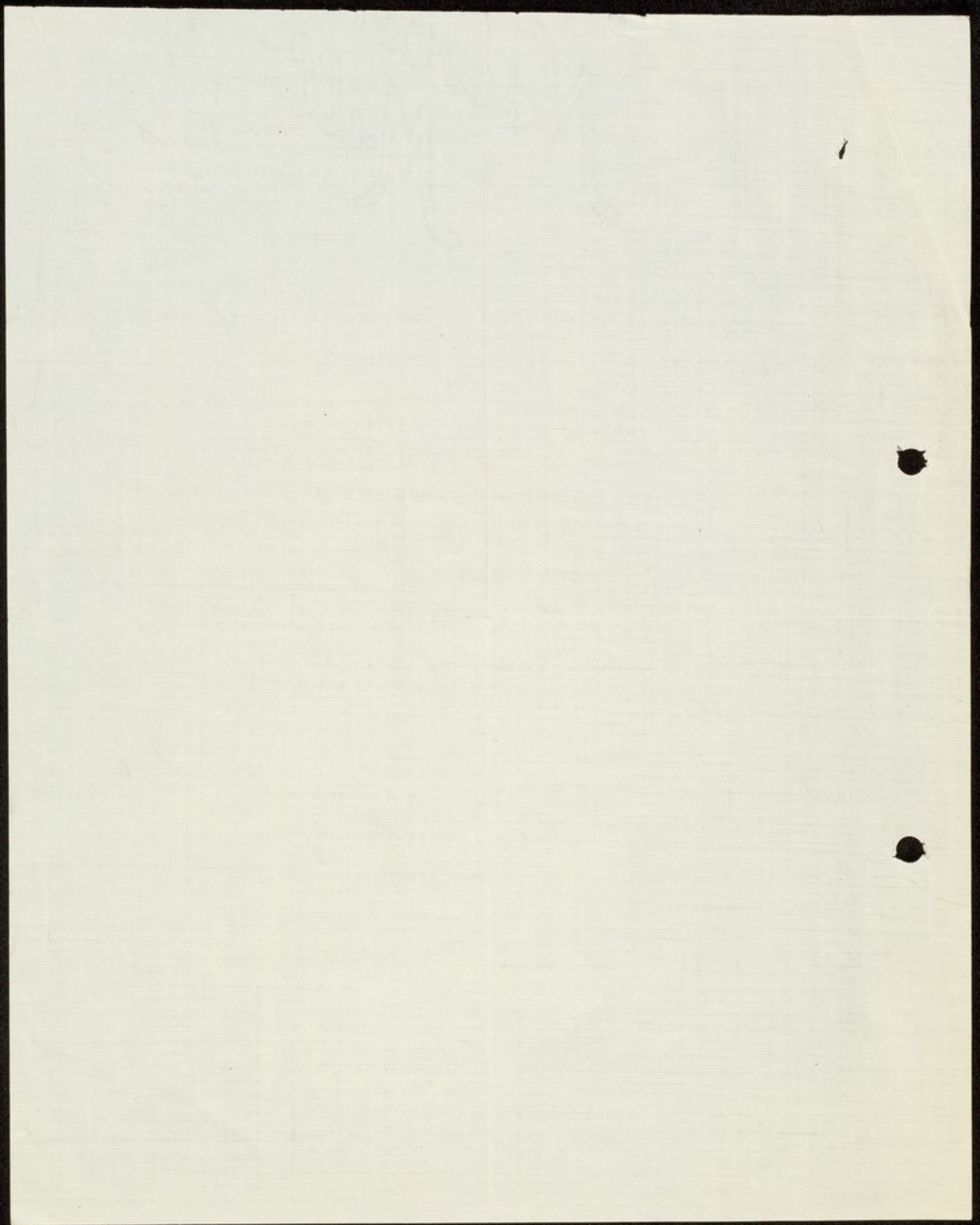
Dear Dr. Pevce.

