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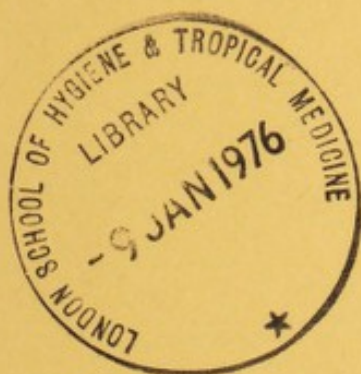

To the Chairman and Members of the Harlow Urban District Council

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting my Statistical Review on the public health services in Harlow for the year 1971. Unlike its predecessors this Review does not include comparative statistical data for the previous year. The reason for this is that the latest population figure is based on the preliminary results of the 1971 Census and shows a drop of 1,590 compared with 1970. In fact, in the year under review, there was an excess of births over deaths of 1,023, so that a net loss of 1,590 would presuppose that 1,613 persons had left the town. This is unlikely, and the decrease in the population must, therefore, be due to over-estimation in past years. Such vital statistics as the birth rate, mortality rate etc. which are based on the population of the town could not have been correct in 1970 and are therefore not comparable with those of 1971.

In order to maintain uniformity of presentation other statistics for 1970, not affected by population estimates, have also been omitted. The reader who may seek comparisons with previous years is referred to "The Health of Harlow 1966-1970" published early in 1972.

The number of live births in 1971 was 1,386 which is the smallest number since 1960 when the population of the town was only 49,000. The birth rate per thousand population declined further by comparison with previous years. In actual fact, the decline was greater than it appears because the number of live births in 1971 is related to a smaller population, whilst in 1970 and before, it was related to an over-estimated population. The adjusted rate declined much less than the crude rate and this reflects the ageing of the population of the town.

There were 102 illegitimate live births, 20 more than the highest number ever recorded in the history of Harlow. This is despite all the sex education, the availability of advice on contraception and the Abortion Act.

The still birth rate was the lowest since separate statistics for Harlow have been kept and compares very favourably with the rate for England and Wales.

Of the 363 deaths notified, 31 were due to cancer of the lung. After ischaemic heart disease (75), this was the most prevalent cause of death.

The work concerned with environmental health was somewhat curtailed through changes in staff. I must first of all record the resignation of Mr. H. L. Hughes, Chief Public Health Inspector who left in March to take up an appointment with the Department

of Health and Social Security. He had been with this authority since 1960 and had greatly contributed to the development of the environmental health services in the district. His successor and former deputy, Mr. D. W. Townsend, was appointed only six weeks later, and the department was then without a Deputy Chief Public Health Inspector for 14 weeks and also short of one Public Health Inspector for 5 weeks. In spite of these difficulties the essential services were maintained although some others had to be postponed.

In July a part-time supervisor for Meals on Wheels was appointed and the two-day service already established by the WRVS was extended, the Council providing meals on the remaining three week days.

As in the past I have included information about the County services, which includes the School Health Service, in order to give a more complete picture of health conditions in Harlow.

With the emergence of a new Social Services Department, the Home Help Service, formerly administered by the Area Health Department, was transferred to this new department but the supervision of day nurseries and child minders remained because the Social Services Department were unable to take it over.

To conclude, I must say that although no significant advances were made in the health of the people of Harlow, it was, nevertheless, maintained at a high level.

Whatever my own contribution was towards this, it would not have been effective without the help given to me by all my staff, both Harlow U.D.C. and Essex County Council, to whom I am very grateful. I also wish to extend thanks to all others who assisted me in my work.
