





Dear Sir,

A few days ago I wrote to Dr. W. R. Thompson explaining that Mr. Wallace was very confused and unable to realise his position.

Although he is a voluntary boarder at present, he is quite unfit to remain in that capacity and must either be removed or certified, as he does not understand where he is nor can he converse or give any intelligible account of himself . I fear the condition is a scrious one, as there seems little doubt but that he is suffering from general paralysis of the insane. He presents several of the nervous symptoms characteristic of that disease, and he is already rather unsteady on his feet. This you probably know is a progressive disease, and recovery is not to be expected. It means a great deal of care and nursing, and I should recommend you to carefully consider the general position, and whether it is desirable for Mr. Wallace to remain at the Retreat. I am told he signed a cheque the other day, but this, strictly speaking, ought not to have been allowed as he is unfit to transact business; and unless some arrangement can be made privately to manage the affairs there would seem to be no alternative but to apply to the Court for the appointment



Dear Sir,

Your patient, Mr. Wallace, is not improving and he is often extremely muddled and confused. He hears "voices" and he says he heard persons here saying that his friends had taken all his money.

His friends have sent a draft for him to sign but he declines point blank.

I fear the outlook is gloomy; he has several of the physical signs of G.P.I.. We have not examined his Cerebro-spinal fluid but I have little doubt as to the diagnosis.

His mental state is so muddled that he is quite unfit to remain as a voluntary patient and consequently if he is to stay he must be certified. I do not know the financial position of the family but the patient himself looks as if our lowest rate of 63/- per week is more than can be rightly afforded.

Perhaps you will be able to see the relatives and talk things over with them.
