The industrial activities of the district are varied and include agriculture, the manufacture of ready made clothing, gloves, mats, textile fabrics, brushes, ropes, twines, sacks, telecommunications equipment, office furniture, steel furniture, wooden furniture, athletic equipment, sheet metal products, essences, oil well equipment, jewellery, ladders, non-ferrous castings, scientific glassware, fibre glass mouldings, wooden cabinets, wooden household products, fine chemicals, refrigeration appliances, tools and electrical and mechanical components, ventilation equipment, display models, motor vehicle lamp holders and batteries. There are firms engaged in engineering, specialist packing, the processing of animal feeding stuffs, paper converting and food warehousing.

There is a Town development scheme which is being carried out with the co-operation of the Greater London Council.

## SECTION F

### WATER SUPPLY

Mains water is supplied to your area by the West Suffolk Water Board and the information regarding the purity of the water was supplied by the Board.

#### Purity of the Water

Samples taken throughout the district for bacteriological examination were satisfactory.

Samples for chemical analysis were taken by the Board from the Haverhill and Bartlow sources. The Analyst's remarks were as follows :-

##### (a) Bartlow P.S.

"This water is of very good organic quality and there is no chemical evidence of pollution. The total hardness amounts to 23° Clark, including nearly 20° of temporary hardness. The iron content is negligible and the water remains bright and clear on standing. The pH is on the alkaline side of neutrality, as is desirable. The mineral analysis is in accordance with expectation for a water derived from the East Anglian chalk. The fluoride content of the water is negligible. In our opinion this water is suitable for drinking and general purposes."

##### (b) Haverhill P.S. - Bore No. 2

"The organic quality of this water is good and there is no chemical evidence of pollution. The analysis as a whole differs little from that of the previous sample from this bore except that the chloride content is 8 p.p.m. higher. In our opinion this water is suitable for drinking purposes."

### Water Charges

The water charges for domestic properties for 1967 was 1/9d. in the £. net annual value and for metered supplies was 3/8d. per thousand gallons to 31st March 1967 and 4/0d. per thousand gallons from 31st March, 1967.

OEPN-AIR SWIMMING POOL

The Open-Air Swimming Pool is situated at Swan Lane near to the centre of the town. The main pool is 75' x 30' with a maximum depth of 7' constructed in 1930, with a Junior Pool 40' x 20' with a depth varying from 1' 6" to 3' 0". A filtration and chlorination plant was installed in 1938 and increased in capacity in 1964.

The charges are £1. 5s. 0d. for Adult Season Ticket holders and 12/6d. half season, 17/6d. for Junior Season Tickets and 10/- for half season, 2/- Adults and 1/- for Junior admission.

There were 9 adult full season and 17 adult half season tickets sold and 214 junior full season and 76 junior half season tickets sold.

In addition 1,583 adults and 9,655 juniors paid for admission.

The pool was reserved for the exclusive use of schools during the summer term in the mornings and four afternoons and one evening each week is reserved for the Swimming Club.

Daily field tests are carried out on the bath water and regular bacteriological tests are carried out which show that a regular high standard was achieved.

## SEWERAGE AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL

The Council's Sewage Disposal Works which is situated in Coupals Road now caters for a population of approximately 10,300 persons with an allowance for trade wastes and a design for an extension to 18,500 with an increased capacity for trade wastes is in hand.

## REFUSE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL

Collection of domestic and trade refuse is undertaken by the department. 3,287 domestic premises and approximately 324 trade, commercial and other premises are now collected weekly.

The bonus system of refuse collection which was organised in 1963 is continuing and is working satisfactorily.

Collection is carried out by a 40 cu. yd. Dennis Paxit III compressor type lorry and disposal is by tipping.

The Council have under consideration plans for additional controlled tipping areas and the provision of a Refuse Disposal plant. Paper sack receptacles are now being used on all new Council estates. The collection of bulk items of household refuse is undertaken free of charge.
