The amount of infectious diseases was less than the average of recent years.

The scheme of immunisation against Diptheria was continued. 156 children completed the course of treatment. 235 children had a reinforcing dose.

WATER

It is estimated that 87% of the dwellinghouses in the district are connected to a water main.

Analysis of the Hartley Wintney parish supply has been regularly carried out and reported satisfactory.

ll Samples of well water were analysed; 6 were reported as unsatisfactory. Steps were taken to obtain proper supplies. Mains were extended at Dore's Green, Ewshot and Brandy Bottom, Yateley.

SEWERAGE

At the time of writing the sewering of Greywell village is in progress. It is to be hoped that sewers will before long be laid in Hawley, Yateley and Crondall.

There were 38 cases of emergency slaughter of food animals; all were inspected and most were passed fit for human consumption.

During the year 6 samples of milk were taken from retailers; all were reported satisfactory.

HOUSING

The following new houses have been completed since the war:-

(Council built 374) (Privately built 117) (Prefabs 29)

The continued occupation and increasing decay of Army and Air Force huts causes much difficulty. The Council are doing everything possible to rehouse the occupants and demolish the huts but the problem is a large one. 305 huts are still occupied.

3,128 houses have been surveyed since 1945, of which 448 have been scheduled as unfit for habitation and incapable of being rendered fit at a reasonable cost.

Where essential repairs are necessary owners are approached, and an appreciable amount of work has been done.
