YORK RETREAT HOSPITAL FOR THE INSANE.

In consideration of the Directors of the York Retreat Hospital for the Insane agreeing to receive Jane Rounding of _____ as a patient in the said Hospital, I HEREBY UNDERTAKE

AND AGREE with Richard Thompson of Dringcliffe, The Mount, York the Treasurer of the said Hospital, to pay or cause to be paid, to the said Richard Thompson as such Treasurer, or to the Treasurer for the time being of the said Hospital, all such Sum or Sums of Money as shall from time to time be or become due and payable for the Lodging, Maintenance, and care of the said patient in the said Hospital, or whilst under the charge of the Authorities of the said Hospital, and all such Sum or Sums of Money as shall be paid or disbursed by or on behalf of the said Institution for any articles of Wearing Apparel, or other necessaries, or extras supplied to, or provided for the said Patient, or the repairing or mending and washing of the articles of Wearing Apparel of the said Patient, so long as the said Patient shall continue in the said Hospital, or be under the charge of the Authorities of the said Hospital, and also to pay or cause to be paid the expenses in respect of the Funeral of the said Patient, in case the said Patient shall die in the said Hospital, or whilst under the charge of the Authorities of the said Hospital. AND I FURTHER AGREE to pay interest at the rate of five per cent. per annum on any accounts due from me as above, which shall not have been discharged within Twenty-eight days from the receipt of such account from the Treasurer, Secretary or Clerk of the said Hospital. AND I ALSO UNDERTAKE AND AGREE, at my own expense, to remove the said Patient from the said Hospital within Fourteen days after receiving Notice in writing from the Treasurer, Secretary or Clerk for the time being of the said Hospital, requiring such removal.

In the event of the death, removal, or discharge of a patient before the expiry of the quarter covered by the last payment, the surplus amount is returned by the Retreat.

Miss Jane Rounding

- Aug 8th Pt in bed all day. Restless & agitated. Constantly asking for her clothes. Most troublesome over food. Spoon fed.
D. & C. apt given tonight.
- 9th Most troublesome all day. Constantly out of bed & wanting her clothes. Resistive & struggling. No result from apt.
S. Enema given. Result fairly good. Constipated.
- 11th Patient becoming more excited & deluded. Says she can't stay here & that every one is talking about her.
Appears to be hearing voices. Is having very little sleep. (See chart) Continually asking for medicine
- Aug 12th No sleep & very troublesome all night, in & out of bed. Constantly in & out of bed during the day rushing for windows & doors, Tied a stocking round her neck & said she wanted to kill herself. Very troublesome with food & impossible to take temperature etc.
- Aug 13th No sleep & very troublesome all night, very resistive, spiteful, biting, running for the doors - asking for a knife to stab herself. refused nourishment
- Aug 14th No sleep, very agitated & interfering. but kept her bed. Very resistive all day, very troublesome with food & constantly rushing to get out of the doors.
- Aug 15th Slept 30 minutes during the night, very restless & agitated continually jumping out of bed.
Had a dreadful day rushing for the doors & struggling with the nurses & threatening to kill them, very troublesome with food.
- Aug 16th Slept 3 1/2 hours, very restless & agitated.
Very troublesome all day struggling each time the gallery door is opened, refused dinner but took tea herself.
- Aug 17th Slept 4 1/2 hours during the night.
Fairly quiet all a.m took breakfast & a little dinner but dreadfully afternoon & evening & very troublesome to bathe.
- Aug 18th Slept 5 hours during the night, much the same all day, takes a little food each meal but not quite sufficient. Aperiient given N. P. & all day.

Miss Jane Rounding.

