After what I told you
some time ago you will not
be surprised to hear that
Miss Hull is worse & that it
seems as if it would be best
for her to be under care, tho'
at present it would not be
easy to arrange it without
her consent for she is not
anything like so bad, as regards
her Mental Condition as
when she went to York Cast.
The melancholia is great, talking
as before the religious form,
but she has no delusions & her
mind is fairly clear upon other

Subjects. Her physical state is decidedly worse. She is now frequently sick & has a troublesome cough though without marked physical signs, but the most troublesome thing is incontinence of urine. She takes food well, but requires derival in order that she may sleep at nights. I am sorry to say that she has conceived a prejudice against The Retreat, mainly so far as I can understand on account of the patients that were near her when she first went there, one in particular she says used very bad language. How this may be I do not of course know, but that she thinks so is an obstacle to a voluntary removal.

I wonder if I may assume from you that there would be no fear of anything of the kind if she returns there now? Perhaps you can advise me what is best to be done? I thought that she might have gone to a Nursing Home, but I fear that if she ~~would not go~~ it will soon be necessary to put her under care at The Retreat or elsewhere & her friends & I would much prefer that it should be The Retreat.

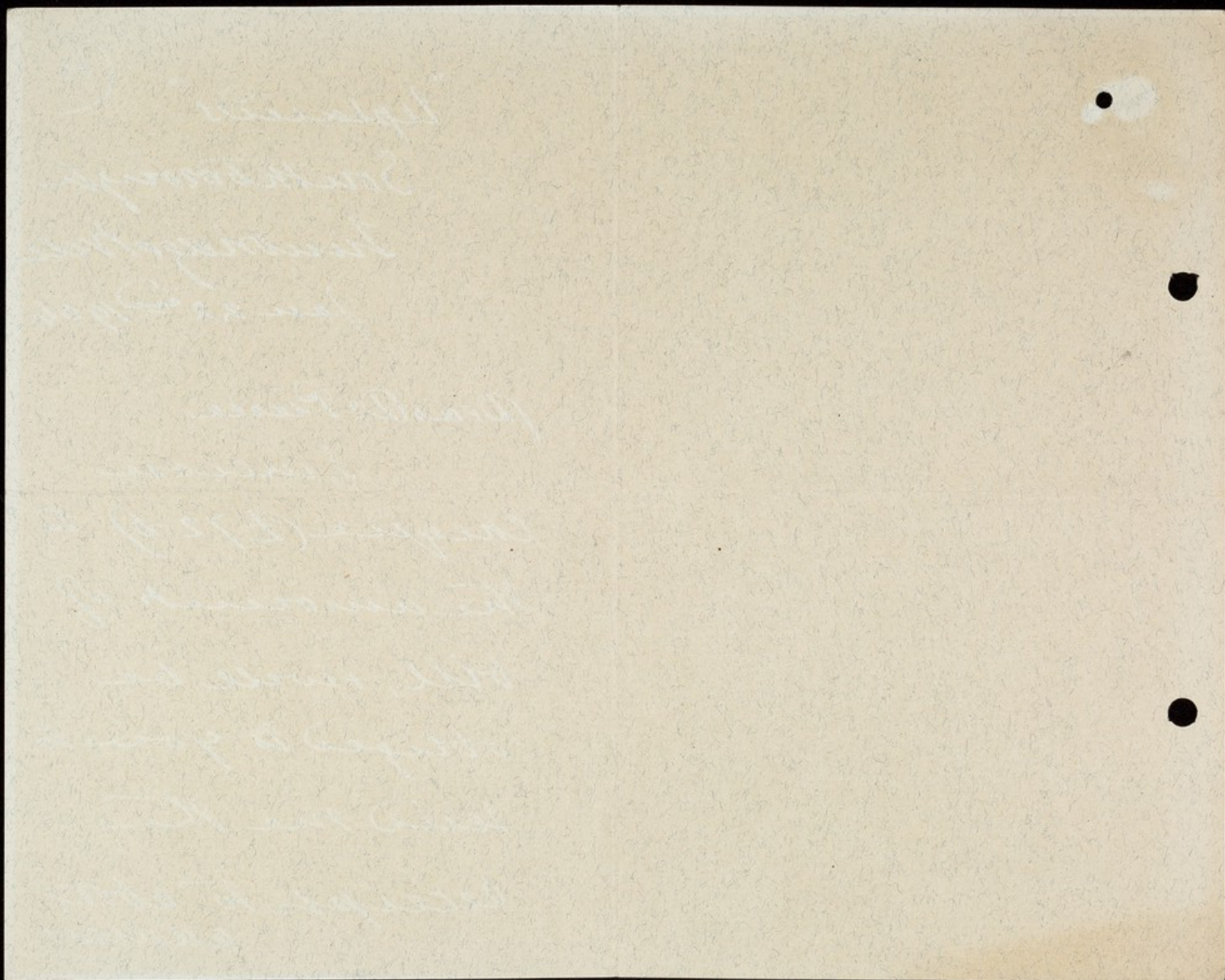

One delusion I did not mention is that she has lost all her money, this is not the case, but she is not very well, they can pay about £4.4 a week however.

