To the Chairman and Members of the Herne Bay Urban District Council.

Ladies and Gentlemen,

The Annual Report for 1969 is presented in accordance with statutory requirements and to provide information to Councillors and public alike. These dull facts are found of interest also to teachers in training and students of the social sciences amongst whom they provide material for studies and essays, if we are to judge from the enquiries put to us.

The population did not increase to any significant extent during the year, and the average increase over recent years has been about 1% per annum. The birth rate, even after adjustment, remained well below the national level, being 13.3 per 1,000, against 16.3 for England and males. The rate of illegitimate births remained above the national figure at 11% against 8% for England and males. It is, however, to be remembered that births within a settled domestic situation with "common law" husband and wife, but not necessarily a couple married to each other, are registered as illegitimate.

The perinatal mortality rate continued to register a satisfactory level of safety to the intent around childbirth somewhat better than the national rate (13 against 23).

The total death rate per 1,000 population after adjustment corresponded to the national rate 11.8 against 11.9 for England and Wales.

The incidence of notifiable infectious disease rose because of the occurrence of many measles cases. The introduction of measles vaccination was not in time to stop the two year cycle of cases. The number of cases of tuberculosis notified also rose, but no cases of infectious jaundice were notified. The experience of new notifications of tuberculosis over the last four years shows the benefit of visits from the Mass Radiography Unit to a community such as ours, and the impending withdrawal of this facility is not happily received. Sonne dysentery was more prevalent and reference is made to a household outbreak.

Undoubtedly the most prominent public health factor in Herne Bay is the high proportion of elderly and retired persons. As will be seen from the report, and especially in the Chief Public Health Inspector's report, special attention has been given to the development of warden services and the co-ordination of voluntary services.

May I express my thanks to the Council and the officers for their interest and co-operation, and for the friendly working relations experienced.

SOCIAL CONDITIONS OF THE AREA

Herne Bay is a holiday resort on the north-east coast of Kent which developed in the middle of the 19th Century with the realisation of the benefits of the seaside. Readily accessible from London by rail, and by steamer traffic from the bounds of the Thames Estuary, it thrived and still thrives in an atmosphere of holiday. The steamer links have disappeared and man has taken to the motor car as the alternative to the railway. The growth of major highways, the M2 and the earlier development of the Thanet way, have opened the hinterland approach.

As the town is within easy reach of London by rail or road, it has developed a large residential area of modern houses which has grown appreciably in the post war period. The town has not lost its interest in the seaside. The development of seaside amenities, as well as defences against the sea scour, have received much attention, and Hampton corner is being laid out in a way which will bring much pleasure to families with children.

Decay has threatened the Pier whose benefits are thought to have declined with the end of steamer traffic, but there are many who suffer from allergic asthma and hay fever, who find Herne Bay a great aid to their health, and will miss the benefit of spending a few hours in the sea breezes well away from grassland and its hazards.

There is considerable seasonal employment in catering for the needs of visitors during the summer months when the population is almost double that of the winter residential population.

In addition to the town's education and utility services (schools, electricity, gas, water, fire, transport, local government, and postal services), there are a number of protessional and commercial establishments and light industrial undertakings which provide employment. Agricultural employment is available in the rural area. It is the Council's policy to attract suitable light industries to the town to establish a more balanced community. This has met with some success for new industries commenced since the end of the war are known to have provided employment for approximately 500 men and women.

The Kent County Council is the Education Authority for the Urban District. There are two County Primary, two C.E. and Junior Schools, and one County Secondary School. In addition, there is an independent fee-paying school. Herne Bay has two large convalescent homes for adults and several smaller ones for children. There are holiday homes and homes for old people and the chronic sick. The Cripplecraft Home provides occupation and welfare for the disabled. Herne Bay Memorial Hospital and Herne Hospital employ a number of nursing and domestic workers.

GENERAL MATTERS

The Chief Public Health Inspector's report gives full and comprehensive attention to environmental matters, on which only general comments are called for in this report.

Water Supply

The moderately hard water supply from deep chalk well sources in Canterbury has a hardness of approximately 274 parts per million, of which 233 parts per million is carbonate (temporary) hardness and 39 parts per million is non-carbonate (permanent). The Ford well supply is seldom used now but the pumping station is kept in full running order because of its usefulness as a reserve. The latter produces a water with fluoride content of one part per million fluoride against the Canterbury supply that contains only 0.05 to 0.1 parts per million fluoride. How long, I wonder, will it be before the sophisticated findings that confuse the issue, so successfully used by the opponents of water fluoridation, are overcome and the fluoride level of the local water supply is adjusted to that of the Ford well?