- Aug 19th Slept $6\frac{1}{2}$ hours. ^{all night.} but passed urine says she has not to do it.
Very restless all morning troublesome when doors are opened. passed urine 4 or 5 o.
- 20th Quiet day on the whole but very resistive when wanted to do anything taken food fairly well
- 23rd Very troublesome all the day climbing the railings of the first staircase & seeking to the doors on the gallery when opened
- 25th Very troublesome & resistive has not passed urine all night & day. Last bath passed result of urine
- 27th Very resistive & troublesome with her feet constantly seeking to the doors
- 28th Very troublesome refused Breakfast, dinner & Tea, took her supper
- 31st Very resistive, restless & agitated at times
- Sept 3rd On the whole a better day, not so resistive, has taken her food well, very troublesome in the night, jumping out of bed, trying to bite & scratch the nurses when put into her bed
- Sept 9th Very troublesome & frightfully resistive, struggling each time the lower gallery is open for any one to pass through. Sleeps & eats fairly well, troublesome with her bowels & urine
- Sept 17th No change during the week, still struggling to get off the lower gallery each time the door is open, & will not let either patients or the nurses read, sew or play the piano on the gallery, & object to the night nurse

reading & sewing when she is awake. gets out of bed
& then tries to take it away from nurse.

Sept 24th Still very resistive, struggles against anything &
everything that she is wanted to do, sleeping well &
taking her food well, but there is a struggle to get her
to the table each meal

Oct 3rd Still resistive but not so bad as a week ago.
Has been tried on the front gallery wearing
her own dark dress but was very untidy &
would not keep her hair tidy - when we
tried to comb it she struggled & got her
blouse down & had to go back on the lower.
Has been very good over her bath the last
few days.

Oct 10th Less resistive at times, sleeping & taking
food very well indeed.

" 18th Patient a trifle better has been round the
grounds for the first time & talked a little
more than usual, is wearing her own
dress now & keeps herself more tidy.

" 24th No improvement to report. Patient went round
the grounds again & was very troublesome
& wanted to get away from nurse, wrote
a short letter to her sister which took her a
long time to write, very restless &
agitated at times & carries her head on one side
as if she had a stiff neck.

Oct 31st Very restless & agitated at times, sleeping 5-6-4 y
hours every night & taking food well.

Nov 4th Very troublesome at times & trying to get off the lower
gallery when the door was open, constantly asking us
to let her go home to her mother & father

Nov 14th Not quite so agitated or troublesome, on front gallery for
one day helped to sweep the dormitory & sat on the

Fairly good all the week. went to Sunday Evening meeting.

Nov 28th

keep me until Christmas & then let me go home.

Still wanting to go home at Christmas. no change

Dec 5th 1915

in her condition takes food & cups well.

Continues much the same.

Dec 12th 1915

no change in patient's condition

Dec 19th 1915

went to Christmas eve party, was very good, not worried

" 26th 1915

quite so much the last day or so.

Sleeping well, takes her food very well. rather restless when

Jan 2nd 1916

wanted to go out. sometimes there is a struggle to get her things on.

Miss Rounding has been a little better, going to bring Hall

Jan 9th 1916.

for meals & sitting on the front gallery.

did not want to go to the bring Hall at first but goes

without any troubles now.

Miss Rounding seems to be improving but very slowly, goes

Jan 16th 1916.

down to meals in bring Hall. Knits & plays the piano

occasionally, walks round the grounds but will not

go to prayers or meeting.

Still continues to improve slowly, but does not

Jan 23rd 1916.

like to go out for exercise, helps nicely with

the house work, does a little knitting & enters

into conversation more with the nurses.

Often talks to herself & says she did it when

she was well.

Feb: 6th Patient continues to improve slowly, attends prayers
& Sunday evening meeting, does a little housework
& attends to the plants and takes an interest in them.

March 5th Patient talks a good deal to herself - when asked
to do certain things she says that she is frightened
but does not say of what. She does housework &
needlework & enters into conversation with the
other ladies. She mutters a good deal to herself.

" 14th Patient continues about the same - stands staring
vacantly at times with her head inclined to one side -
has not said that she felt afraid for some days -
goes out country walking to all entertainments and
meetings held in the house. She helps with housework
& needlework & is very willing. - eats & sleeps well - was
visited by her sister yesterday & was very upset
because she was not allowed to go away with her.

" 19th Patient has been much brighter since she was told
that she was going to Scarborough & probably home
from there - still mutters to herself - says "I wish I
had never said it." Weight. 8 st 13 3/4 lbs.
