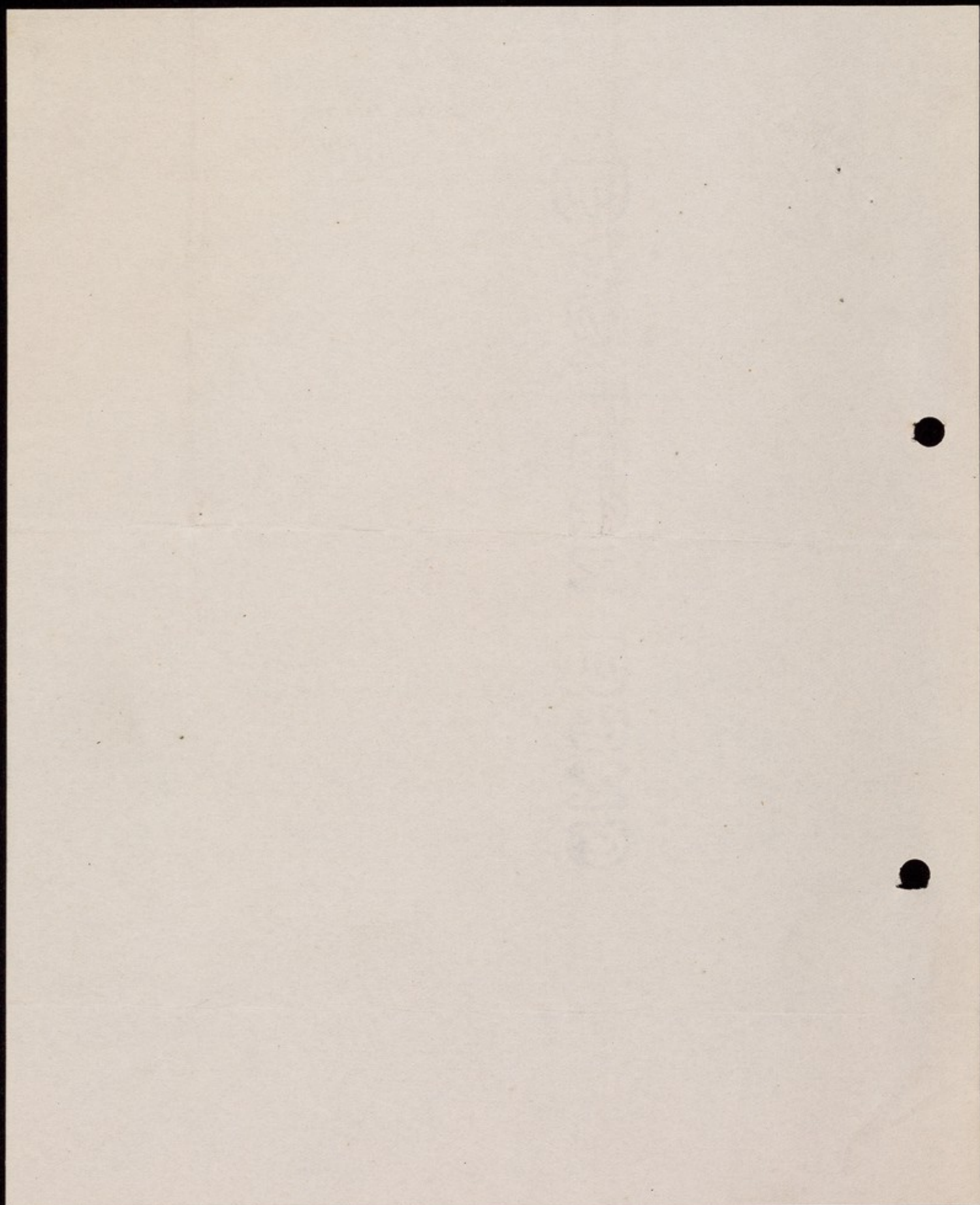

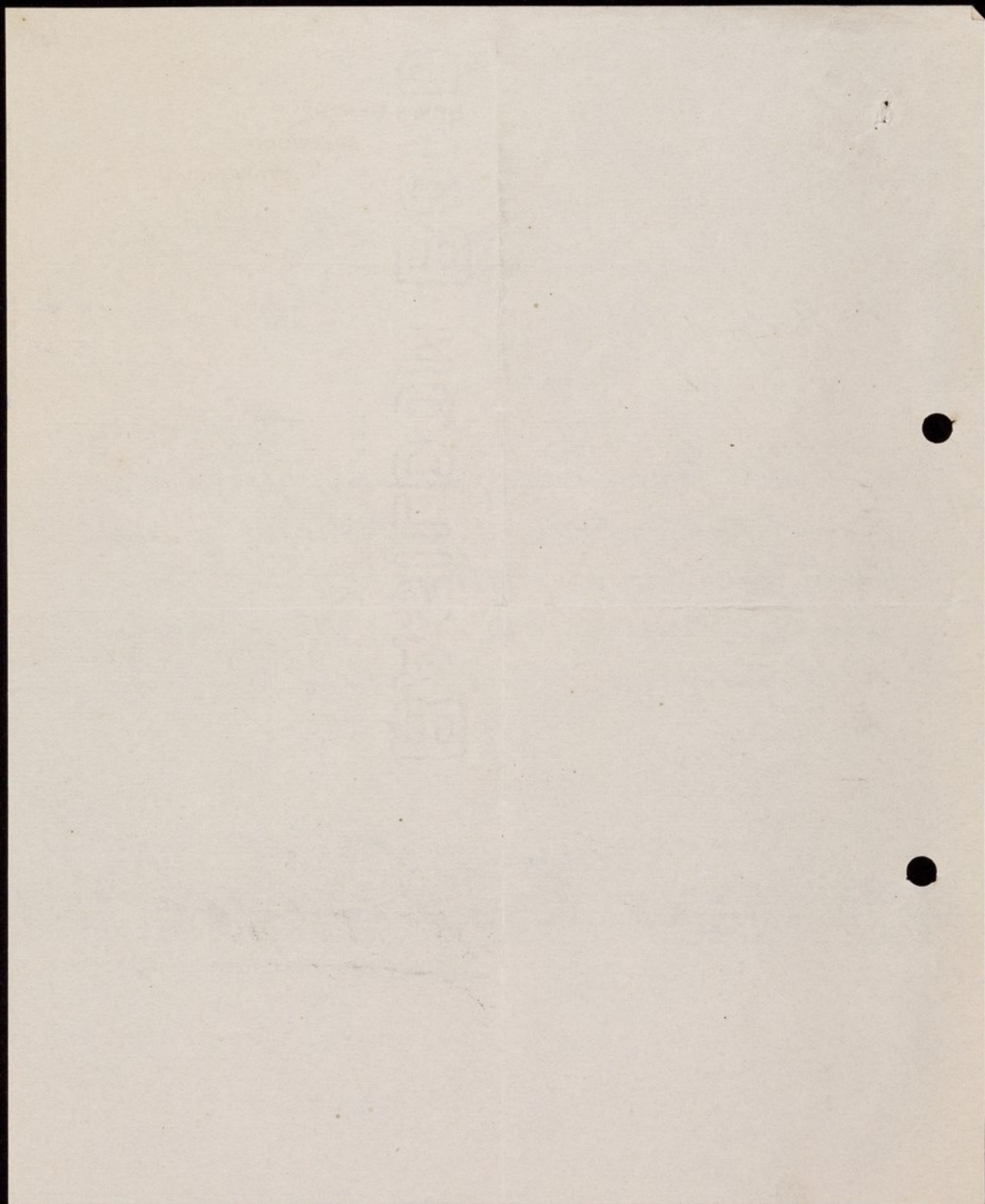

Dear Mr. Greenhalgh,

Many thanks for sending the cheque for which we are much obliged, the receipt will be enclosed. This puts the account in good order.

With regard to the transfer, I am fully aware that there is a difficulty in finding room for chronic patients. The Committee have realised the importance of securing proper care for persons who are not likely to recover, and they feel that it is quite a necessary part of our work. We have contemplated making an annexe to one of our villas for this express purpose, but this cannot be carried through at present. In view of the limited accommodation here and the great pressure on our space, we are always glad to be able to make room for a new patient who may possibly recover, and, as you will understand, it is discouraging for the staff and the patients when there are few changes. I have always urged the value from the patient's own point of view of a change of surroundings from time to time.

Dear Sir,

The Secretary has handed me your letter of the 28th November.

It is certainly remarkable that the first news we have had of any complaint of the nurses who were attending Miss Kelly should not reach us until ten months have elapsed. It is difficult for us to follow up any complaint of this kind, as the Matron at that time has left us, and the two nurses are now at work in distant parts of the country, and we happen to know that they are giving great satisfaction for the employer of one of them has asked us to arrange for her to continue for another three months.

I may remind you that the terms of engagement, of which I enclose a copy, request the employer to give us confidential information as to how the nurses behave, and form B. has not been returned, although we received form C.

However, I am quite willing to report your complaints respecting these nurses to the Committee managing the Trained Nurses' Department, but I should like further information as to the misconduct, supported, if possible, by the medical man who was in attendance.

