Dear Adamson,

We have a man here about sixty years of age with universal eczema, which has been a troublesome matter for some months. It began with an ordinary weeping inflammation over various parts of the body. Several things were tried for this, but it steadily spread. For some weeks the weeping has ceased and there is a persistent and extreme exfoliation of the skin in scales, limbs, trunk, face and scalp, and he is in a most deplorable state. We have tried continuous baths, calomine lotion, extensive applications of tar, reduction of nitrogenous intake, arsenic internally, and we are now at the end of our resources, and I, therefore, am venturing to appeal to you, as the poor man is very miserable and the irritation is sometimes extreme. At the commencement of his illness there was a very marked excess of urates, at least I suppose it was urates, a copious precipitate appearing with the addition of a little acid, clearing off on warming. Otherwise we have not been able to find anything amiss. He is a patient who has been at the Retreat for many years, and he certainly has not lived an irregular life or eaten too much.

I had hoped to call to see you before this, as I was expecting to go up to see my daughter, who is a student at the school for Medicine for women, but I doubt if I shall

Dear Coulter,

It is exceedingly kind of you to invite Mr. Wyllys to come to see you and I have no doubt whatever that it will give him a great deal of pleasure. He is unfortunately troubled with a diffused inflammation of the skin which is very troublesome and we have not succeeded in curing it. There is no reason to think that this is of an infectious nature, and I see no reason why it should prevent him coming to see you. I am hoping on Sunday that a doctor from Leeds will be able to advise me as to what kind of treatment to adopt.

Though I readily understand that you are inviting Mr. Wyllys purely out of kindness and do not wish any payment, yet there seems to be no reason why you should not receive the same payment which we do, namely £1. 7. 6. per week.

As regards the journey I should almost think that in a case of this kind it would be better that he should go by motor. I think under the circumstances I would try and get a grant to cover expenses of this from Miss E. V. Walker's Holiday Fund.

I am very glad indeed to hear that Mr. Davies is slowly improving, and that he has at last been able to see his poor wife. I think that you have done very well for

him, and it will be a great relief to the family if he can
only recover sufficiently to return home.


