Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present the Annual Report of the Medical Officer of Health for the year 1959.

The health of the Rural District has been satisfactory during the year as examination of the figures contained in this report will show and the standardised birth and death rates compare very favourably with the national figures. There has been no marked change in the causes of death, apart from an increase in the deaths from suicide and violent causes.

One case of Poliomyelitis occurred, it was of the non-paralytic type. There was a big increase in cases of Scarlet Fever (52 compared with 7 in the previous year) fortunately it was not a severe type of infection. Measles and Dysentery were again prevalent.

In conclusion I have to thank the Chairman and members of the Council for their support and encouragement during the year.

I have also to thank the staff of the Public Health Department for their hard work and enthusiasm.

The Registrar General has continued to supply a comparability factor, 0.87, by which the Crude Death Rate must be adjusted for comparison with other areas of the country. As this factor is less than unity, the Standardised, or corrected Death Rate is less than the Crude Death Rate. This indicates that Hartismere has a greater "weighting" of elderly persons than the average for the rest of the country.

7. WATER SUPPLY.

Connections.

164 connections to properties were made during the year. Of these 59 were metered supplies.

There are now 893 metered supplies in the district (i.e. up to 31st December, 1959).

Water Examination.

Well water - - - 2 samples were taken - 1 was found to be satisfactory and 1 unsatisfactory.

Mains supply - - - 12 routine samples were taken in different parishes and a further 12 taken at source (Redgrave Headworks). All reports showed the findings to be excellent.

Well Water Cyanosis.

During the year 13 samples were taken - 10 of these were found to be safe and 3 unsafe (the reports on 2 of these were termed as doubtful) The families concerned in the unsafe cases were warned and advised to obtain an alternative supply.

8. SEWERAGE.

Hoxne.

The village scheme was in course of construction (completed March 1960). 51 statutory connections were made to properties previously connected to the old sewer.

Botesdale and Rickinghall.

The village scheme was commenced in November, 1959.

Palgrave.

Stage 2 of this village scheme was commenced in November, 1959.

Laxfield.

A new length of 6-inch foul sewer has been laid behind property on the South side of The Street. The old 9-inch drain has been diverted but retained as a surface water sewer.
