded & suspicious. Noisy during the night & removed into a single room on lower 4<sup>th</sup>.

23<sup>rd</sup> Noisy, suspicious & deluded. A good night, quiet.

25<sup>th</sup> Patient continues the same during the day, uses bad language at times & most insolent. Violent twice.

A quiet night - sleeping in 6<sup>th</sup> dorm. Refused dinner & tea.

26<sup>th</sup> Noisy, miserable & full of accusations - says the nurses have cut her hair off in the night - refused breakfast. Transferred to the 6<sup>th</sup> G.

27<sup>th</sup> Pt is quiet and takes food fairly well. Occasionally remarks how badly she has been treated and wishes she had come down here before.

April 1<sup>st</sup> Pt continues quiet and well behaved. Is taking food well, writes letters and does a little needlework.

Sleeps well.

3<sup>rd</sup> Pt went into the City and appeared to enjoy it very much.

8<sup>th</sup> Pt visited by her mother and friend. Went to the City & had tea with them.

11<sup>th</sup> Pt very deluded and troublesome since the 8<sup>th</sup>. Yesterday was most rude and abusive. Took a nurse by the throat and said that she would murder her. Pt very deluded about her ring.

13<sup>th</sup> To day, Pt. Has been much quieter.

19<sup>th</sup> Since the 13<sup>th</sup> Pt has continued to be noisy and miserable day after day, but not so deluded, or does not speak of her delusions.



April 22<sup>nd</sup>

Pt still continues to be noisy, and again speaks of delusions, says the nurses have cut off nearly all her hair and that her body is changed and all out of shape.

Pt takes food very well, often asking for a second helping.

29<sup>th</sup>

Since the 23<sup>rd</sup> Pt has been very tire some with food, says she cannot eat it.

Does not appear to be deluded about the food, but is too miserable to pay any attention to it.

On the 26<sup>th</sup> Pt was very trouble some noisy and deluded, especially about her hair. says 'it has been cut off.' & through this her life is ruined & was violent several times.

In the afternoon was visited by her Mother and Sister, was not able to stay long as Pt continued to be noisy and took very little notice of them.

To night (the 29<sup>th</sup>) Pt says she has no brain left it is all eaten away by 'Something'.

May 6<sup>th</sup>

Pt. continues much the same, has been noisy part of each day, kept a little with the mending which she does very badly. Sleeping 5 or 6 hrs each night, & taking food well.

Pt. had a fairly good day, though at times noisy, walks round & round the room, crying & moaning, saying her body is changing & that she is getting like some animal & that her clothes do not fit her. Had a good night.

May 10<sup>th</sup>



May 16<sup>th</sup> <sup>7<sup>th</sup></sup> Very little change, except that Ft. seems to get more deluded, especially about her hair which she hates to be touched crying & very noisy part of each day. Will not attend to her toilet, has to be washed, dressed etc. Bought a new pair of shoes yesterday & then said they had been changed & would not put them on. Is very rude at times to the nurses.

May 17<sup>th</sup> Has been very noisy all day, not fit to go gardening or for a drive, has been in the grounds for a short time, goes to the dining hall for meals, which she takes very well. Is very agitated at times & most suspicious.

" 18<sup>th</sup> <sup>7<sup>th</sup></sup> Has been allowing her hair to get neglected & says if the nurses touch it, they are cutting it off, today was very upset because her hair had to be combed & brushed, had a poor night & complains of toothache.

" 19<sup>th</sup> <sup>7<sup>th</sup></sup> Ft. still very noisy & rude at times, pulled herself together & went for a drive this afternoon but was dreadful afterwards screaming & shouting. Taking food very well.

" 20<sup>th</sup> <sup>7<sup>th</sup></sup> Ft. has changed very little during the last week is most noisy, constantly making up & down crying & saying all her hair has been cut off & that no one would know her in Sheffield. Her body has been changed & that she is altogether vile. Has to be washed & dressed most days for if left to herself does it very badly. There is usually a scene when it comes to having her hair brushed. Ft. always resists & is inclined to be violent if only one or two nurses are about. Visited by her mother & sister on the 24<sup>th</sup> went out stopping with them & stayed out to tea, was miserable when they had gone & made a great noise. Was moved on to the 4<sup>th</sup> room to sleep, has been having good nights usually & has sleep. Taking food well, looks most unhealthy with a spotted complexion. Has been complaining lately of toothache. M. M<sup>o</sup> Williams



June 2<sup>nd</sup>

Pt still continues miserable & noisy taking very little notice of anything with the exception of food, this she is taking very well, & now goes regularly to the Dining Hall.

16<sup>th</sup>

Pt has been much better since the 2<sup>nd</sup>, often having 2 or 3 days without being in the least troublesome or noisy.

Several times gone out in the garden to pick fruit.

To day, however Pt has been very miserable & noisy, & deluded about her hair, says that it is all cut off. Sleeps fairly well usually about 5 hrs, but habits are faulty.

Pt dreadful all day, noisy and crying out that she cannot hear it, most rude when spoken to, and says that she is treated like a dog.

Had to remain on Gall for meals refused her dinner, but asked for it when cleared away.

Very noisy to night, calling out that she is suffering terribly.
