You will not hesitate  
to say if in your

Dear Sir,

Some considerable time ago I wrote and obtained a Prospectus from you of the Retreat. If I remember rightly, the lowest figure at which you could receive patients who were not friends, was 48/- weekly, and that sum



did not include extras.

Later on, D<sup>r</sup> Yellowlees very kindly spoke with you on my account, to find out if you could make any special arrangement about taking my husband, Mr. Jackson.

Where he has been, with D<sup>r</sup> Neil at Warmeford House, near Oxford for over a year, 42/- a week has been the charge including all ordinary extras

such as washing, mending etc. D<sup>r</sup> Neil does not ~~find~~ unfortunately Mr. Jackson's sister Mr. Walter Raleigh, and her family are resident in Oxford, and as D<sup>r</sup> Neil is able to let Mr. Jackson go about in town daily, on his parole, it has been thought better that he should be moved to some place where he will not be constantly meeting



I might enclose his letter  
to remind you of the case.

If it is possible for  
you to receive Mr Jackson  
for this summer, he would  
come to you on July 11<sup>th</sup>  
or thereabouts, as a quarter  
of his stay at the Warne-  
ford ends on that day.

I shall be grateful if  
you will let me hear from  
you soon, as other arrange-  
ments will have to be made  
failing you. Only I hope  
very much that you will



see your way to having  
my husband, as from  
what I have heard, I  
have great confidence in  
you.

