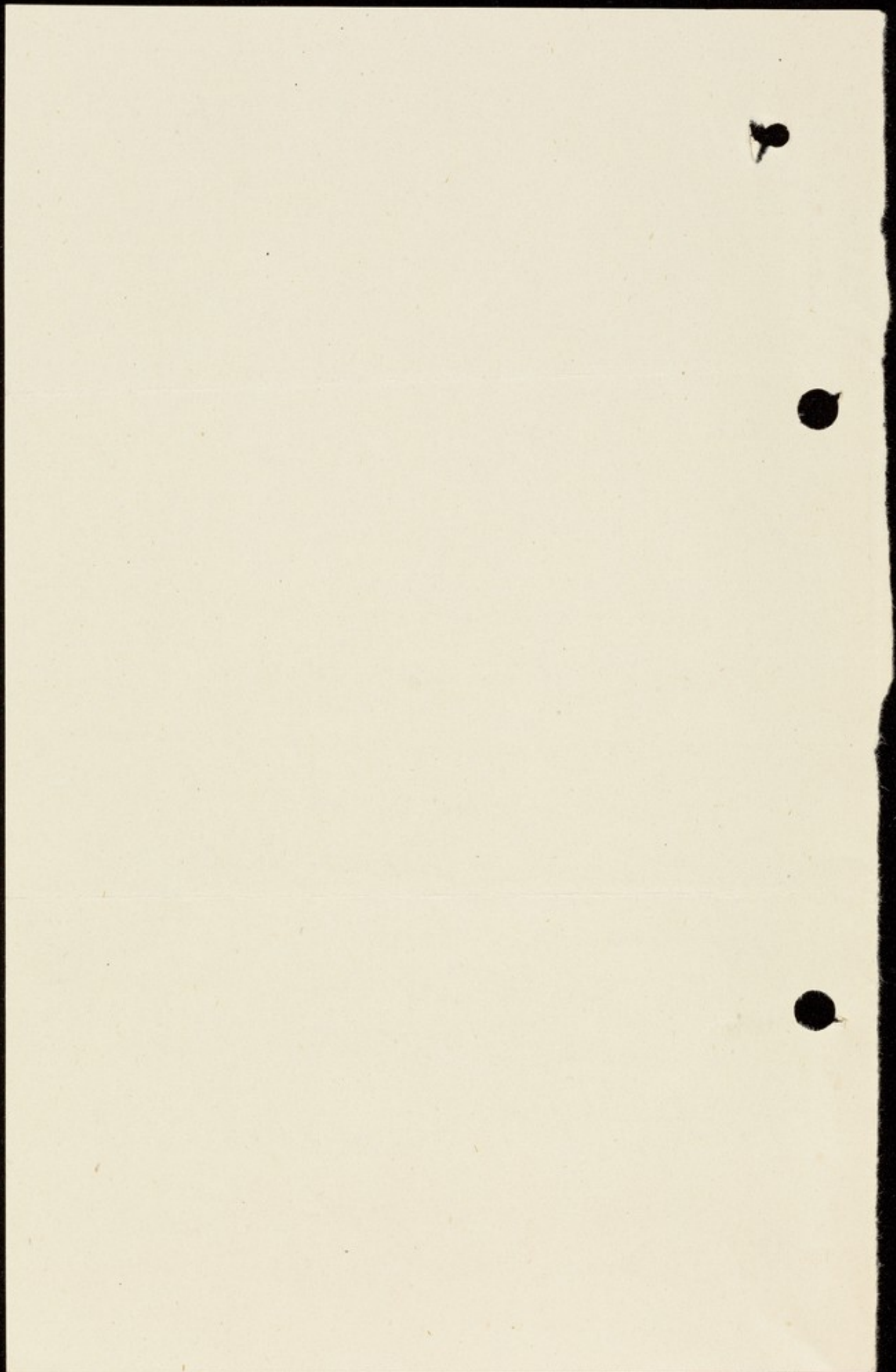

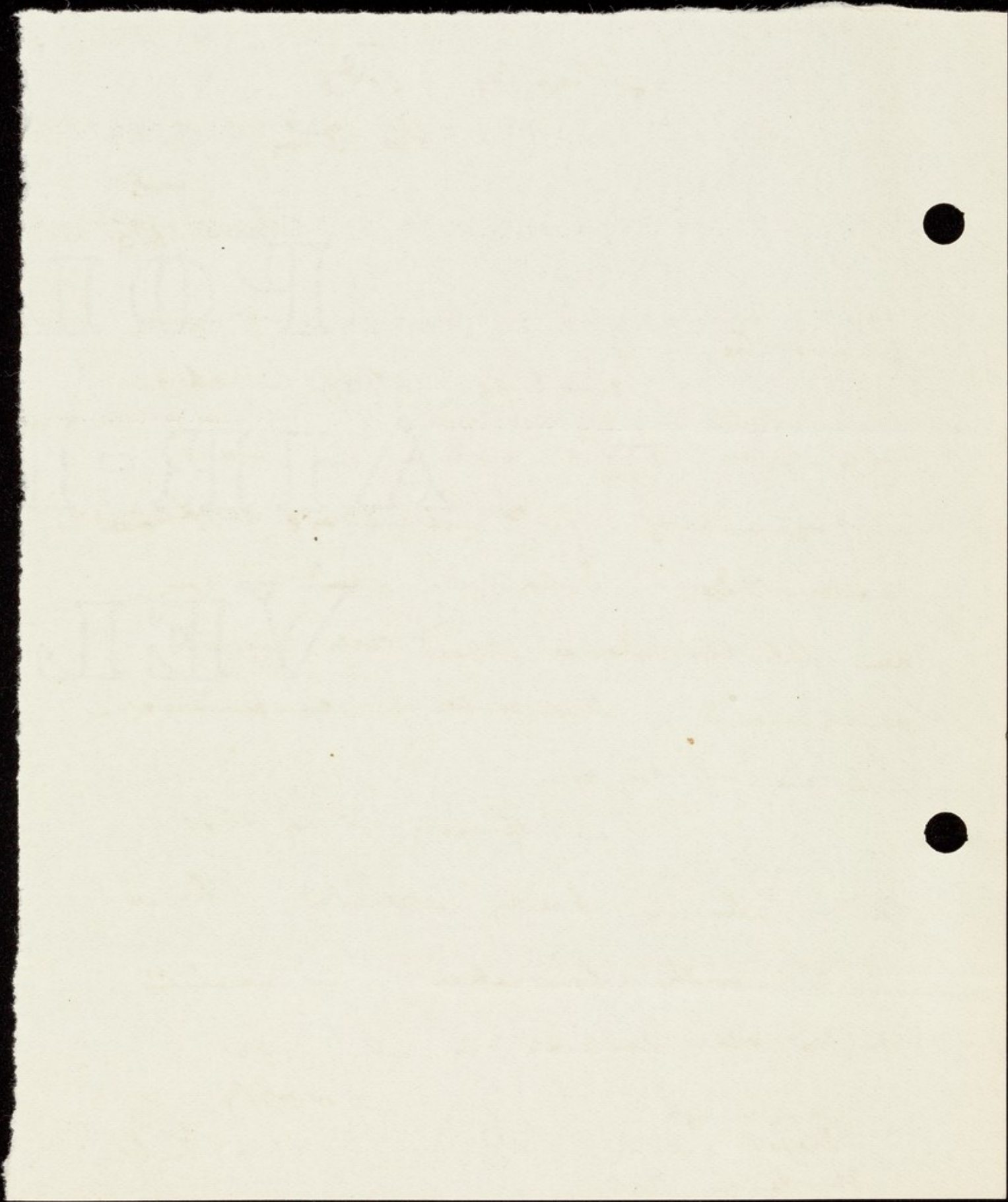

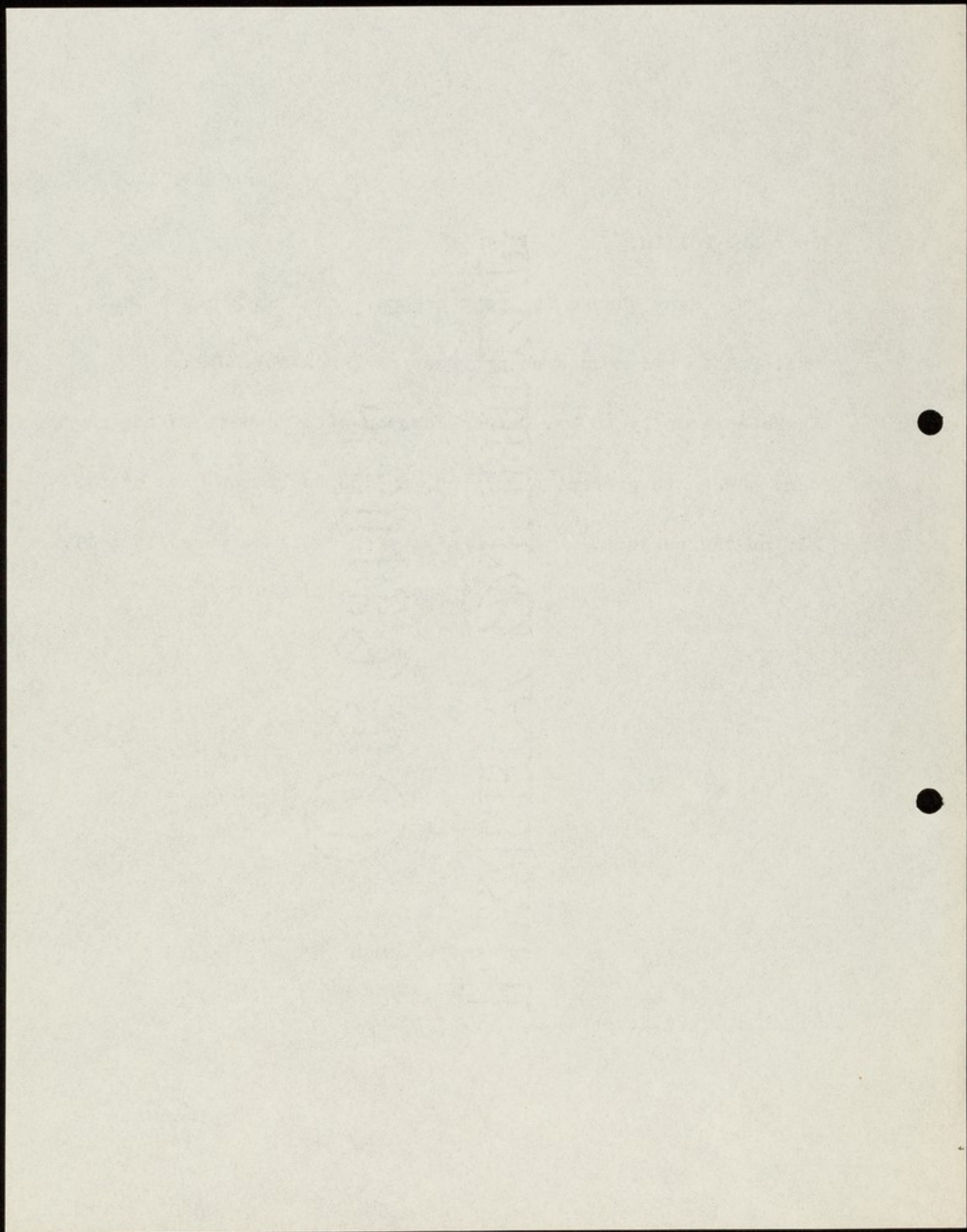

Dear Capper Johnson,

It is proposed that Mrs. Pullin should leave Throxenby Hall shortly, and I doubt whether a ~~much~~ longer stay there will result in much benefit. Unless the stay be very greatly prolonged it is not likely to do much more towards establishing self control.

