PREFACE

Madam Chairman, Mrs. Tabor and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to submit the Annual Report on the health of Hertford Rural District for the year 1960.

This has been another very healthy year with little in the way of serious infections. The incidence of measles however, was a little higher than had been forecast in a year in which the number was expected to be low. 62 cases occurred out of a total of 84 infectious diseases notified. This leaves a fairly average and satisfactory overall figure for the other infections.

As can be expected in a healthy rural area we are a long lived community, most deaths occurring over the age of 70. Heart disease takes the highest toll accounting for 32% of the total, half of these being coronary thrombosis. This disease is usually more prevalent in males but in this area there have been more cases occurring in women. Cancer accounts for the majority of the remaining deaths or for 21% of the total.

The campaign against poliomyelitis has continued and there have been no cases in this area, indeed there were only three in Hertfordshire as a whole. The occurrence of some small outbreaks of diphtheria in other counties has reawakened parents to the need for prophylactic injections against this disease and considerable propoganda has been carried out to stimulate this. The need for this encouragement still persists.

I should like to thank your Council for all their willing assistance during the Year.

SECTION B.

GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES FOR HERTFORD RURAL.

Laboratory Service.

Laboratory facilities are provided by the Public Health Laboratory Service at Cambridge.

In emergency, certain (Medical) specimens can be examined at the Laboratory of the Hertford County Hospital, Hertford, Herts.

County Council Health Services.

The following County Council Services under the National Health Service Act, 1946 are available in the District. Full details can be obtained from the County Medical Officer, County Hall, Hertford.

Home Nursing, Midwifery, Health Visiting and Welfare Centres.

Number of Nurses: 4. Welfare Centres: 7.

Mobile Clinics: 2.

Vaccinations, Diphtheria, Whooping Cough, Tetanus, and Poliomyelitis
Immunisations.

Medical Officers at the Welfare Centres will vaccinate or immunise babies at the request of parents. Family Doctors will also provide this prophylaxis free of charge.

B.C.G. is also available to all children aged 13.

Home and Domestic Help.

Applications for this service should be addressed to the Local Organiser at 27, Bull Plane, Hertford. (Telephone: Hertford 3232).

A charge may be made for this service, in accordance with the County Council's assessment scale.

Care and After-Care.

Applications for recuperative holidays, if recommended by the Medical Attendant should be made to the County Medical Officer.

Equipment ban be issued on loan to patients being nursed at home. A Medical Loan Depot has been established at the Durrant Hall, Mill Bridge, Hertford but will shortly be at the Health centre at Bull Plain, Hertford.

A charge may be made for both the above services.

Chiropody Service.

A chiropody service is given by Mr. Parkin, at reduced costs for handycapped people, expectant mothers and old people, at The Wash and at 14, The Arcade, Hertford by appointment.

Ambulance Service.

There is an Ambulance Station at Hertford (Telephone: Hertford 2222). Except in emergency, an ambulance should be ordered by a Medical Practitioner.

Day Nurseries.

There is no Day Nursery in the Hertford Rural District.

Mental Health.

Arrangements for mental treatment on the recommendation of a Medical Practitioner are made by the Duly Authorised Officer, Mr. W. T. MEDHURST, Collett Road, Ware, Herts. (Telephone: Ware 541.)

Help in respect of Mentally Defective persons can be obtained by application to the County Medical Officer.

An Occupation Centre for defective children has been well established in Hertford.

Hospital Services.

The Hertford Rural District is served chiefly by the Hertford County Hospital, Hertford and by the Lister Hospital, Hitchin, Herts.

These hospitals are managed by the Hertford Group Hospital Management Committee, within the North East Metropolitan Regional Hospital Board, and the Luton & Hitchin Group Hospital Management Committee, within the North West Metropolitan Regional Hospital Board.

General Practitioner Medical Services.

One General Practitioner resides and practises in the District, but the area is also served by Practitioners from adjoining localities.

Dental Service.

Dental Practitioners are available in adjoining towns and school dental clinics.

Other Services.

There is a Club for Old People at Hertford Heath; there are also several Old People's Clubs in adjoining areas. Womens Institutes are active in 12 centres of the District.

SECTION C

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA REPORT OF THE SENIOR HEALTH INSPECTOR.

For the Year 1960.

Introduction.

The steady increase in the standard of living has continued to reflect on the general standard of environmental hygiene in the District, which, with one or two exceptions continues to be of a satisfactory standard.

Water Supplies.

During the year under review the Council's water undertaking was taken over by the Lee Valley Water Company and the Council's responsibility in this direction therefore ceased. Water samples are however regularly taken for Laboratory examination to ensure that the mains water supply continues to be of satisfactory bacteriological standard.

The Council have continued their policy of contributing towards the cost of providing a mains supply of water to isolated properties and during the year assistance was given towards the cost of affording a mains supply of water at a further three more properties.

Sewerage and Sewage Disposal.

Completion of the Watton-at-Stone Sewerage contract enabled the Council to embark on a scheme for closet conversions in this Parish. Work commenced on the provision of water closets to approximately 45 properties during the year under review; the scheme having been prepared by the Council's Staff on behalf of the property owner and work executed by private Contractor.

Cesspool Emptying.

The demand for the cesspool emptying service continues relatively unchanged and in pursuance of the Council's policy all cesspool contents are discharged into main sewers. The furtherance of this policy has increased considerably the length of haul to disposal point for cesspool contents but notwithstanding this the service has operated satisfactorily without undue pressure giving a reasonably prompt service.

The Council continue to persue their policy of providing main drainage wherever possible and during the year work on the Tewin scheme commenced. When this scheme is completed a very great many problems relating to cesspool clearance should be resolved although a disturbing feature of the Council's policy re the provision of main drainage is the number of houses with a sewer available the owners of which still rely on the previous disposal arrangements by septic tank or cesspool.

Refuse Collection.

The fortnightly collection continues although the Council decided during the year under review to increase the service to one collection every 10 days. Later in the year because of heavy financial commitments this decision was reversed and the fortnightly collection will continue.

The number of houses from which refuse was collected increased by 84 but owing to Green Belt restrictions on development, most of these properties were additions to Council Estates where collections were arranged without difficulty.

Food & Drugs Act.

At the end of the year the Milk Licences and Regulations became the responsibility of the County Council and the one licensed slaughter house ceased to operate and the license was not renewed.

Poultry Slaughter House and Cold Store.

During the year regular visits were paid to the one Poultry Slaughter House in the District and generally speaking conditions were found to be satisfactory.

HOUSING ACTS.

The enormous pressure to purchase houses by people resident outside the District has resulted in greatly increased prices being paid for available properties. This has been reflected in the amount of repair and improvement work carried out to substandard properties, very many of which had been sold with vacant possession and subsequently improved to a standard previously thought unlikely. At the same time Improvement Grants and Standard Grants totalling £9,320 were made by the Council to assist property owners in the restoration and improvement of old properties.

The number of houses involved was 41.
