Our numbers are steadily mounting up, but we still have vacancies especially in our First or Crichton Hall Department. Our private bedrooms in the ladies' Division are nearly all occupied. I have received the Petition signed for Mary Ann Hopkinson, and we will sign the Certificates as soon as we hear that it is convenient for you to receive her. Would you send for her, or would you prefer that we should send her through to you?

I fear it is an unfavourable case. I have looked upon it as a case of D.P.Paranoides. She is not at all bad to do with, excepting that at times she is noisy, stamping her feet, and making inarticulate sounds against people she fancies are assaulting her. We are short-handed, but I will try and send you if possible a short abstract of the case.

I have recommended a Mrs Keene to transfer her son from Virginia Water to your care. I fancy he is a moderately intelligent patient, but evidently has not recovered. I saw him in consultation some years ago, and feared the case would do badly.

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
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



N.B.—The charge for Board, Lodging and Medical care is payable quarterly, in advance. Disbursements by the Institution on behalf of patients, and other exceptional expenses, are charged in the following quarter's account. A residence of less than a month is charged as a month.

In the event of the death, removal, or discharge of a patient before the expiry of the quarter covered by the last payment, the surplus amount is returned by the Retreat.