One cannot but think it likely that under unfavourable circumstances she will at once relapse, and as you know the consequences of this will be exceedingly grave. Indeed I should not be at all surprised to hear if she relapsed that she had succeeded in committing suicide. Thus it is imperative that no stone be left unturned to prevent this, and the essential thing is that the whole family, father, mother and children should be entirely teetotal. I do not think just merely abstinence at home is sufficient, though of course this is important; but the whole attitude of the family should be really earnest and determined upon this matter. It would seem to me that they should become, if you like, fanatical teetotallers; and in some such course seems to lie the only hope of safety. Surely there is abundant reason for this. The mother has imperilled her life, and destroyed the happiness of the home. The father has developed gout, and as I promise

undermined his health, and I hear one son has become thoroughly unsteady. I need say no more, but I hope you will be able to show the family the absolute necessity for the course I am advising and that there is no middle course: that their future happiness depends entirely upon it.

You are quite at liberty to show this letter to Mr. Pullin.

It is clear that she has come here none too soon.

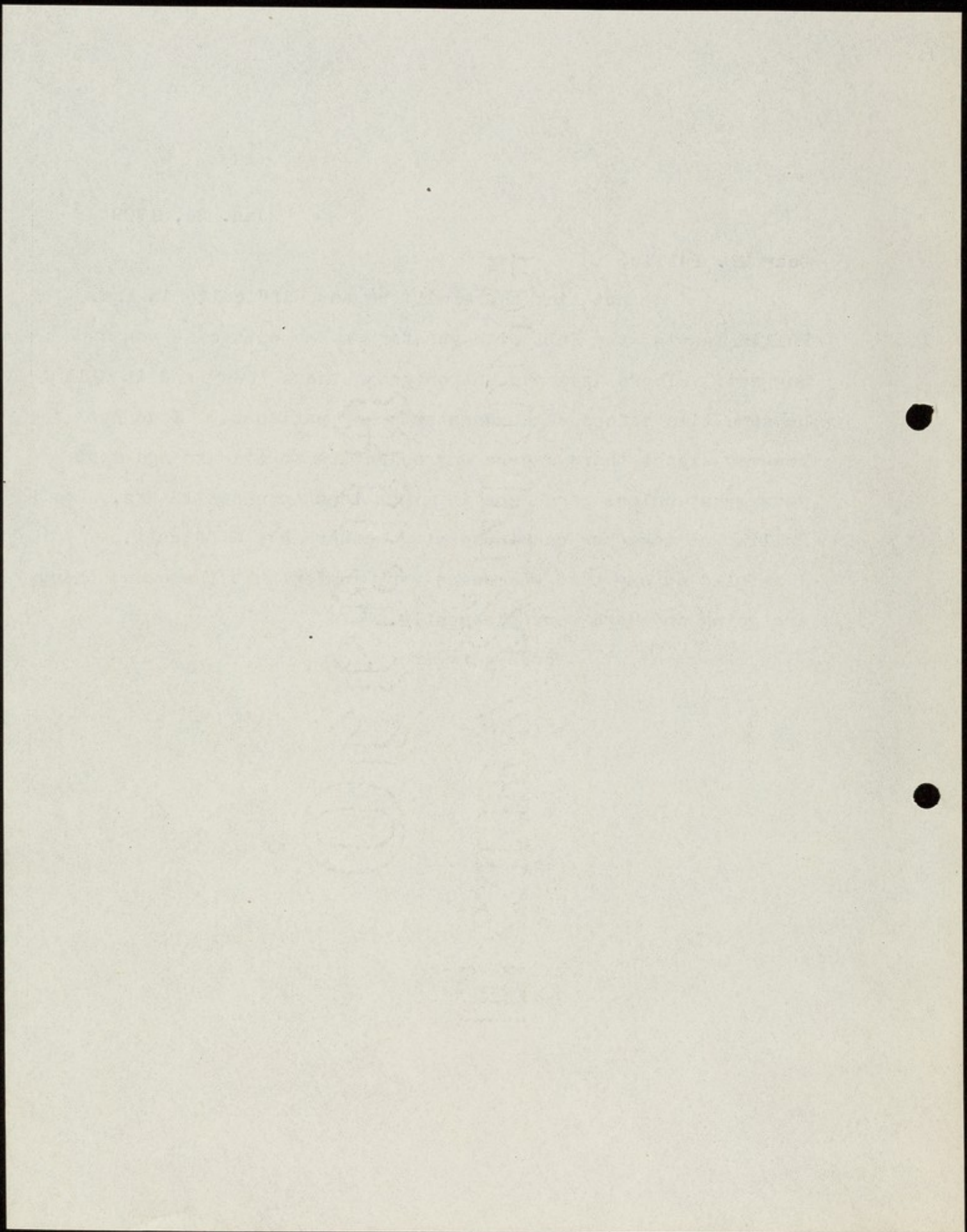

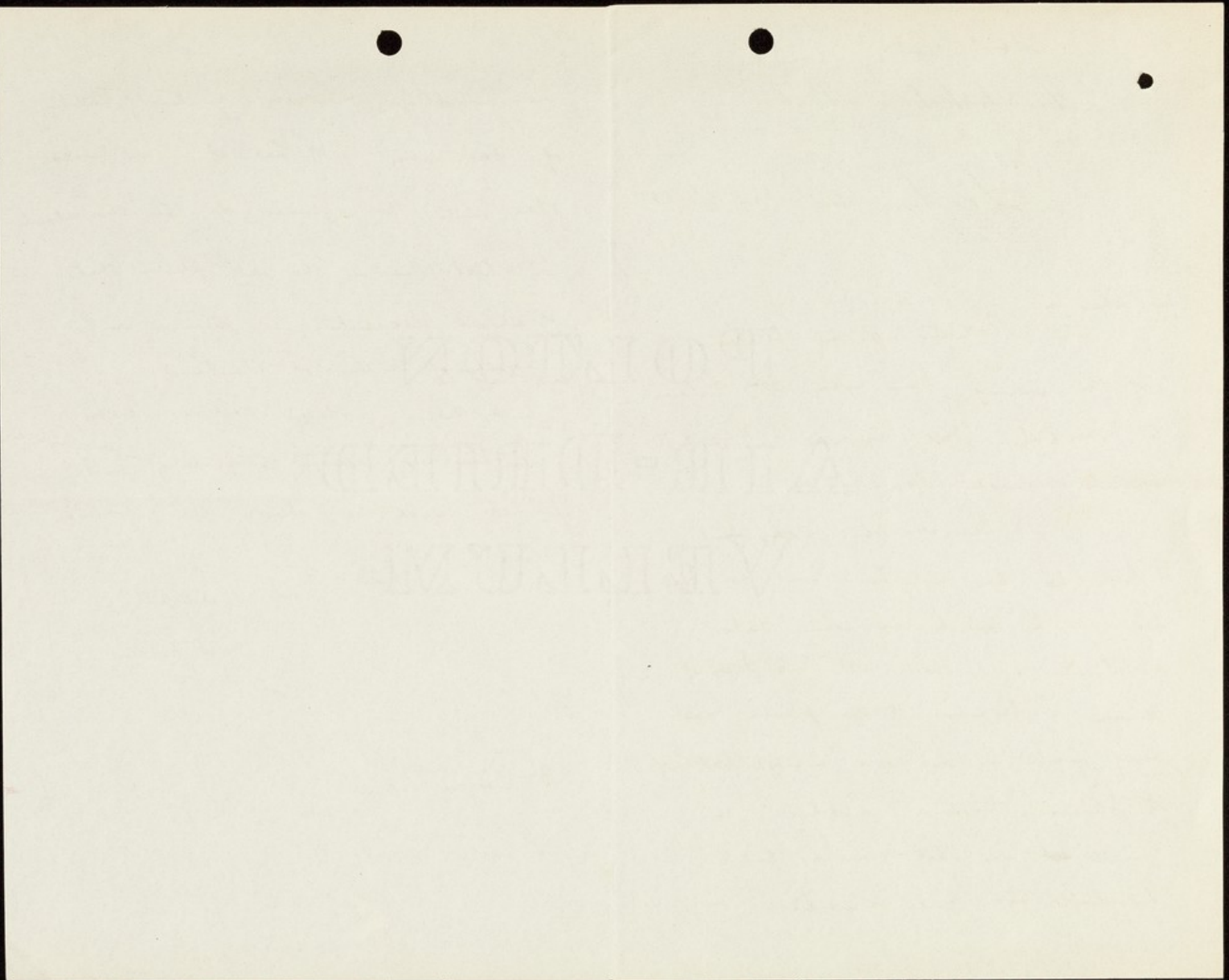
Following up my telegram
of this morning, I am taking Mrs. Kellin
to Throgmoly Hall tomorrow (Thursday)
afternoon, reaching Leeds 3.54.

