SECTION B

GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES FOR HERTFORD RURAL.

Laboratory Service.

Laboratory facilities are provided by the Public Health Laboratory Service at Cambridge.

In emergency, certain (Medical) specimens can be examined at the Laboratory of the Hertford County Hospital, Hertford, Herts.

County Council Health Services.

The following County Council Services under the National Health Service Act, 1946, are available in the District. Full details can be obtained from the County Medical Officer, County Hall, Hertford.

Home Nursing, Midwifery, Health Visiting and Welfare Centres.

Number of Nurses : 4. Welfare Centres : 7.
Mobile Clinics : 2.

Vaccinations, Diptheria and Whooping Cough Immunisations.

Medical Officers at the Welfare Centres will vaccinate or immunise babies at the request of the parents. Family Doctors will also provide this prophylaxis free of charge.

Home and Domestic Help.

Applications for this Service should be addressed to the Local Organiser at 27, Bull Plain, Hertford. (Telephone: Hertford 3232).

A charge may be made for this Service, in accordance with the County Council's assessment scale.

Care and After-Care.

Applications for recuperative holidays, if recommended by the Medical Attendant should be made to the County Medical Officer.

Equipment can be issued on loan to patients being nursed at home. A medical Loan Depot has been established at The Durrant Hall, Mill Bridge, Hertford.

A charge may be made for both the above Services.

Ambulance Service.

There is an Ambulance Station at Hertford (Telephone : Hertford 3013). Except in emergency, an ambulance should be ordered by a Medical Practitioner.

Day Nurseries.

There is no Day Nursery in the Hertford Rural District.

Mental Health.

Arrangements for mental treatment on the recommendation of a Medical Practitioner are made by the Duly Authorised Officer, Mr. W. T. MEDHURST, Collett Road, Ware, Herts. (Telephone : Ware 541).

Help in respect of Mentally Defective persons can be obtained by application to the County Medical Officer.

An Occupation Centre for defective children has been established in Hertford.

Hospital Services.

The Hertford Rural District is served chiefly by the Hertford County Hospital, Hertford and by the Lister Hospital, Hitchin, Herts.

These hospitals are managed by the Hertford Group Hospital Management Committee, within the North East Metropolitan Regional Hospital Board, and the Luton & Hitchin Group Hospital Management Committee, within the North West Metropolitan Regional Hospital Board.

General Practitioner Medical Services.

One General Practitioner resides and practises in the District, but the area is also served by Practitioners from adjoining localities.

Dental Service.

Dental Practitioners are available in adjoining towns.

Other Services.

There is a Club for Old People at Hertford Heath; there are also several Old People's Clubs in adjoining areas. Womens Institutes are active in 12 centres of the District.

SECTION C

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA -

REPORT OF THE SENIOR PUBLIC HEALTH INSPECTOR.

For the Year 1957.

Introduction.

During the year under review the development of the Councils activities has been directed, as before, towards the maintenance of a satisfactory standard of environmental hygiene. The continued expansion of the Councils utility services (i.e., mains water, main drainage and refuse collection) coupled with the decrease in the demand for the cesspool emptying service provide ample tangible evidence of this very welcome trend.

Water Supplies.

The Council supplies water to the whole District, except the Parish of Little Amwell and a portion of Waterford village, where the suppliers are the Metropolitan Water Board and the Borough of Hertford respectively.

The remainder of the District is served by two systems, which provide water from boreholes owned and operated by the Council.

The Northern Area (parishes of Aston, Benington, Walkern, Watton-at-Stone, Stapleford, Sacombe and Bengoe Rural) obtain water from two boreholes each 310ft. deep and sunk in chalk at Aston; the Southern area (parishes of Brickendon, Bayford, Little Berkhamsted and Hertingfordbury) is supplied from similar boreholes at Little Berkhamsted.

Increased pumping capacity and the operation of the water tower at Bulls Green have resulted during the year in few, if any, interruptions in supply.

In the Southern Area the Southern Parishes scheme for mains extension, new tower construction at Epping Green and increased pumping capacity was commenced during the year and when completed will provide a mains supply to a further 24 properties at present dependant upon wells and otherwise unsatisfactory sources.

Private estate supplies continued in operation and although the quality of the water provided is not always of such good bacterial quality as that derived from the Councils mains, with one of two exceptions the quality is sufficiently good to leave little cause for anxiety on Public Health grounds.

These figures show a significant decrease in the number of properties supplied by a standpipe only and the number of houses with piped internal supply has increased by 104.

Samples of the Councils main water analysed chemically have shown that although the water is hard it is pure and wholesome and regular samples taken for bacteriological examination have shown that the quality of the water from this aspect is very good indeed. Repeat samples were taken at once where analyses of public supplies did not reach the highest standards, and all proved entirely satisfactory. The quality of these samples is summarised in the table below.

Sewerage and Sewage Disposal.

The completion of the Datchworth sewerage scheme at the end of the previous year marked the commencement of a campaign to encourage the connection of all house drains to the new sewers where available. As a result the number of houses drained to cesspools decreased during the year by 70. The majority of these cesspools were in areas with a very high water table and the cesspool emptying service had only, with great difficulty, kept abreast of the demand. This reduction in demand is reflected firstly in the comparative ease with which one vehicle and crew now cope with the situation and secondly in the reduction in the total number of tanker loads removed.

With the advent of main drainage (with one or two minor exceptions) it is now possible to dispose of tanker contents into the main sewers and thus the practice of land disposal, previously giving rise to complaints, has now to all intents and purposes ceased.

The Council continue to pursue their policy of providing main drainage wherever possible and during the year work on the Bengoe Rural scheme commenced and by the end of the year was substantially complete. A disturbing feature however is the number of houses with a sewer available, the owners of which still rely on the previous disposal arrangements by septic tank or cesspool.

This matter continues to engage the Councils attention and some progress is being made in spite of the limited powers available.

Refuse Collection.

The fortnightly collection service continues although the scheme is being reviewed and it is hoped that a weekly collection will soon become possible. During the year experiments were made collecting refuse using a patent refuse lorry with a worm type compressor. The advantages of the machine were apparent and the purchase of a vehicle of this type was approved by the Council. The number of houses from which refuse is collected increased during the year, by 74. Owing to green belt restrictions on development the majority of these properties were additions to existing council estates and the additional dustbins were emptied without serious difficulty.

Summary of Development of the Councils Undertakings and Services Since 1950.

The table on the next page shows in detail the extent to which the demand for the Councils main services and other undertakings has increased. For example in March, 1952 there were 2,562 houses in the District whereas at the end of 1957 there were 2,930 houses. This showed an increase of 14.4% of 114.4% of Datum. The extent to which demand has increased can be judged from the figures given.

HOUSING ACTS.

Substandard Properties.

During the year the house to house survey of the District continued and the Council considered reports on the housing conditions in four more Parishes. It was decided to serve Notices of Time and Place in respect of 37 properties in accordance with the provisions of Section 11 Housing Act, 1936. No appeals were lodged against subsequent Demolition Orders made where the property owners did not submit reconditioning schemes. These Demolition Orders totalled 32 for the year under review and the following table gives more complete indication of the progress made towards the eradication of substandard properties:-

Public Health Act, 1936.

The public reaction to a Public Health nuisance is such that although a number of Public Health nuisances were investigated during the year they were abated without resource to statutory action.

Prevention of Damage by Pests Act, 1949.

As in previous years sewers were treated in accordance with the Ministry's recommendation to ensure destruction of rats but no major infestations were reported.

SECTION D.

FACTORIES ACTS, 1937 and 1948.
