# Medical Officer of Health's Report

for

## 1956

To the Chairman and Members of the Hartley Wintney Rural District Council.
Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present my Annual Report for the year 1956, prepared in accordance with the Ministry of Health Circular, 19/56.

The population is now 25,620, an increase of 400 on 1955.

Infectious diseases notified were 166 - which number includes a moderate amount of Whooping Cough and Measles cases. Thus the year was a quiet one in this respect. Tuberculosis cases notified were 7. The Mass Radiography Unit visited in 1956 but only two active cases were found in 1269 examinations in the areas of Long Sutton, Crondall, Odiham, Hartley Wintney and Hook.

There were 10 deaths from Cancer of the lung - of which 8 were male and 2 female - the total cancer deaths were 51.

The infant mortality rate was low at 15.4 - the national rate being 23.7 - a figure which compares very favourably with that of Denmark (25) France (36) Italy (48) Sweden (17).

Three Poliomyelitis cases occurred in 1956 - one of whom made a complete recovery. No deaths occurred from this disease.

The general health of the District is satisfactory.

I wish to thank the Chairman and Members of the Health Committee for their kindly interest and encouragement in the work of the Department and to the staff for their help and assistance throughout the year.

Diphtheria	, Whooping Cough and Tetanus Prophylaxis

This is normally done by arrangement with the patient's doctor, or at a Welfare Centre. The triple Antigen (against Diphtheria, Whooping Cough and Tetanus combined) is used as a routine now, but vaccine against Diphtheria (FT) or Whooping Cough can be done separately if required; or Diphtheria and Whooping Cough combined together.

Anti-Poliomyelitis Vaccination (by 2 doses of 1 c.c at a three-weekly interval) is now given, normally by the patient's own doctor. Children born in the years 1947 - 1956 can now be registered for this by filling in a card, obtainable from the County Medical Officer, The Castle, Winchester or the District Medical Officer of Health at the Council Offices. Vaccine for this is not ordinarily immediately available.

The number of children who have been immunised against Poliomyelitis in the district is now 211 of which 22 were done as a pilot scheme in May and June, 1956. The number of children in the District who have received a course of Diphtheria immunisation between 1st January 1942 and 31st December, 1956 is 3175.

The immunised state of the child population is estimated to be about 65.5% - the child population being about 5000.

Thus there were only two cases of Active Pulmonary Tuberculosis revealed in these surveys in the district.

## Water Supply.

The supply for all the Parish Districts is from the Mid Wessex Water Company.

This mains supply is an adequate chlorinated and satisfactory water. The Pumping Stations are at Frimley, Itchel, Greywell, Lasham and Beenham's Heath, near Wokingham.

Daily tests for the purity of the water are taken. The hardness varies from 16.5 to 21 grains per gallon, due to the chalybeate origin of the water (from deep wells in the chalk). Softening by the lime process is done to reduce the hardness to the statutory limit of 12 grains per gallon.

The Parish of Hartley Wintney Water Works was taken over by the Mid Wessex Water Company on 1st October, 1956.

## Wells.

There are about 60 wells in use in the district, mostly belonging to isolated properties. These wells are for the greater part shallow wells and the water usually contains B.Coli. The properties are mostly isolated and this fact often forces the Authority to allow these conditions which would be more potentially dangerous in urban communities; but an endeavour is made to get a mains water supply to properties where practicable.

The destruction of wasps nests and treatment of verminous properties was carried out.

Disinfecting after notifiable diseases was also done.

The Pond at Hartley Wintney was sprayed with Ante-Mosquito Spray.

#### Sewerage

I am indebted to the Surveyor for the following information.

During the year the sewerage scheme for the Village of Crookham was completed and a start made on the sewerage scheme at Crondall.

The 1st Stage of the Yateley Sewerage Scheme was completed.

#### Public Cleansing and Salvage.

The Hartley Wintney A.30 road section is swept once a week in Winter and twice a week in Summer. Odiham High Street is swept once a week throughout the year.

The Chief Public Health Inspector supervises the administration of the refuse and salvage disposal.

#### Conservancy.

The collection and clearance from premises having bucket latrines is made from 90 premises.

#### Housing.

The Surveyor has kindly supplied the following information. Twelve Council houses at Eversley were brought up to present day standards and schemes approved by the Council for similar works at South Warnborough (6 houses) and Malt House Bridge (6 houses). Other schemes will be submitted for Crondall and Yateley when main sewerage is available.

Council House Lettings. A Committee meets monthly to allocate lettings and consider housing applications.

Caravans. There are 101 licensed caravans in the district.

Milk Supply. There are 10 retailers of designated milk in the district.

There are 2 pasteurising plants.

Ice-Cream. 29 premises are registered for the sale of ice-cream (all pre-packed).

Shops. The Sanitary Provisions in Section 38 of the Shops Act, 1950 are administered by the district as the Local Sanitary Authority. The County Council administers the Shops Act generally.

Food Poisoning. The number of cases of food poisoning notified was Nil.

Slaughter House. There is one licensed Slaughter House - that of Mr. Monk, at High Street, Odiham. All meat slaughtered is inspected before release.

Knacker's Yard. There is a licensed Knacker's Yard in operation at Hook (near the Station).

The premises are frequently inspected by the Public Health Inspectors. There are no special reasons for comment at present.

Blackbushe Civil Airport - Port Health. Dr. Sharkey, the Airport Medical Officer, to whom I am indebted for this report, writes:

"I have the honour to report as follows :

The service was carried on the same pattern as last year, with the addition of the power to grant Ministry of Health Disinfection Certificates for aircraft disinfected under the supervision of the Port Medical Officer. This facility, as mentioned in my last report as

being under consideration, was granted with effect from 1st November, 1956.

The work has increased greatly in amount, particularly in the numbers of aliens arriving on Ministry of Labour permits, who have to be examined to ensure that they are medically desirable.

There were two extra-ordinary duties. From August 14th - 18th Operation Nursery was in progress - the airlift of British Nationals from the Suez Canal Area. The Port Medical facilities were extended to these people in conjunction with the Medical Staffs of I.C.I. and Messrs. Wimpey.

From 17th November to 14th December the airlift of the Hungarian Refugees was in progress and a special routine was instituted. There was no question of refusing entry on medical grounds, so a system of interrogation was instituted, through interpreters, whereby the family and personal medical history of each refugee was ascertained; lists of personnel and complaints being sent to the County Medical Officer for further action, when necessary. Active severe illness was dealt with summarily by sending the sick to local hospitals. I am grateful for the free co-operation of these hospitals and the local Medical Officer of Health

Form Port 12 was rendered on two occasions in respect of aliens entering the country for medical treatment.

On 16th April, 1956 a family arrived from Tripoli, one child suffering from a rash suggestive of Small-Pox. The family of six were admitted to hospital for observation through the co-operation of the County Medical Officer of Health. The case proved to be one of Ghicken-Pox.

On 12th April, 1956 a person suffering from suspected dysentery arrived from Nairobi and was admitted to hospital. On 28th June, 1956 a similar case was dealt with.

On 20th August, 1956 a rat was found in an aircraft. This was trapped by the local Rodent Officer and the aircraft sent for disinfestation.

In all 196 aliens on Ministry of Labour permits were examined and the Hungarian Refugees numbered 4034.
