
With regard to Wigin's psoriasis, I have treated him off and on for it for the past 8 years, but nothing seems to do him very much good.

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

Dear Madam,

In reply to your letter of enquiry I do not think a visit will do Mr. Wigin any harm whatever, and it is possible that it might do him good. is long since he has seen anyone from Harrogate, the last being Dr. Johns, and he has improved a good deal sonce then. If you come over, however, you must not be disappointed if you find him quite unable to sustain a conversation, and he may possibly be very excited and even noisy. He will certainly know you, but unless he is much better than usual it is impossible to retain his attention for more than a moment or two. Thus when I told him that you had returned from Germany he seemed to understand, but his mind wandered away immediately and he took no further notice of the matter. The objection to coming is that you may have quite a painful interview, and it will certainly be distressing for you to find your brother in such a wandering state of mind. I should like to know if you are likely to come so that we can arrange the interview as comfortably as possible.

We think that your brother is slowly improving. He is still pale, but he looks much

better, and he is much easier to nurse than he was when he first came.


