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



To the Chairman and Members of the Public Health and Social Welfare Committee of the Herefordshire County Council.

#### MR. CHAIRMAN, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to present my Annual Report on the public health of Herefordshire and upon the health services of the County Council for the year 1946.

Since I did not take up my appointment until the last month of the year I feel that it would be inappropriate for me more than to comment on the statistics of what is really the report of my predecessor.

The birth-rate, which had reached 19.77 per thousand living in 1944, the highest for many years, increased to 20.3. This is explained by the return of large forces from overseas service. The death rate of 13.06 was slightly better than the two preceding years.

The position of Diphtheria was much the same as last year, the notifications being 38 compared with 30 in 1945 but only 1 instead of 4 deaths. The County Council, as welfare authority, undertook the responsibility for the immunisation of children under 5 years of age. But there is still room for improvement in various parts of the County.

The downward trend of tuberculosis mortality was resumed after the rise in 1945. The work of the dispensary has been maintained and its work is reflected in the number of attendances which are now threefold those of 1939. Financial assistance was given to tuberculous persons and their dependents in accordance with Memo. 266T, the authority being guided in the selection of cases by the Clinical Tuberculosis Officer.

The increase in the incidence of both early syphilis and gonorrhoea is probably due to the cases released from H.M. Forces and to the relative increase in number of young adults in the community. An interesting point is the high figure of 622 people who attended the clinic for examination and were found not to be suffering from a venereal infection; this suggests that propaganda is making the public more aware of these infections and of the desirability of seeking early advice and treatment. Under Regulation 33B, 9 informal notices and 1 double notification were received. The tracing of contacts and follow up of defaulters was undertaken by members of the staff of the clinic. For a few months of the year an arrangement was made combining this work with that of the Psychiatric Social Worker, but when the holder of the appointment resigned it was decided that her successor should only have duties in connection with Psychiatry.

The infant mortality rate of 34.4 per 1,000 live births is the lowest ever recorded and the stillbirth rate of 23.2 compares favourably with other years.

The illegitimacy birth rate, although lower than 1945, is high compared with the rest of England and Wales. The Hereford Diocesan Association for Moral Welfare continued to carry out their duties dealing with the problems of caring for illegitimate children but were handicapped by the difficulty of finding suitable vacancies in hostels for mothers and babies.

During the year the shortage of nurses and midwives continued, but in spite of this the nursing staff have given efficient service and have risen to every occasion even under most trying weather conditions.

I wish to acknowledge the assistance I have received in the compilation of this Report from the clerical staff.

It is the policy of the County Council that Maternity cases for which they are responsible should as far as possible be attended by domiciliary midwives in their homes, but provision is made for the hospitalisation of cases considered to be complicated or cases whose homes are unsuitable for domiciliary midwifery. The number of cases admitted to the County Council Hospital and Herefordshire General Hospital are shown in the following tables. The number of cases admitted privately to the Herefordshire General Hospital are also shown.

# CHILD WELFARE.

Babies are visited by the midwives for at least 14 days after they are born. At the end of the 14th day until the end of the first year they are visited at least once a month by the Health Visitor who is usually the same Nurse as the Midwife.

If any abnormality is suspected by the Midwife, a general medical practitioner may be called in to the baby under the Midwives' Acts, up to the 28th day after the birth.

#### TUBERCULOSIS CLINIC.

Clinics are held at the Herefordshire County Council Hospital on Mondays, from 2.30-4.30 p.m. (for City cases only), and Wednesdays and Saturdays from 10.30 a.m. to 12.30 p.m.

712 new cases attended the Clinic in 1946 and the total number of attendances was 2,192. For comparison, the number seen at the Clinics in 1939 was :—

244 new patients and 739 total attendances.

The increase in the number of persons seen nowadays is largely due to a keener awareness of the ubiquity and infectiousness of the disease so that more suspects and contacts come for examination. While only about one in fifteen " new attendances " is found to have tuberculosis, it is a tragedy that provision for treatment has not kept pace with the demand and newly discovered cases must wait months for a bed.

#### TUBERCULOSIS BEDS AT NIEUPORT SANATORIUM AND COUNTY COUNCIL HOSPITAL.

The number of beds is :---

Nieuport Sanatorium-Adults 43, Children 28.

County Council Hospital-Adults 12.

Adult beds were kept permanently in use. The domestic situation was perhaps slightly easier, but the nursing situation rather more difficult than formerly. Sustained effort was required and was heroically given by most of the Staff. No beds have been closed, though a shortage of nurses may demand this at any time.

Of a total of 60 adults admitted to Nieuport Sanatorium 18 were from H.M. Forces.

Six patients died at the Sanatorium and 26 at the County Council Hospital. The type of case at the latter was, on the whole, more advanced.

# AGES OF PATIENTS ADMITTED.

The average length of stay at the Sanatorium of adults was :---Male, 198 days ; Female, 245 days.

The figures in the above table show no significant variation from 1945. Adverse home conditions still necessitated unduly long retention in the sanatorium of too many chronic cases to the exclusion of hopefully treatable cases awaiting admission, though the latter were given priority whenever possible.

As formerly the age group 20-30 formed over 50% of admissions to the Sanatorium. The Disabled Persons Employment Act, 1944, has been helpful in finding suitable employment for ex-patients.

The number of patients in the Sanatorium on December 31st, 1946, was 64, compared with 67 on December 31st, 1945.

# SPECIAL TREATMENT OF PULMONARY TUBERCULOSIS.

During 1946, 15 Artificial Pneumothoraces were induced at the Sanatorium and the following operations performed at the County Council Hospital by E. Wynne Edwards, Esq, F.R.C.S, Visiting Thoracic Surgeon, and by A. L. d'Abreu, Esq., O.B.E., F.R.C.S., who succeeded him during the summer: 9 Adhesiotomies and 11 Phrenicectomies.

Difficulty in freeing beds at the County Hospital prevented a greater use of operative treatment.

## PUBLIC HEALTH LABORATORY.

The Laboratory continued under the direction of the Medical Research Council, with Dr. R. Ewart Jones in charge. It forms a unit of the Emergency Public Health Laboratory Service set up by the Ministry of Health on the outbreak of war. One advantage of this is that the Director is regularly in touch with other laboratories in the Service for consultation and for the exchange of information as to the existence of epidemics or cases of infectious disease in other parts of the country.