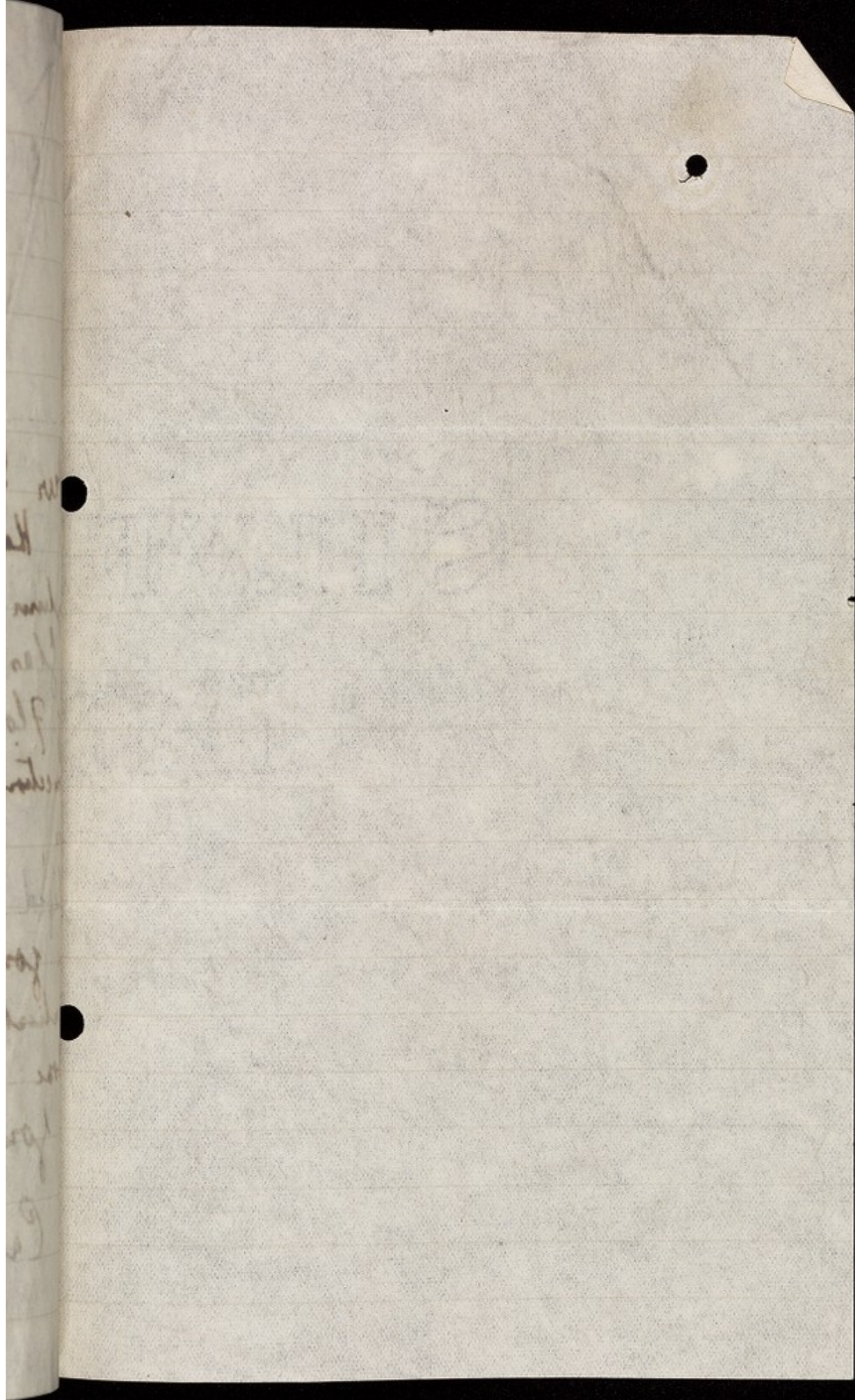

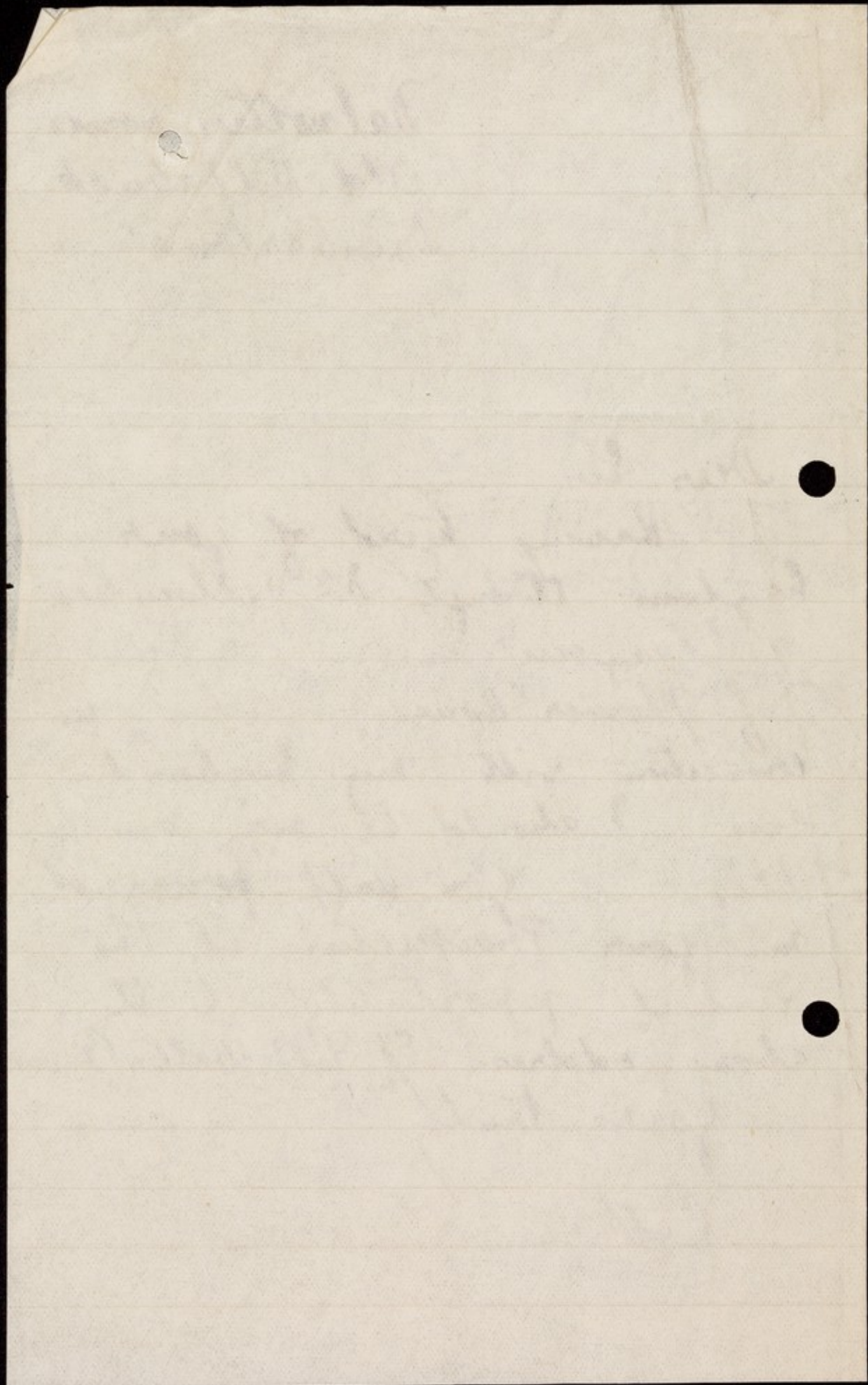

Dear Sir,

As I did not see you again on  
Saturday, I had not the opportunity  
of telling you how your patient  
impressed me as progressing. Absence  
enables one to see changes, that  
constant intercourse <sup>does</sup> not.

I noticed the following:—  
apparent marked improvement—  
more coherence in thought; less introduction  
of foreign subjects in one sentence; no  
tapping into side issues—  
Ability to carry on conversation (This  
I was much pleased with)



More normal facial expression, absence  
of the "wild" look

Not much improvement in memory, also  
the conjuring up of false incidents  
is still to a certain extent inherent.

There was one incident which I noted  
with pleasure & that was the returning  
power of reasoning. My brother desired  
to light his pipe: in March he would  
not have had the sense to know the  
pipe wanted lighting, or at least very  
imperfectly; whereas on Saturday he made  
himself a pipe light of paper, &  
would have lit it at the fire, if I had  
not done the office for him - but it showed  
to me a return of concentration of  
thought.

## YORK RETREAT HOSPITAL FOR THE INSANE.

In consideration of the Directors of the York Retreat Hospital for the Insane agreeing to receive George Jackson of \_\_\_\_\_

\_\_\_\_\_ as a patient in the said Hospital, I HEREBY UNDERTAKE

AND AGREE with Richard Thompson

of Dringate, The Mount, York the Treasurer of the said Hospital, to pay or cause to be paid, to the said Richard Thompson

