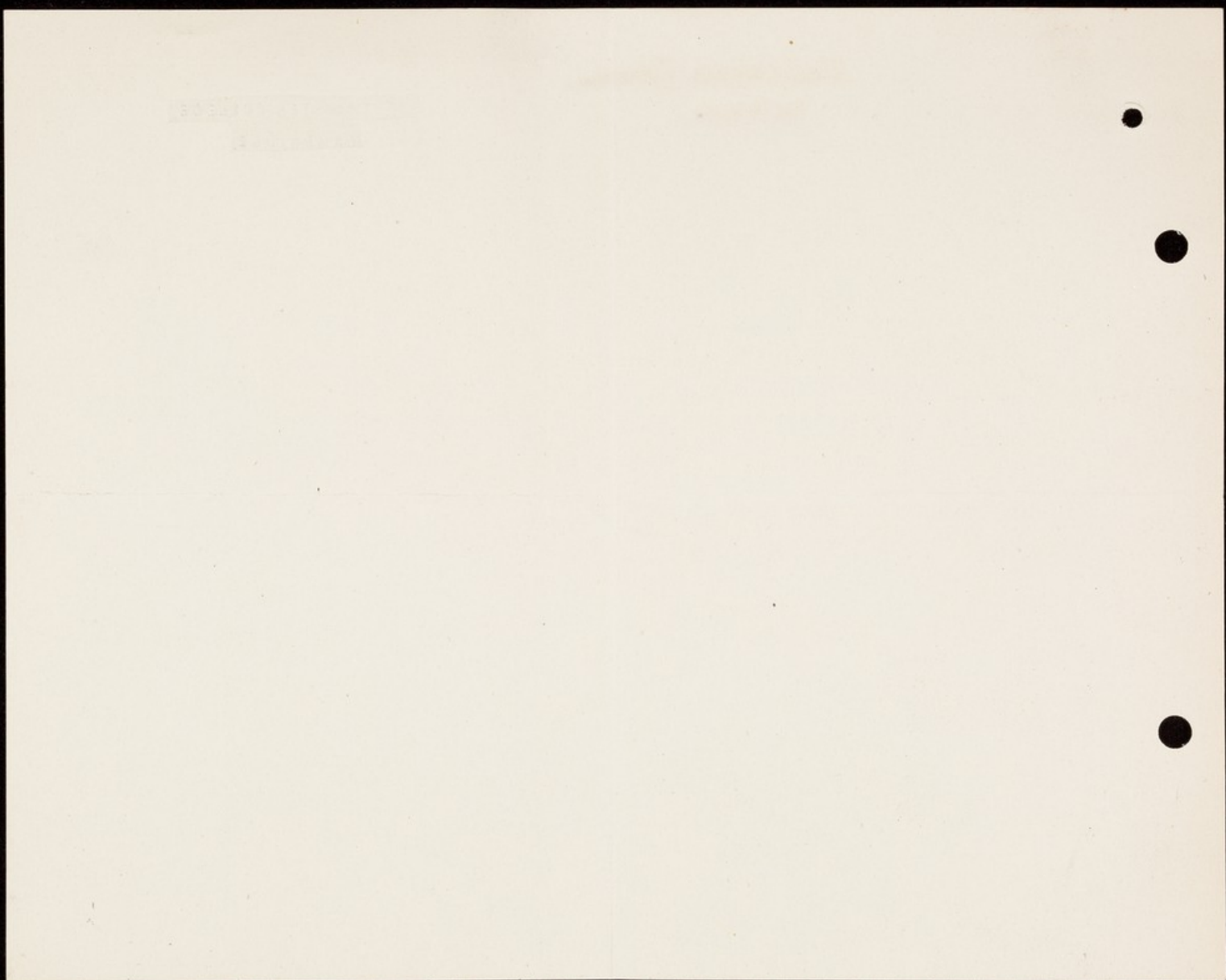

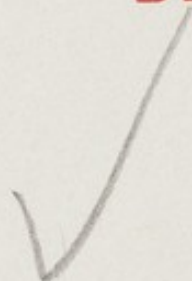

My Father's salary at present is £150 per annum. This salary will ~~be~~ decrease in a few weeks, & my Mother will be left with a little over £100 a year to live on, made up of £50 pension my Father is entitled to & about £60 p. a my Mother has of her own. My sister is a mistress

- I had determined however to pay the greater portion of the £48/- per week, & my mother the lesser. -

- I will remember when I wrote to you first that I asked for my Father's admission on a lower scale, but finding £48/- was the minimum, I brought them on those terms. Dr. J. M.

In consideration of the Directors of the York Retreat Hospital for the Insane agreeing to receive Rev James King of 2 Collegiate Crescent Sheffield as a patient in the said Hospital, I HEREBY UNDERTAKE AND AGREE with Richard Thompson of Dring etc, The Knight York the Treasurer of the said Hospital, to pay or cause to be paid, to the said Richard Thompson as such Treasurer, or to the Treasurer for the time being of the said Hospital, all such Sum or Sums of Money as shall from time to time be or become due and payable for the Lodging, Maintenance, and care of the said patient in the said Hospital, or whilst under the charge of the Authorities of the said Hospital, and all such Sum or Sums of Money as shall be paid or disbursed by or on behalf of the said Institution for any articles of Wearing Apparel, or other necessities, or extras supplied to, or provided for the said Patient, or the repairing or mending and washing of the articles of Wearing Apparel of the said Patient, so long as the said Patient shall continue in the said Hospital, or be under the charge of the Authorities of the said Hospital, and also to pay or cause to be paid the expenses in respect of the Funeral of the said Patient, in case the said Patient shall die in the said Hospital, or whilst under the charge of the Authorities of the said Hospital.