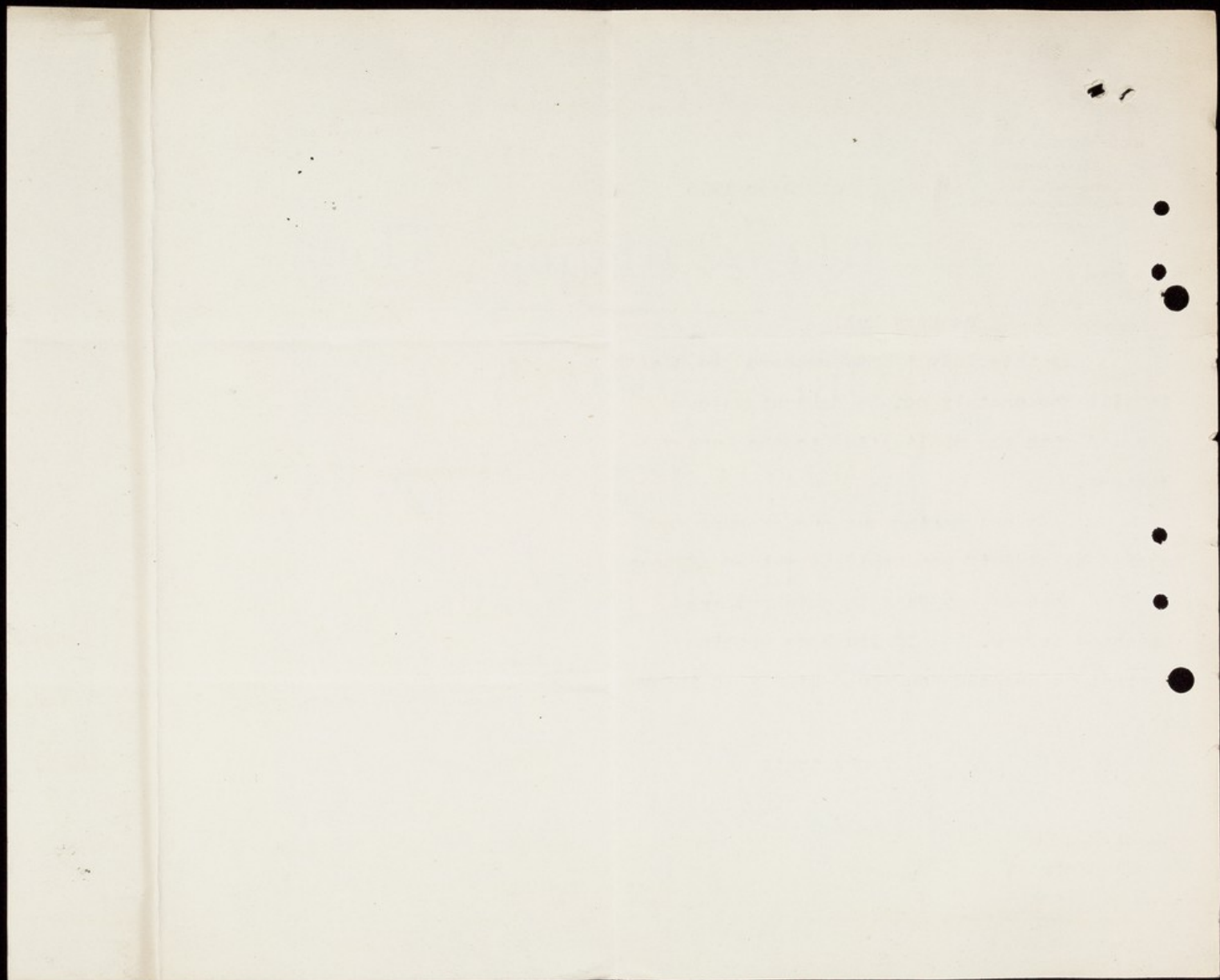