as such Treasurer, or to the Treasurer for the time being of the said Hospital, all such Sum or Sums of Money as shall from time to time be or become due and payable for the Lodging, Maintenance, and care of the said patient in the said Hospital, or whilst under the charge of the Authorities of the said Hospital, and all such Sum or Sums of Money as shall be paid or disbursed by or on behalf of the said Institution for any articles of Wearing Apparel, or other necessities, or extras supplied to, or provided for the said Patient, or the repairing or mending and washing of the articles of Wearing Apparel of the said Patient, so long as the said Patient shall continue in the said Hospital, or be under the charge of the Authorities of the said Hospital, and also to pay or cause to be paid the expenses in respect of the Funeral of the said Patient, in case the said Patient shall die in the said Hospital, or whilst under the charge of the Authorities of the said Hospital. AND I FURTHER AGREE to pay Interest at the rate of five per cent. per annum on any accounts due from me as above, which shall not have been discharged within Twenty-eight days from the receipt of such account from the Treasurer, Secretary, or Clerk of the said Hospital. AND I ALSO UNDERTAKE AND AGREE, at my own expense, to remove the said Patient from the said Hospital within Fourteen days after receiving Notice in writing from the Treasurer, Secretary or Clerk for the time being of the said Hospital, requiring such removal.

N.B.—The charge for Board, Lodging and Medical care is payable quarterly, in advance. Disbursements by the Institution on behalf of patients, and other exceptional expenses, are charged in the following quarter's account. A residence of less than a month is charged as a month.

In the event of the death, removal, or discharge of a patient before the expiry of the quarter covered by the last payment, the surplus amount is returned by the Retreat.
