### RULES AND REGULATIONS

OF THE

### LIBRARY.

- I. That the Library open daily at Ten o'clock in the Morning until Four o'clock in the Afternoon, from the 1st of September to the 31st of March; and from the same hour in the Morning until Five o'clock in the Afternoon, from the 1st of April to the 31st of July (Sundays, Good Friday, Midsummer-day, Michaelmas-day, Christmas-day, and Fast and Thanksgiving days by Proclamation, excepted).
- II. That the Library be closed during the month of August, and from the 6th to the 12th of November, both inclusive.
- III. That every Member of the Corporation has the right of personal admission into the Library, and the privilege of introducing a Visitor, either personally or by letter.
- IV. That the name of every Visitor, with the name of the Member by whom he is introduced, be entered in a book to be kept for that purpose.

- V. That the printed books and manuscripts, prints, maps, and drawings, belonging to the Library, be under the custody and care of the Librarian, who shall carefully examine the same by the Catalogues, at least once in every year, and lay before the Library Committee a Report in writing of the actual state of the Library.
- VI. That a Catalogue be kept in the Library, for the use of persons frequenting the same.
- VII. That no person have more than two printed books or manuscripts at the same time.
- VIII. That persons may take one or more extracts from any printed book or manuscript, but the whole or greater part of a manuscript is not to be transcribed without a particular leave from the Library Committee.
- IX. That persons are not to lay the paper on which they write on any part of the printed book or manuscript they are using, nor are any tracings to be taken without a particular permission from the Library Committee.
- X. That no person is on any pretence to write on any part of a printed book or manuscript, but if any person shall observe a defect in any printed book or manuscript, he is requested to signify the same to the Librarian.

- XI. That every person return the books he has been using to the Librarian, who shall carefully examine the same before they are put away in their proper places.
- XII. That no printed book or manuscript, print, map, or drawing, be taken out of the Library.
- XIII. That all printed books or manuscripts, prints, maps, and drawings, which may be presented or bequeathed to the Library, be entered, with the names of the donors, in a parchment or vellum book, kept for that purpose.
- XIV. That no Librarian or Attendant on the Library receive any fee, perquisite, or gratuity, on account of the execution of his office.

# ANTIQUITIES, CURIOSITIES, &c., AT THE LIBRARY,

Remains of a Roman Pavement [framed], discovered in 1824, in digging a sewer in Tower street, near St. Dunstan's hill, about sixteen feet below the present pavement.

  - Various fragments of Roman glass vessels, with some pieces or small squares of Roman Tesseræ.
  - Four Roman Coins of new second-sized brass; a large brass coin of Hadrian and a silver coin of Faustina; (second-sized).
  - 5. Two Norman Tiles, being part of the pavement of the altar of St. Martin-le-grand college church; also a token, inscribed "Joseph Lee, at the Black Eagle in St. Martin's, "his Half-penny."

A large Roman Quern, for triturating corn; found in digging the new sewer in Watling street, in 1834. A smaller Quern; found on excavating part of Princes street, near the Bank, in 1836; together with a Roman urn, and three earthen vessels for wine and oil.

By the Commissioners of Sewers.

A small portion of a Roman Tessellated Pavement, together with a small Roman earthen jar and two water vessels, found in excavating for the New London Bridge Approaches: the first in 1832, near the site of the late St. Michael's church, Crooked lane; the latter in Miles's lane, in 1833.

By the Commissioners of Sewers.

Two Roman black earthen Funeral Urns, and a large two-handled earthen vase for holding water or oil; found in excavating opposite St. Andrew's church, Holborn, in 1834.

By the Commissioners of Sewers.

Remains of the facings of the octagon pedestal or base of the antient Cheapside Cross, as first built by Edward I.; being of Caen stone, and sculptured with the arms of England and of Castile and Leon; found on excavating the site where it stood, in Cheapside, nearly opposite Wood-street end.

A large marble Tablet, inscribed "Stewkeley's Street, 1668," removed from a part of the angle of Bull-and-Mouth street, Aldersgate, on rebuilding the Bull-and-Mouth Inn, in 1830.

A square Roman stone Tablet, with a funeral inscription; found in excavating for the sewer in London Wall, in 1837.

Two Roman Lamps, and a small alabaster figure of St. Sebastian; found in excavating for the sewer in Great Winchester street, London Wall, 1838.

Various Coins; found in the City ditch, near Bishopsgate, in 1829. By Mr. ARTHUR BLACK.

Two Medals, one of bronze and the other of silver, struck to commemorate Parliamentary Reform.
