SIR,

I am directed by the Commissioners in Lunacy to inform you that the first Special Report and Certificate required under the above Sections, for the purpose of continuing the Reception Order in this case, not having been received, the Commissioners assume that they have not been duly sent, and if this is the case the Reception Order will expire on the 2nd prox. and notice of the Patient's discharge on that date should be sent to this Office. The authority for discharge should be given as "by operation of Law, the Reception Order not having been properly continued."

If the Patient remains of unsound mind, and is a proper case for care and treatment, h further detention must be legalised by fresh Order and Certificates, which should be obtained by the date of expiry of the old Reception Order. In case the Patient cannot be re-certified by that date the cause of the delay should be at once communicated to the Commissioners.

A Patient who is dangerous to h self or others should on no account be set at large, and, to avoid any risk, the Commissioners will not object to the examination for re-certification taking place in the Institution.