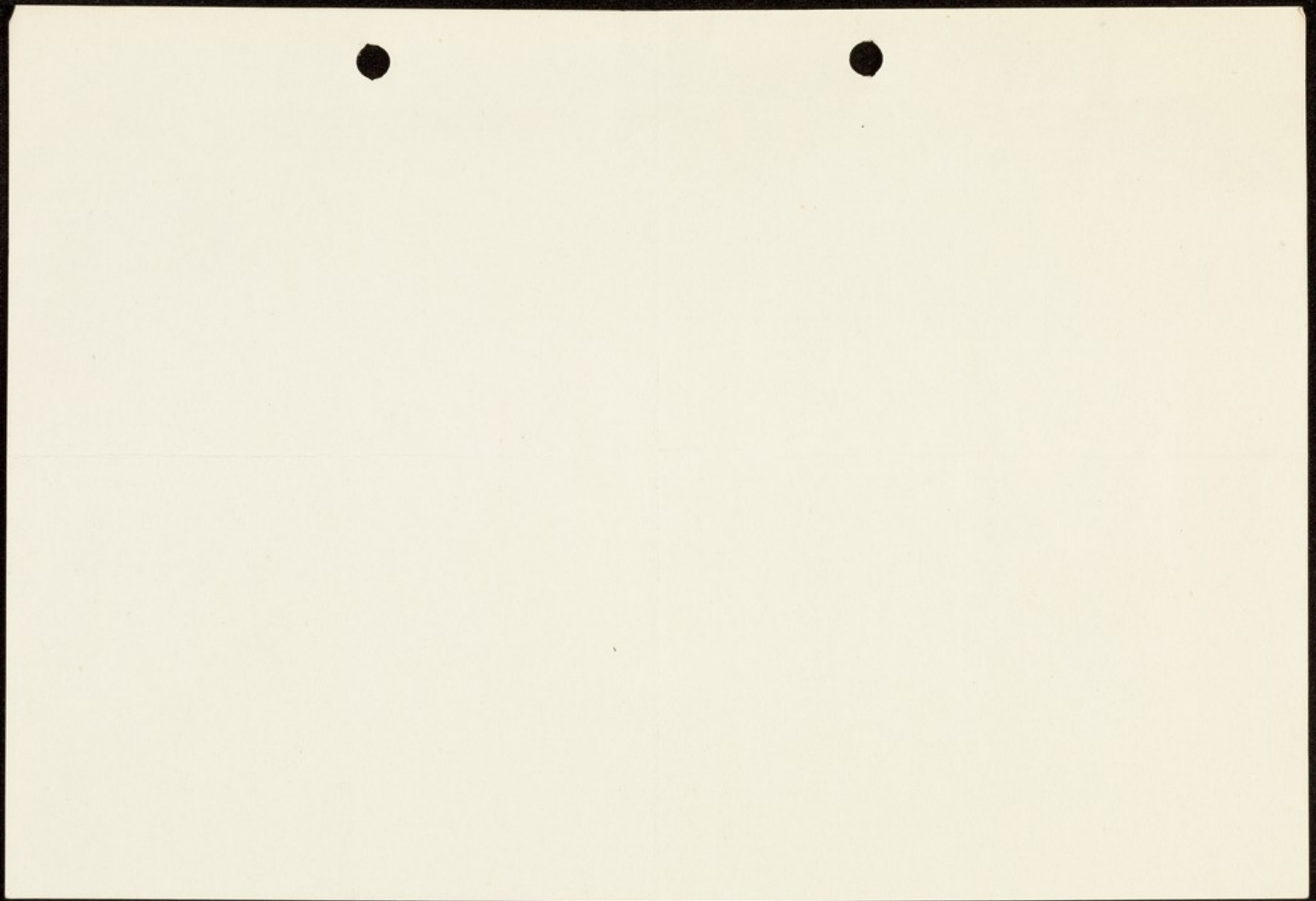
