

Dear Sir,

We act as family Solicitors for Mr. Warren. We have seen Mrs. Warren in reference to his unfortunate condition, and she has handed us your letter with form of Agreement.

We are taking steps to have Mr. Warren and his property taken under control of the Court. Meanwhile we think it right to let you know that his income would not admit of so large a fee as that proposed, and we do not think having regard to the nature of the Estate that the Lord Chancellor would give maintenance at that figure, as provision has also to be made for Mrs. Warren. Would you kindly let us know the lowest fee that could be taken, to enable him to remain in your care, in order that the matter may be duly submitted to the Court. If Mr. Warren's state permitted we think it would be most convenient that he should be removed to Ireland, but that course is we understand out of the question at present.