Sewerage and Disposal

The enlargement of the May Street treatment plant to meet future changes which are intended to direct more of the town sewage away from the sea outfall, was a very satisfactory development. The method of sludge disposal by lime and ferrous sulphate precipitation followed by pressing, proves to produce an end product that is as inoffensive as the process. The quality of the effluent is now of a much higher standard than that required by the River Authority (10/10 BOD/suspended solids against the requirements of 15/15). The sea outfall which, at present, disposes of the sewage from the greater part of the town, gives rise to a quite limited but apparent area of pollution some distance from the shore. The sewage goes through a disintegrating comminutor before discharge.

Special Housing

The Blderly

Mr. Clark refers to the need for more special accommodation for the elderly in view of the high proportion of the population in advanced years, and his hope that the present 30 (to be increased to 45) units at Redgates could well be doubled. There is a good case for increasing the number of places in view of the value of such community living to the physically handicapped as well as the elderly.

Misunderstandings arise from the term "Warden Assisted", especially amongst hospital staff and family doctors who believe that some form of nursing and domestic assistance is provided by the warden. This is outside the scope or capacity of the warden service and the word "assisted" would best be dropped.

Home Dialysis

The Council showed commendable co-operation in housing two families in which there were kidney failure cases dependent on artificial kidney dialysis who had reached the stage of readiness for home dialysis. Kent County Council met the cost of the adaptation necessary for installation of the units.

Section 47 - National Assistance Act

An unusual case arose in which in order to achieve the necessary care of an elderly man willing to go to hospital, an Order had to be obtained to gain access for his removal. The legal process having been gone through, the resistance to help melted and the outcome was a happy one, obvious from the pleasure shown by the old man at his improved situation and care. He had, in effect, been a prisoner in his own home.

Other cases not requiring resort to a court order included:A man of 87 years looking after himself in one ground floor room,
whose deterioration in health resulted in squallor and gross flea
infestation of feather bedding. Hospital admission was preceded
by disinfestation.

An elderly lady (75 years) and her dog living in her own house with occasional care from a sister living in the Midlands. Home help had been provided unsuccessfully. Malnutrition from self neglect due to mental derangement led to admission to hospital under mental health arrangements.

Travelling Warden

There have been two developments which warrant special mention.

The first is the appointment by the Council of a Peripatetic (Roving) Warden for elderly Council tenants.

The second is the joint appointment in conjunction with the Old People's welfare Committee and Kent County Welfare Department of a part-time organiser of voluntary help.

With these persons both working from Health Department offices there is a good level of contact and co-operation, and Mr. Clark, as Housing Manager, can provide the guidance that enhances the service.

METEOROLOGY

The Council maintains a meteorological station on the Sea Front and daily weather readings are transmitted to the Air Ministry. The following are the readings for the year 1969:

SOCIAL HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE AREA

Laboratory Facilities

All bacteriological work for the Urban District is carried out at the Public Health Laboratory, Preston Hall, Maidstone, free of charge. This is one of a chain of laboratories established under the Public Health Laboratory Service Act, 1960, by which a like named Board acts as agent for the Lecretary of State for Health in providing the service.

Services provided the Kent County Council under the N.H.S.A.

Health Visitors and School Murses

The health visiting, school nursing and child health services are carried out by the County Council who provide the staff. During 1969, these duties were performed by Mrs. D. A. Wirdnam and Miss Stow.

Tuberculosis health visiting is carried out by Miss Stow.

Nursing in the Home

The Kent County Council provide a free Nursing Service and, apart from cases of emergency and accident, a patient may obtain the services of a home nurse if required by the medical practitioner in attendance. There are six such nurses in this district.

Domicilliary Midwifery

A comprehensive service is available, and two midwives are employed.

Ambulance Service

A new Ambulance Station to serve Herne Bay, Whitstable and the rural hinterland was established in Sea Street. This took the place of the very cramped station in Whitstable and provides modern, efficient, and well equipped premises well planned to give ease of access to the area served.