Personally I know nothing whatever of the matter and have not communicated with the nurses, but it is not an unusual thing for persons mentally afflicted to resent any



supervision from nurses who may be engaged to look after them, and before drawing any conclusions as to want of tact and proper treatment it is all the more necessary that the case should be properly investigated. Both of these nurses have done excellent work here for over four years, and, consequently, I am disinclined to believe that they have neglected their patient in any way.

However this may be, it is quite clear that the account should be paid. These nurses belong to a co-operative association; they undertake delicate, arduous and difficult work for the good of the community for which they must be paid. The management of this co-operative society is in the hands of a Sub-Committee appointed by the Retreat Committee, and I shall be glad to submit to them any observations you may like to make on the matter.

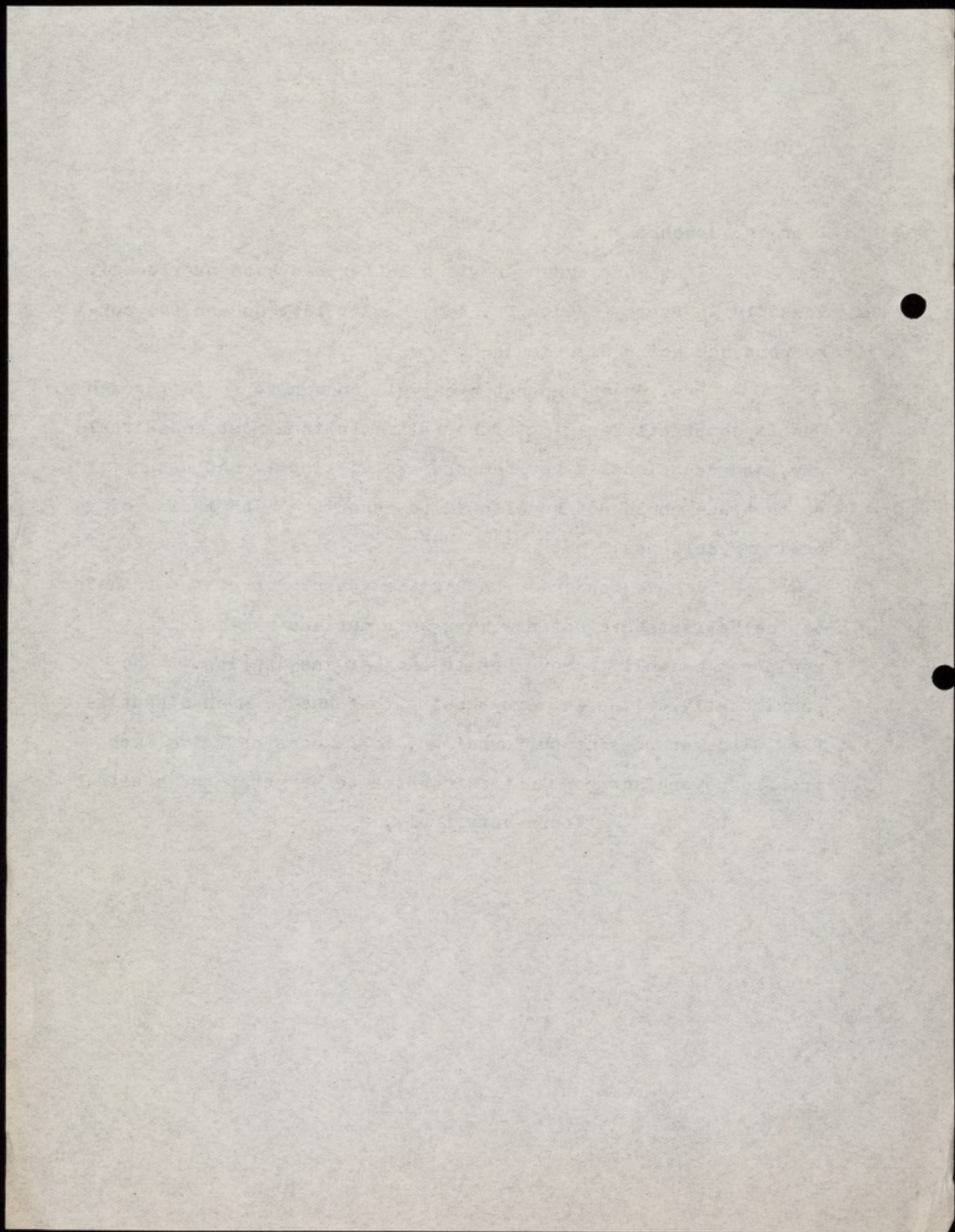
I am sorry your previous letter has been overlooked. Possibly it arose through Dr. Kemp having left us and the correspondence being disorganized.
