and attention

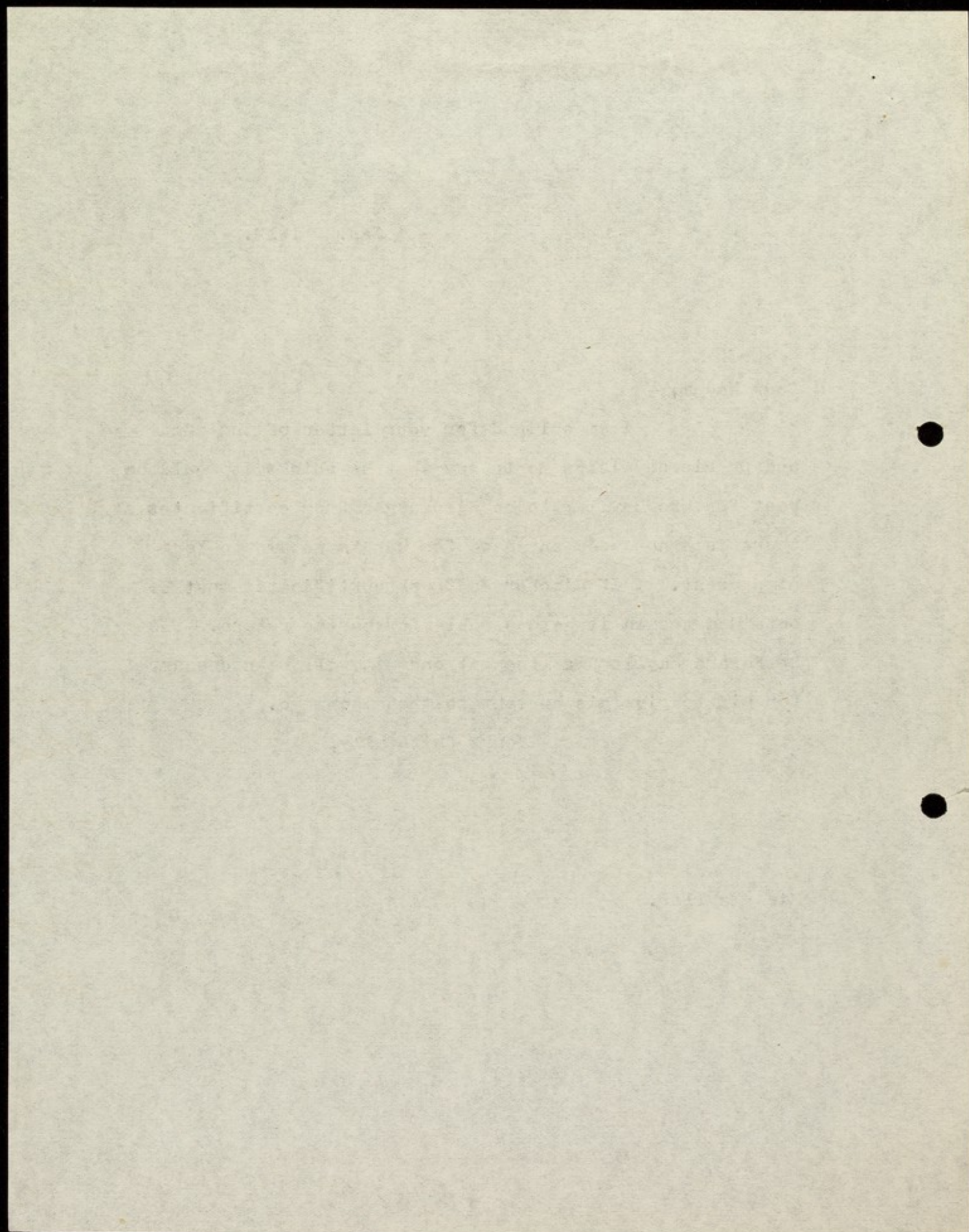
