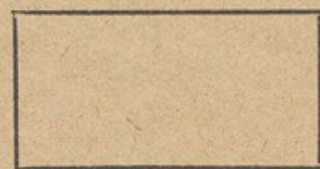

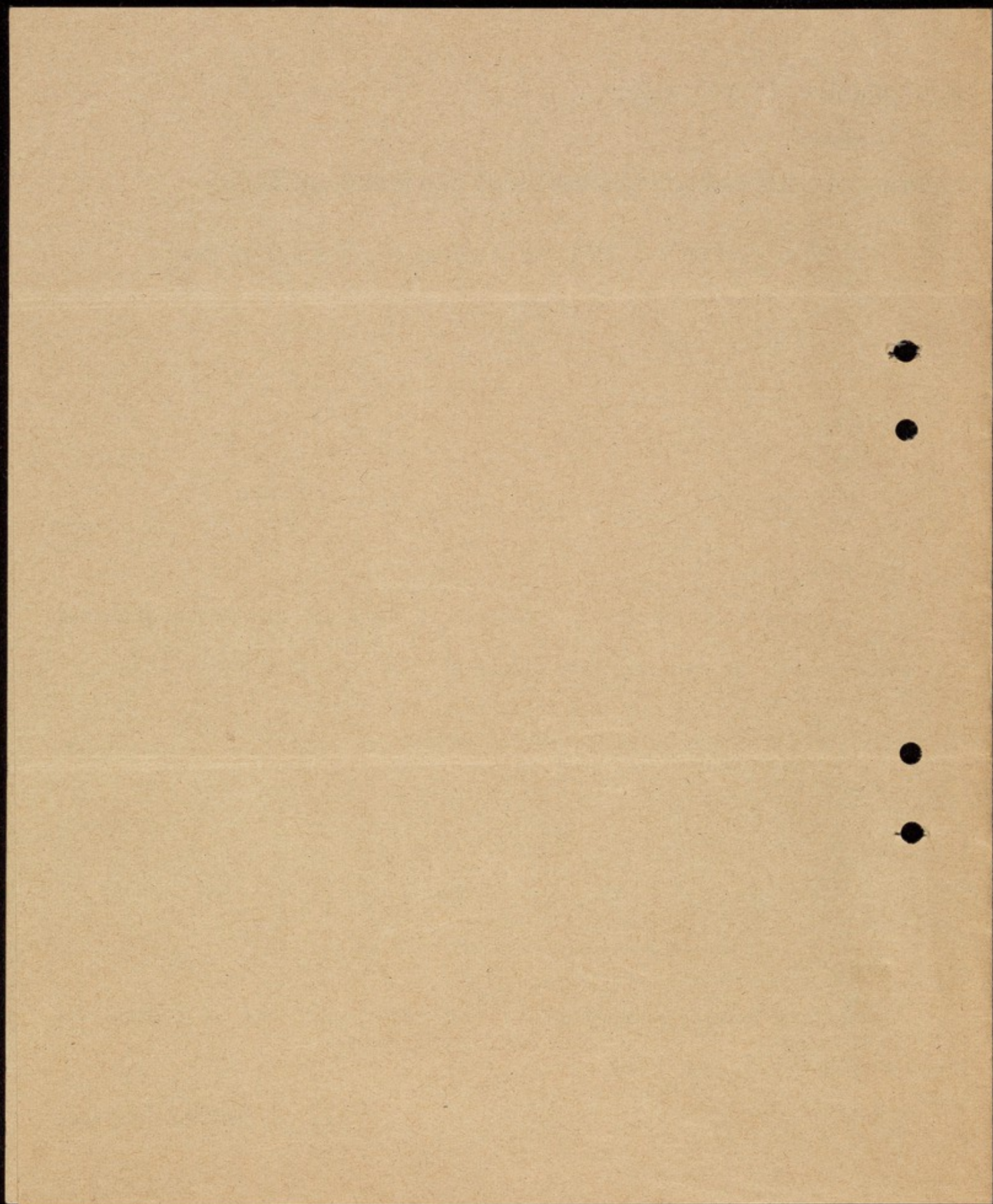

Dear Friend,

With reference to Henry Steer, there will be no difficulty in his being received at our lowest recommended rate, which is 12/- weekly, and I enclose the usual form, which you will no doubt be able to sign and return. If possible it should be received before the meeting of the Committee on the 20th inst.

With reference to Old Age pensions, this point has never been settled so far as I know. It is clear that patients in public asylums cannot receive a pension, but I believe it can be argued that private patients in Hospitals such as the Retreat are eligible. Would it not be well to make application before Henry Steer comes to the Retreat and have the matter settled one way or the other? Of course if your Monthly Meeting considered Henry Steer an annuitant he will be disqualified, but I suppose the grants from the M.M. can be discontinued at any time.

N.B.—The rate includes the charge for Board, Lodging, and Medical care, and is payable quarterly in advance. Disbursements by the Institution on behalf of patients, and other exceptional expenses are charged in the following quarter's account.

In the event of the death, removal, or discharge of a patient before the expiry of the quarter covered by the last payment, the surplus amount is returned by the Retreat.

The general assembly is held in the month of June or July of each year. It is the duty of the assembly to elect the members of the executive committee and to receive reports from the same. It also has the power to amend the constitution and to dissolve the organization.

The executive committee is composed of the president, vice-president, secretary, and treasurer. It is the duty of the executive committee to carry out the policies of the assembly and to report to the assembly at its next meeting.

The president is the chief executive officer of the organization. He presides at all meetings of the assembly and the executive committee. He is also the representative of the organization in all official matters.

The vice-president is the second highest officer of the organization. He presides in the absence of the president and performs such other duties as may be assigned to him by the assembly.

The secretary is the chief administrative officer of the organization. He keeps the minutes of all meetings and maintains the records of the organization. He is also responsible for the correspondence of the organization.

The treasurer is the chief financial officer of the organization. He is responsible for the collection and disbursement of funds and for the preparation of financial statements.

The members of the organization are entitled to vote at all meetings of the assembly and to hold office in the organization. They are also entitled to the same rights and privileges as are enjoyed by the members of similar organizations.

The organization is a non-profit organization and its assets are held in trust for the benefit of the members. It is prohibited from engaging in any business that would result in the private inurement of any individual.
