I have the honour to present my Annual Report for the year 1943.

It is to be noted that the birth rate continues to increase, there being 161, almost a record. This number only being exceeded in 1910 when it was then 162.

Infant Mortality: Unfortunately the Infant Mortality rate is rather high; this is to be regretted, but perhaps one redeeming feature may be that of the 11 deaths, 10 of them occurred outside the district, being what is known as transferred deaths.

Amongst the Infectious Diseases, the Scarlet Fever rate was rather high, but the disease itself was of a mild character. The number of whooping Cough and Measles cases were fairly high. These three diseases are inclined to come in cycles. Of the four cases of Diphtheria not one had been immunised.

I am happy to state that the Diphtheria Immunisation Scheme maintains a fairly high standard; I would like to thanks the local practitioners for their share in the work. At the same time it is well to stress the point that no effort must be relaxed in the immunisation of the children, particularly in the children under 5 years of age.

In spite of being in the fifth year of the war the number of new cases of Tuberculosis is not alarming, except that the males in the years 35 and upwards provided the greater number.

The Maternal Mortality rate is practically the same as that for the whole country.

With reference to the Ministry of Health Circular Fo.2831, calling attention to special efforts to combat infestation by head lice, to the best of our knowledge the problem does not exist in this residential area.

This fact is confirmed by the Health Visitor who has paid special attention to this matter in her routine visits and examinations.

# BIRTHS.

Boys, 88; Girls, 73; Total, 161.

The number of births registered in the district was 58, and in addition to these 103 belonging to the district, but registered elsewhere, have been added, making a total of 161, which number has only been exceeded once in the history of Hale, in the year 1910, when the number of births was 162.

#### INFANT MORTALITY.

Eleven deaths occurred among children under one year of age during 1943.

The following table gives the infant mortality rate for this district during the past five years.

The figure is unfortunately high in comparison with other years, and also exceeds the rate for England and Wales (49.0).

#### DEATHS.

Males, 67; Females, 78; Total, 145.

This figure is well above the average for Hale.

#### UNCERTIFIED DEATHS AND INQUESTS.

During the year inquests were held in connection with the deaths of 17 persons; in 7 cases death was found to be due to natural causes, and in 10 cases death followed as the result of accidents, or suicide.

There were 22 deaths from Cancer (9 males, 13 females).

It will be noted that 91 of these cases are of measles and whooping cough, and of the other diseases, 25 were of scarlet fever. It is pleasing to report only four cases of Diphtheria during the year.

Disinfection was carried out as in previous years by spraying infected rooms with formalin solution and fumigating with vapour. Infected Bedding and clothing are treated with steam or destroyed. Disinfectants are supplied free to residents of Hale.

#### INSPECTOR.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

WATER SUPPLY

With the exception of a small number of houses in the added area of Ringway, which derive their water supply from wells, the whole of the urban district is served by the mains of the Manchester Corporation, and a constant supply of excellent quality is maintained, the supply being entirely direct to the houses, and standpipes non-existent.

A scheme for the provision of a mains supply to the houses in Ringway already referred to, has been rejected during the year on the grounds of stringency of labour materials and considered unimportance of the scheme to the war effort generally, but further representations were being made to the Ministry of Health at the close of the year.

### SANITARY ACCOMMODATION.

In the district there remain only 44 pail closets, but the absence of available sewers and mains water supply prevents the installation of water closets at the houses which are at present served by these conveniences.

· like No nuisance has been detected at the one factory chimney which has in the past given cause for complaint.

#### ERADICATION OF BED BUGS, ETC.

One house was found to be infested with bugs during the year; the infestation was not serious and was cleared up after spraying with Zaldecide. One house was found to be infested with fleas, and one with other insects. Both were cleared by fumigation with sulphur.

## PREMISES AND OCCUPATIONS WHICH CAN BE CONTROLLED BY BYELAWS OR REGULATIONS

There are several stables and one knacker's yard in the district. Removal of refuse is required weekly. 13 inspections have been made to ensure compliance with this requirement. There is also a fat melting plant, but same is not being used at present.

MEANS OF ESCAPE IN CASE OF FIRE -

Improved means of escape in case of fire was provided at one factory, and the necessary certificate issued.

The eight cowsheds and nineteen dairies in the district have maintained a good standard of cleanliness during the year. Three of our eight cowkeepers are now producing "Accredited" milk, and additions to this number are shortly expected, as several producer retailers have indicated that they propose to take out "Accredited" licences as an alternative to compulsory heat treatment of their milk.

There were 60 milk purveyors on the register at the end of 1943. One purveyor was caught putting milk in bottles in the street - he was called before the Council who; on being given assurances that the offence would not occur again; decided to accept such assurances and not to institute legal proceedings in this instance.