I am very sorry to say that
though she has tried hard since you saw
her, she has had a very serious lapse.
On Sunday night she took two doses of
Merrill's Eucalyptus, & the following night
was pinched in one dose a fresh bottle of
St. John's Styracine mixture. The
result was that she was for a
considerable time quite demented. In

her rambles she was constantly talking
of doing away with herself, but except
when under the influence of the stimulants
— which somewhat she will get in spite
of all our precautions — there is no
suggestion of anything of the kind. I
think that a prolonged rest at Leeds,
with kindness, attention & sympathy, will
perhaps work the change she so much
desires.

Dear Mr. Pullin,

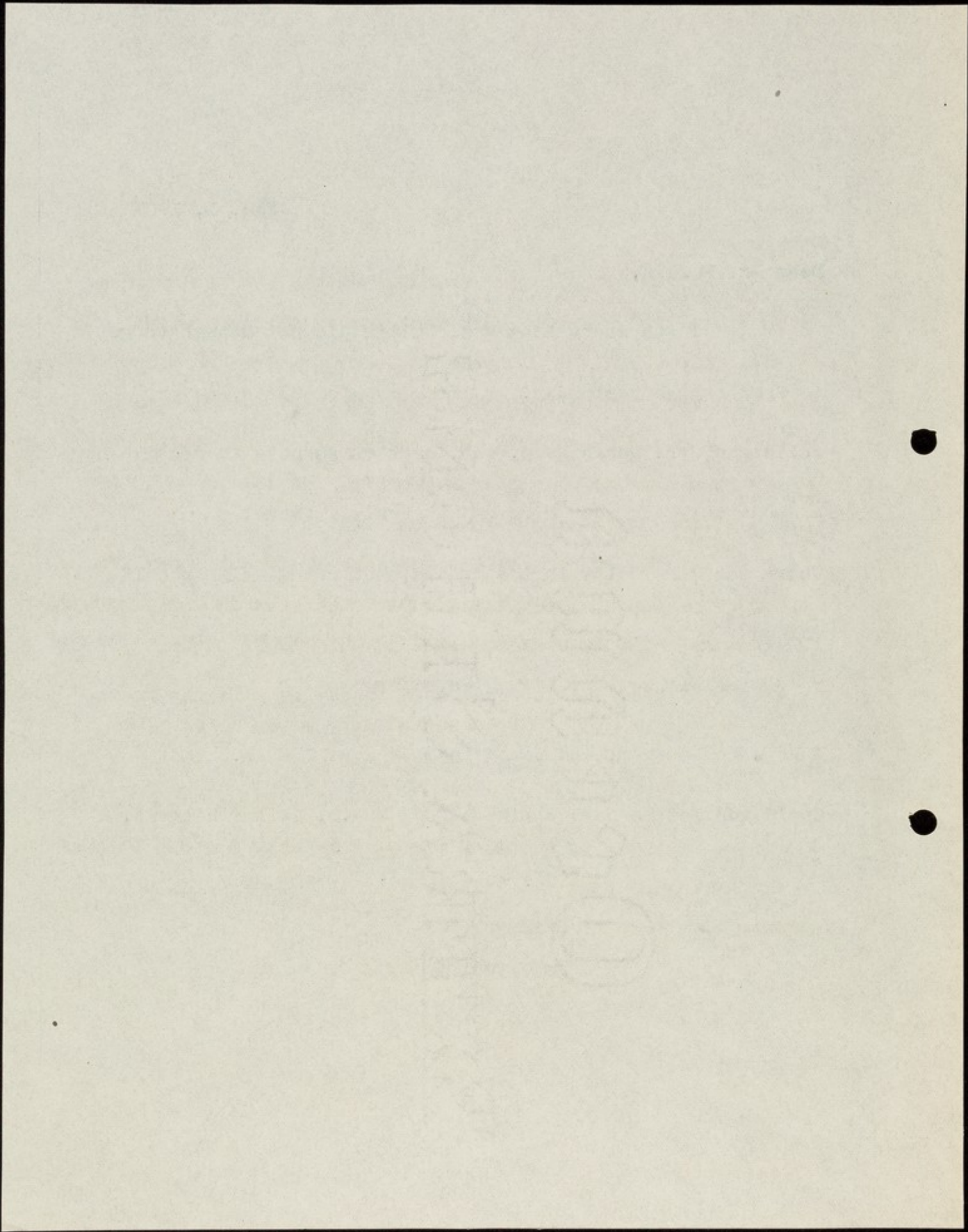

Dear Mr. Pullin,

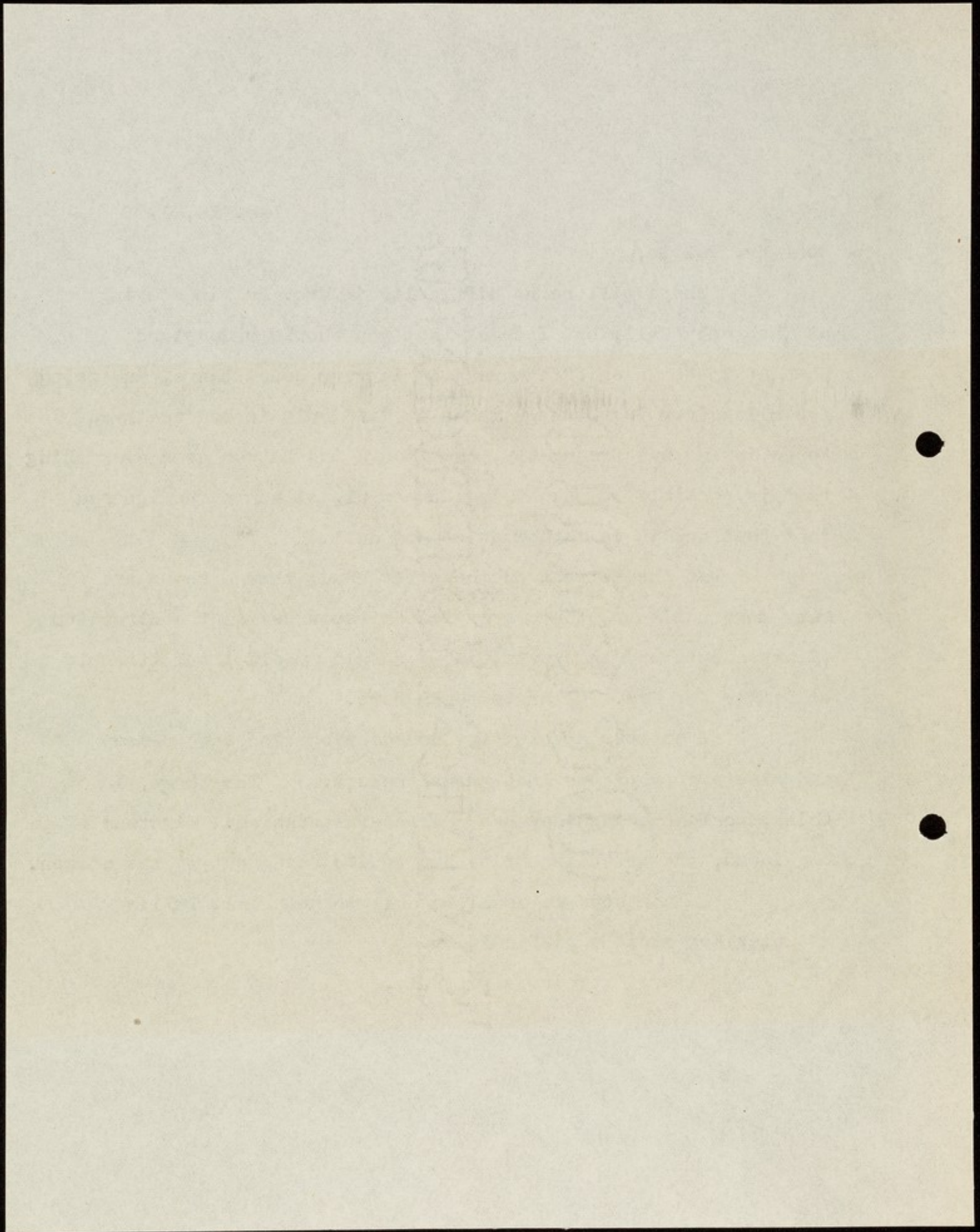
There will be no difficulty in Mrs. Pullin staying at Throxenby Hall; but I think that you should understand that at this season of the year it is very quiet there, and being two miles from Scarborough makes it difficult in bad weather to go in and out frequently, and though the Matron does everything that is possible to make things cheerful, it cannot be ignored that just now it is rather quiet and dull.

