Dear Mr. Smith,

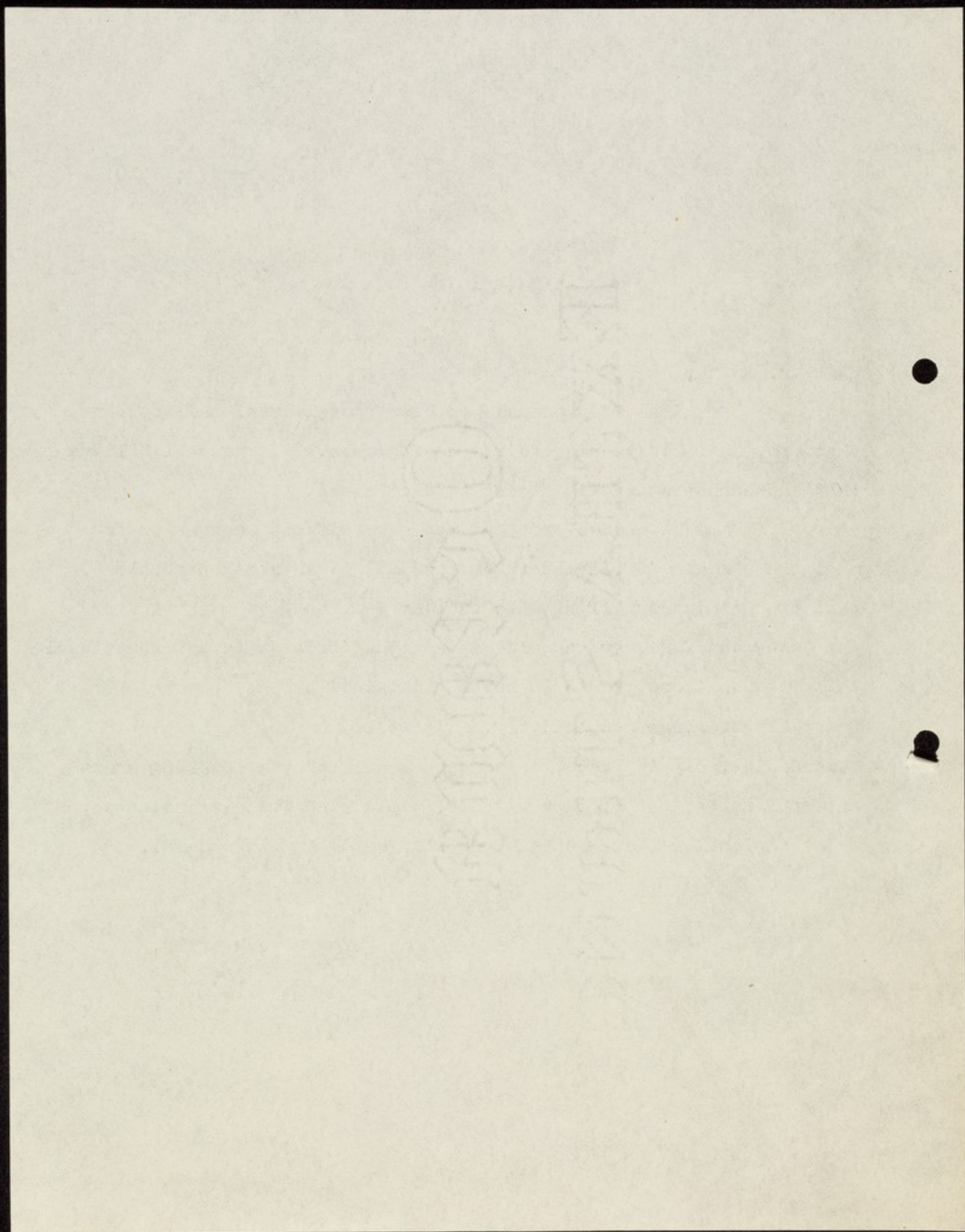
I am very pleased to have your letter, and to hear that Mrs. Smith is keeping fairly comfortable. I can well believe that she cannot stand any stress or excitement.