#### HILK (SPECIAL DESIGNATIONS) ORDER, 1936 -

With a view to increasing the consumption of designated milk the Council again decided to issue all licences under the Order free of charge during 1944.

It is believed that several local dairymen are about to become bottlers of Tuberculin Tested or Accredited Hilks, as an alternative to supplying Heat Treated Hilk, which was envisaged in the Government White Paper. In such cases licences will not be issued without substantial improvement of premises and plant.

The Council's requirements have already been outlined to two dairymen who are about to put reconstruction work in hand.

#### BACTERIOLOGICAL EXALINATION OF HILK -

During the year 53 samples of milk were taken for examination. The detailed results of 156 tests carried out were as follows:-

In considering these tabulated results it should be borne in mind that the figures marked with an Asterisk (\*) refer to tests which are not supported by any legal standard, and whilst they form a to them. It is to be hoped that the time is not too far distant when some legal bacteriological standard will be enforceable for all milk; the Government Scheme for testing at bulk stations by means of the Resazurin Test, with consequent financial loss to producers of milk below certain standards, could with advantage be extended as soon as possible to the milk of small retailers and producer retailers. The results of the tests show clearly that the quality of the

milk supplied to the district during the year leaves much to be desired; the milk produced in the district was in the main satisfactory, and the unsatisfactory supplies are brought in from other district, most of these unsatisfactory samples were due to transport delays, coupled with the shortage of agricultural labour.

The very unsatisfactory results shown for Tuberculin Tested milk are nearly all reflected in one supply; the matter was taken up very strongly by the County Council, but transport delays meant that milk of this high grade was reaching the consumer upwards of 24 hours old; the firm in question agreed to deliver the milk to the consumer immediately on receipt and considerable improvement resulted. I am happy to say that the supply in question is no longer coming into this district and the firm in question obtain their milk from a more local source which allows them to deliver within a few hours of production. 

Particular attention was paid to the milk supplied to the schools, and after a series of samples and action by the County Council, improvement was effected and the samples generally reached the required standard. One sample taken, said to be heat-treated milk, showed a count of 2,800,000 bacteria per c.c. with B. Coli in 3 tubes out of 3, and a phosphatase test showed it to be entirely raw milk. That such a sample should be possible shows the importance of frequent sampling of school milk at the school and not at the producer's premises.

During the year a complaint was received that a local resident was suffering from a sore throat attributable by examination to milk a sample was taken and the milk was free from the organism which might have caused the throat condition referred to.

It is pleasing to report that only 2 tuberculous samples were revealed from 43 samples, and positive action resulted in the destruction of 5 cows under the Tuberculosis Order and the voluntary slaughter by the farmer of a further five, amongst which it is probable there were further "suspects".

All the examinations were carried out at the Public Health Laboratory, York Place, Manchester.

INSPECTION OF MEAT AND OTHER FOODS.

There are no registered or licensed slaughterhouses in the district. Butchers obtain their meat supplies from Altrincham. 7 visits have been made to the snops, and the meat exposed for sale was of good quality. 6 pigs slaughtered for home consumption at farm premises were inspected, and 1 pigs head was found to be tuberculous and condemned and destroyed.

The following foods were also condemned and destroyed:38 lbs. Cheese.
103 lbs. Butter.
12 lbs. Lard.
8 lbs. Pork.

501 tins assorted foods.

This rise in condemned food does not necessarily imply a deterioration in quality of canned foods, but is probably brought about by the desire of tradesmen to seek compensation for the ration values thereby lost.

A small quantity of butter condemned was suspected not to be genuine butter and the circumstances were reported to the Food & Drugs Inspector of the Cheshire County Council.

A complaint was also received that dirty bread was being produced by a local bakery; investigations were made and all baking tins renewed, since when no further complaint has arisen.

### FOOD AND DRUGS ACT, 1938 -

The taking of samples under the Food and Drugs Act, 1938, is carried out by the Cheshire County Council.

#### PUBLIC CLEANSING SERVICE -

The collection of refuse is carried out by the Local Authority over the whole district, the ashbins in the district being emptied once a fortnight. Shortage of labour of the right type has been wholly responsible for any reduction of efficiency or regularity of the service which may have been evident during the year.

#### SALVAGE -

The 130 Salvage Stewards still continue to operate fairly successfully, and a weekly collection is made from sacks which they put out each week. In addition salvage is collected by the refuse collectors. During the year a new storage depot was provided at Grove Lane. The collections show a considerable reduction on the peak figures for last year - the reduction was mainly in paper and metals and is in my opinion quite understandable at this stage of the effort.