At the Retreat on the other hand, though there are many more patients, there are greater resources in the direction of amusements and interests; and I should myself think it would be better for Mrs. Pullin to begin here.

I enclose a Voluntary Boarder form for each place and also a copy of our last annual report. The terms, I think, would hope ~~2 1/2 guineas~~ she will be ~~at Throxenby Hall~~ instead of 3 guineas, the reduction being due to its being out of the season.

I much hope we shall be able to help Mrs. Pullin get over her serious difficulties.

YORK RETREAT HOSPITAL FOR THE INSANE.

In consideration of the Directors of the York Retreat Hospital for the Insane agreeing to receive Alice Pullin of Stanley Lodge,
Randhay, Leeds as a patient in the said Hospital, I HEREBY UNDERTAKE AND AGREE with Richard Thompson
of Dringate The Mount York the Treasurer of the said Hospital, to pay or cause to be paid, to the said Richard Thompson
as such Treasurer, or to the Treasurer for the time being of the said Hospital, all such Sum or Sums of Money as shall from time to time be or become due and payable for the Lodging, Maintenance, and care of the said patient in the said Hospital, or whilst under the charge of the Authorities of the said Hospital, and all such Sum or Sums of Money as shall be paid or disbursed by or on behalf of the said Institution for any articles of Wearing Apparel, or other necessaries, or extras supplied to, or provided for the said Patient, or the repairing or mending and washing of the articles of Wearing Apparel of the said Patient, so long as the said Patient shall continue in the said Hospital, or be under the charge of the Authorities of the said Hospital, and also to pay or cause to be paid the expenses in respect of the Funeral of the said Patient, in case the said Patient shall die in the said Hospital, or whilst under the charge of the Authorities of the said Hospital. AND I FURTHER AGREE to pay Interest at the rate of five per cent. per annum on any accounts due from me as above, which shall not have been discharged within Twenty-eight days from the receipt of such account from the Treasurer, Secretary, or Clerk of the said Hospital. AND I ALSO UNDERTAKE AND AGREE, at my own expense, to remove the said Patient from the said Hospital within Fourteen days after receiving Notice in writing from the Treasurer, Secretary or Clerk for the time being of the said Hospital, requiring such removal.
