on the subject yesterday,
when he told me that he
prefers to stay here for
the present— I believe
his intention is to go to

for a month or six weeks,

I remember Mr.
Mellors quite well and
never had any doubt
as to the nature of his
illness— I think he is
one of the cases referred
to in one of ^{your} reports as "an
unexpected recovery"

Dear Dr. Tate,

I have a proposal that we should take temporarily, on trial, a Mr. Moore who is staying with you. Perhaps I should explain that our Scarborough house will not be available for gentlemen until the middle of August, and if it is desirable for your patient to have the change, we should have more room and be able to accommodate him more comfortably if the visit was deferred until then. If the change is one which you think should take place immediately I dare say we could arrange for it, but we have rather an anxious lot of patients just now, and the staff is pretty closely occupied.

You will remember Mr. Mellors. After being here some time he had a remission, and went home so well that he could do poultry farming for some months. He then relapsed and had a severe attack of depression, when he was acutely suicidal. He is now better again, and is going home on trial this week. I do not think there is any doubt about the diagnosis, for he is a little facile, there is a little tremor of the lips, and his movements are a little awkward, but the paralytic symptoms are certainly advancing very slowly.
