The industrial activities of the district are varied and include agriculture, the manufacture of ready made clothing, gloves, mats, textile fabrics, brushes, ropes, twines, sacks, telecommunications equipment, office furniture, steel furniture, athletic equipment, sheet metal products, essences, oil well equipment, jewellery, signs, architectural ironwork, ladders, non-ferrous castings, scientific glassware, fibre glass mouldings, wooden cabinets, wooden household products, fine chemicals, refrigeration appliances, instruments, tools and electrical and mechanical components. There are firms engaged in light engineering, specialist packing, the processing of animal feeding stuffs and paper converting.

The Town development scheme which has been carried out with the co-operation of the Greater London Council made further progress during the year when firms engaged in metal plating, engineering and the manufacture of ventilation equipment and batteries occupied factories in the town.

## SECTION F

### WATER SUPPLY

Mains water is supplied to your area by the West Suffolk Water Board and the information regarding the purity of the water was supplied by the Board.

#### Purity of the Water

Samples taken throughout the district for bacteriological examination were satisfactory.

Samples for chemical analysis were taken by the Board from the Burton End and Bartlow sources. The Analyst's remarks were as follows :-

##### (a) Bartlow P.S.

"This water is of very good organic quality and there is no chemical evidence of pollution. The total hardness is about 22<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>° Clark, almost all of which is temporary. The reaction of the water is on the alkaline side of neutrality and it would not be expected to have any serious corrosive action on metals. A trace of iron is present but it is insufficient to give rise to any deposit on standing. The mineral analysis is similar to that of most East Anglian waters, the magnesium content being very low and the fluorine content negligible. In our opinion this water is suitable for drinking and general purposes."

##### (b) Burton End.

"The organic quality of this water is very good and the analysis as a whole is satisfactory. This water was last analysed in January 1965 and the analytical characteristics of the water appear to have changed rather markedly since then. The chloride content has gone up from 30 to 50 p.p.m. and the total hardness from 400 to 470 p.p.m. The nitrate nitrogen content has also increased rather strikingly, from 3.0 to 13.0 p.p.m. Our opinion on the quality of the water remains unchanged; given some reduction of the total hardness and the slight increase in pH, this water should be suitable for drinking and general purposes."

### Water Charges

The water charges in Haverhill from the 1st April 1964 to 31st March 1965 were 1/1d in the £. net annual value, with a minimum charge of 30/- per annum for domestic purposes, and 3/2d per thousand gallons for metered supplies. The charges from the 1st April 1965 to the 31st March 1966 were 1/5d in the £. net annual value, with a minimum charge of 30/- per annum, and 3/7d per thousand gallons for metered supplies.

## OPEN-AIR SWIMMING POOL.

The Open-Air Swimming Pool is situated at Swan Lane near the centre of the town. The main pool is 75' x 30' with a maximum depth of 7' constructed in 1930, with a Junior Pool 40' x 20' with a depth varying from 1'6" to 3'0". A filtration and chlorination plant was installed in 1938 and increased in capacity in 1964.

The charges are £1.5s. for Adult Season Ticket holders and 12/6d half season, 17/6d for Junior Season tickets and 10/-d for half season, 2/-d Adults and 1/- for Junior's admission.

There were 4 adult full season and no adult half season tickets sold and 165 junior full season and 34 half season tickets sold.

In addition 570 adults and 4,686 juniors paid for admission.

The pool was reserved for the exclusive use of schools during the summer term in the mornings and one evening each week is reserved for the Swimming Club.

Daily field tests are carried out on the bath water and regular bacteriological tests are carried out which show that a regular high standard was achieved.

## REFUSE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL

Collection of domestic and trade refuse is undertaken by the department. 2,865 domestic premises and approximately 528 trade and other units are now collected weekly.

The bonus system of refuse collection which was organised in 1963 is continuing and is working satisfactorily.

Collection is carried out by a 16/18 cu.yd. fore and aft tipping lorry by Messrs. Shelvoke and Drewry and disposal is by tipping.

The Council have under consideration plans for additional controlled tipping areas.