Domestic Help Service

Domestic help is obtainable for the sick, aged and infirm, and in cases of urgent need; the scheme is operated from the Kent County Council's clinic in King's Road under the supervision of the District Organiser, Mrs. A. Kingston.

District Office

The Kent County Council has established the District Office at the former Civil Defence Centre at Cavendish Road, Herne Bay, where enquiries can be made with regard to County Council Health Services.

Treatment Centres and Clinics

Clinics continued to be held regularly throughout the year at the Kent County Council's Health Centre, King's Road, Herne Bay. The following table gives the days and times when the various sessions are held:

Smallpox Hospital Accommodation

The Regional Hospital Board have a scheme in operation whereby smallpox patients may be admitted to the River Hospital (Long Reach), Dartford, Kent. No cases occurred or were suspected during the year under review. A panel of Smallpox Consultants is available to the Medical Officer of Health through Department of Health arrangements.

Convalescent Homes and Holiday Homes etc.

There are several Holiday and Convalescent Homes in the Urban District, with accommodation for some 400 patients.

"Batesholme", Grand Drive, accommodates 19 boys between the ages of 3 and 17 years, under the care of the K.C.C. "Grosvenor House", Victoria Park, accommodates 22 children between the ages of 3 and 15 years, and "Beaumont House", Beaumont Etreet, has accommodation for ten children of the same age.

National Assistance Act, 1948

No burials were arranged under Section 50 of the above Act during 1969.

Public Mortuary

The Council own an up-to-date mortuary comprising a postmortem room with refrigeration facilities for four bodies, and a panelled chapel and viewing room, which has independent access. Records are kept of all bodies admitted and of postmortem examinations. The Whitstable Urban District Council, being without a satisfactory mortuary, makes use of the mortuary at Herne Bay. This was agreed and has continued subject to financial arrangements on a population basis from 1st April, 1961.

During the year, 63 bodies were admitted from Herne Bay and 58 from whitstable. Upon all of these post-mortem examinations were held.

Schools

There is one independent Day School in the Urban District with accommodation for some 306 children.

In addition, there are two County Primary and Junior Schools, two C.E. and one County Secondary School. There are 2,479 children attending schools in Herne Bay. A valuable addition is the attachment of a day school for partially hearing children to one of the existing day schools.

Prevention of Tuberculosis: Care and After-Care

A scheme is operated jointly by the Kent County Council and the Kent Council of Social Service for the provision of care and after-care of patients suffering from tuberculosis. Through this scheme arrangements are made, where necessary, for assistance to be rendered in various ways, viz. the provision of shelters; extra meat and milk, the provision of beds, bedding and clothing.

Home visiting is carried out by the Tuberculosis Health Visitor for the area, who gives suitable advice to the patients.

Where there is need, help is given in housing problems, and assisting with removal expenses; the admission of patients to holiday homes is arranged; in the case of employment, endeavours are made to find suitable posts for patients who are fit for work and materials are provided for recreational therapy.

Outbreaks of Infectious Disease

Sonne Dysentery

There was a household outbreak of sonne dysentery in a foster home with fourteen children of varying ages. Information came to the Public Health Department late in the outbreak by which time three children were found to remain infected. Co-operation with the family doctor in attendance ensured clearance and exclusion from school until clear.

Food poisoning (possible)

An indeterminate outbreak of vomitting involving a charity holiday home in the early autumn was thought to be winter vomitting disease. Seven persons were involved out of 24 occupants. The residents were all elderly and the infection was introduced by a man of 87 years who arrived ill, this spread to others after an interval of 3 days. One member of staff was included in the outbreak. All stool specimens were negative bacteriologically but virus culture was not attempted as the outbreak died out after the one passage of infection.

Home Safety Act 1961

The Public Health and Housing Committee undertook the responsibility for supervising the exercise of home safety precautions under the above Act.

A part-time Home Safety Organiser has been appointed. He is also Mater Safety Organiser.

MASS X-RAY UNIT

The Mass X-ray Units visited Herne Bay in May. One new site was introduced, namely, the car park at the Plough, Broomfield, and the Council's car park at Mill Lane was used instead of the Cherry Orchard Playing Fields.

The decision to run down the Mass X-ray Service is not received very happily in a town with a population age grouped in the years of benefit from such a routine screening procedure.
