

INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

DIPHTHERIA. The number of Diphtheria Cases notified was 60.

This is a high figure but is reduced to some extent when revised in the light of subsequent knowledge of the cases. 14 turned out not to be Diphtheria so that the true figure is 46.

SCARLET FEVER. There were 22 cases, most of which were mild.

MEASLES. There were 239 cases and one death. On the whole they were of a fairly mild type.

IMMUNISATION AGAINST DIPHTHERIA.

Sessions were arranged at which children of school age and under received treatment. These were attended by a local doctor.

Three injections were given of T.A.F. prophylactic serum.
