

### To the Chairman and Members of Hartismere Rural District Council

Madam Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present the Annual Report of the Medical Officer of Health for 1971.

### Vital Statistics:

An examination of the tables set out on pages 4 - 9 shows that 1971 was a healthy year for Hartismere. There have been no significant changes in the Birth, Death and other rates since the previous year. 54% of all deaths occurred in persons aged 75 years of age and over.

On the table of causes of death it will be noticed that there was an increase in the number of people dying from cerebro vascular disease (which is the medical term for a stroke). There was no significant change in the other causes of death.

### Infectious Diseases:

Measles was again prevalent. Although this is nowadays usually a mild complaint, it can on occasions take a more severe form which is often associated with unpleasant complications.

It is now possible for persons to be immunised against measles and parents are strongly advised to have their children protected in this way.

### Housing:

There was a large reduction in the number of private houses erected and 12 new Council houses were built during the year.

There was a heartening increase in the number of Improvement Grants made during the year. This scheme whereby old properties can be modernised and provided with amenities is becoming more widely known and made use of by the Public.

It would be sad if many of our traditional styled cottages came to such a state of disrepair that they had to be pulled down and replaced with modern dwellings. The Improvement Grant Scheme has enabled many such houses to be preserved and modernised.

Many modern houses are obviously needed as well, but it would be foolish to discard 17th Century dwellings that can be made fit for 20th Century living.

#### 10. WATER SUPPLY

### Water Examination

Well Water: 10 Samples were taken from shallow wells, as a result of which 4 wells were closed to further use for human consumption.

> 4 Deep Bore samples were taken. The reports showed the water to be entirely satisfactory.

Mains Supply: Routine samples were taken in different parishes. All reports showed the finding to be excellent.

### Well Water Cyanosis:

During the year the County Medical Officer notified cases of women due to be confined:-

This was investigated and as a result a sample was taken and submitted for a report on Nitrate Content and found to be satisfactory.

### 11. MILK DEALERS LICENCES

There are now eight licences issued by the County Council under the Milk (Special Designation) Regulations, 1963, enabling persons to sell pre-packed milk from an approved source in this district.

### 12. MILK SAMPLING

Statutory - 28 samples taken. Chemical Analysis - 1 sample taken. Biologicals - 6 samples taken. Antibiotics & Brucella - 15 samples taken. Abortis.

In all cases the results were satisfactory.

### 13. FOOD INSPECTION

120 cattle were killed in the one licensed slaughter house during the year and 100% inspection of carcases was carried out.

No carcases were condemned which again shows the first class quality of meat handled.

The lower total kill figure is due to the fact that no slaughtering was carried out for two months due to staff shortage.

The following foodstuffs were condemned during the year:-

60 lbs. Bovine liver - Abscess.

36 lbs. Bovine liver - Liver Fluke.

Plus an amount of frozen foods condemned following refrigerator failures.
