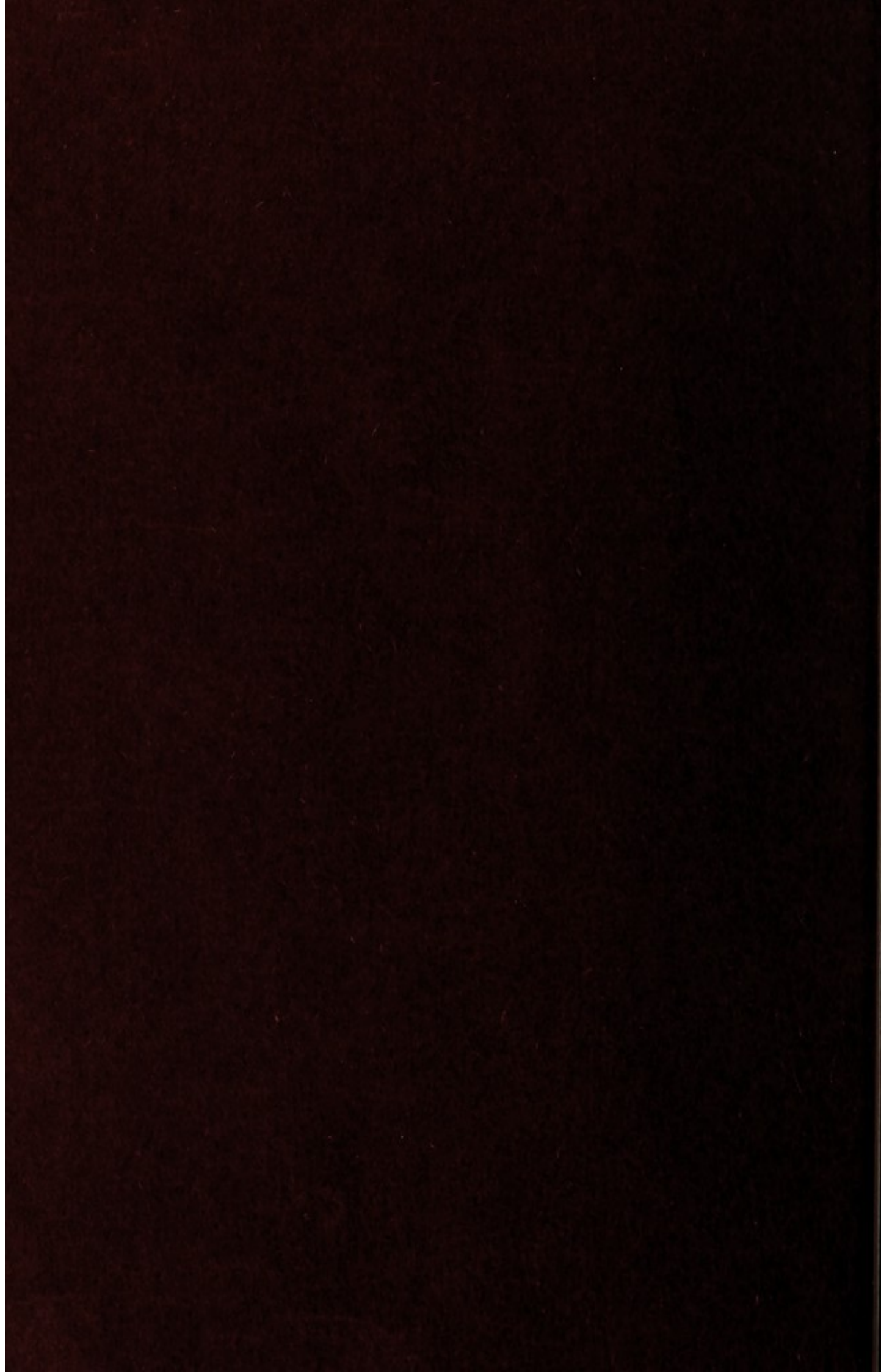

INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

There was an increase in notifications mainly due to Measles and an unusually high incidence of Scarlet Fever which persisted throughout the year. The type was mild and there were no deaths. 117 cases of Scarlet Fever was the highest incidence for over twenty years. There was a generally high incidence of the disease throughout the country in 1944,

DIPHTHERIA. 20 cases of Diphtheria were notified. When the final diagnosis was made, however, it was found in 5 cases that the disease was not true Diphtheria. The correct number therefore is 15.

IMMUNISATION AGAINST
DIPHTHERIA.

Sessions were continued at which injections were given by Private Practitioners to children of school age and under. Each child had two injections of A.P.T. prophylactic.

TUBERCULOSIS.
