To the Chairman and Members of the Rural District Council of Hexham :-

MR. CHAIRMAN, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to present the Annual Report for the year ending 31st December, 1951.

During the year 285 live births and 292 deaths, including 8 children under one year of age, have occurred in the area. These figures give a live birth rate of 13.86 per 1,000 of the estimated population, a general death rate of 14.20 per 1,000 of the estimated population and an infant mortality rate of 28.07 per 1,000 live births. Compared with last year these figures show a fall in the birth rate and a rise in the death rate, and for the first time since 1941 the death rate exceeds the birth rate. With regard to the infant mortality rate, this has dropped slightly compared with last year.

It is of interest to note that of the 292 deaths, 60% were of persons over 70 years of age and 70% were due to malignant neoplasms or diseases of the circulatory system. Of the 8 infant deaths, 3 were due to chest conditions and 4 were due to the hazards of birth.

During the year 334 cases of notifiable diseases were notified and outstanding among them were 220 cases of measles and I case of acute poliomyelitis. The places where most of the cases of measles occurred were Ovingham, Stocksfield, Barrasford, Corbridge and Gunnerton and the case of acute poliomyelitis occurred in Wylam. 14 new cases of tuberculosis were notifed during the year compared with 17 cases last year.

It will be noted that during the last three years no cases of diphtheria have occurred in the district. This is undoubtedly due to the success of immunisation of children against diphtheria, but it must never be forgotten that the absence of the disease does not mean its absolute elimination. Freedom from the disease is conditional upon the maintenance of an adequate level of immunisation. If parents leave their children unprotected there may be a return of diphtherial outbreaks, of the possibility of which there was a sharp reminder on Tyneside towards the end of the year.

With regard to sanitary circumstances, general improvements continued throughout the year.

The Ministry of Local Government and Planning approved in

principle the Council's proposals for the supply of water in the district and a summary of the position at the end of the year is contained in the report.

To maintain the water supply at Acomb during the summer months, water was again supplied by means of a 750 gallon tanker.

Water samples continued to be taken from the Council supplies and drip chlorinators were installed where necessary. Water samples were also taken from both existing and proposed private supplies.

During the year work continued on privy conversion schemes and the Council's scavenging service continued as for last year.

In concluding this report, may I record my thanks to the staff for their ready response to all public health matters with which the department has dealt and also may I express my thanks to the Chairman and Members of the Public Health Committee for the interest they have shown and for their unfailing support during the year.

PART II.—HEALTH SERVICES OF THE AREA.

(1) HOSPITALS.

There are in the district five hospitals under the management of the Hexham and District Hospital Management Committee. These comprise the Charlotte Straker Hospital and the Bridge End Maternity Hospitals at Corbridge, the Dilston Maternity Hospital, Barrasford Sanatorium and Wooley Sanatorium. These hospitals together with the Hexham General Hospital, the Hexham War Memorial Hospital and the Newcastle group of hospitals are available to cases from the area.

Cases of infectious disease requiring admission to hospital are referred to the City Hospital for Infectious Diseases, Newcastle upon Tyne.

(2) AMBULANCE SERVICE.

The British Red Cross acting as agents for the Northumberland County Council provide an ambulance service which serves the district. Ambulance Stations are situated at Corbridge and at Hexham.

(3) HOME HELP SERVICE.

The Northumberland County Council Home Help Service is in operation in the district. Home Helps are available to households where such help is required owing to illness or confinement, and their services are obtained through the office of the West Area Health Sub-Committee, Prospect House, Hexham.

(4) MATERNITY AND CHILD WELFARE CLINICS.

PART III.—SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

WATER SUPPLIES.

Acomb Parish.

The village of Acomb is supplied by the Council, the quality of the water being satisfactory. The quantity available is sufficient in winter, but totally insufficient in dry weather, and the installation of the new scheme (Hexhamshire—Acomb) is of the greatest urgency.

To augment the supply, main's water was carted to the reservoir over a period of fourteen weeks.

Oakwood lies partly in Acomb and partly in Sandhoe parishes. The water supply is privately owned and is inadequate. Oakwood is included in the area of the new scheme for Hexhamshire—Acomb.

The Council gave assistance in the distribution of water to areas which were short during the year.

Allendale Parish.

Allendale Town and Catton are supplied by the Council. The quality of the water is satisfactory and the quantity is sufficient.

The Old Town area is very badly served and the Ministry of Health held a private enquiry in 1949 into a scheme to boost mains water to a service reservoir. Approval of the scheme has now been received.

The Council also supply Ropehaugh area of Allenheads. The quantity is sufficient, and the quality satisfactory.

Broomhaugh Parish.

The village of Broomhaugh is supplied by the Council. The quality is satisfactory and the supply is generally sufficient.

Broomley Parish.

Stocksfield and New Ridley are adequately supplied by the New-castle and Gateshead Water Co.

Broomley village has a private supply owned by the Northumberland County Council, which is adequate.

Chollerton Parish.

Barrasford village has a private supply which is generally sufficient.

Colwell village is supplied by the Council. There is an ample supply at the springs, but the hydraulic ram could not pump a supply sufficient for all purposes, and an electric pump has been installed in addition.

Samples taken during the year showed intermittent pollution. A chlorinator has been installed.

Gunnerton village is supplied by the Council; more water is required.

Corbridge Parish.

Corbridge is supplied by the Council. There is difficulty in supplying the higher reaches.

Corbridge is included in the area of the new scheme Hexhamshire —Acomb.

The Middle spring at Holly Hall intermittently shows slight contamination and the water is being excluded in the meantime.

Hallington Parish.

The village of Hallington is served partly by a private piped supply, and partly by wells.

The piped supply is sufficient to serve all the houses in the village.

Haydon Parish.

Haydon Bridge is supplied by the Council. The quality is satisfactory and the quantity is sufficient for present needs.

Langley (Hill Top) is supplied by a well. There is no proper piped supply for these 8 houses.

Healey Parish.

Healey is served principally by wells.

Hedley Parish.

Hedley-on-the-Hill—The Council supply the village with water obtained from the Newcastle and Gateshead Water Co., by pumping to a reservoir south of the village. The supply is generally sufficient.

Hexham Low Quarter.

Part of the parish is supplied from the Council's supply at Slaley. There is insufficient water in the dry season.

The new Hexhamshire—Acomb scheme will give an ample supply to part of this Parish and part of the Hexham Middle and High Quarter Parishes.

Horsley Parish.

The Newcastle and Gateshead Water Co. supply the village and the houses and farms surrounding it.

Humshaugh Parish.

The village of Humshaugh is supplied by the Council. The quality of the water is not altogether satisfactory. The quantity is sufficient for present needs.

Newbrough Parish.

The Council supply the village of Newbrough. The quality is satisfactory.

Settlingstones Mines cottages have a private supply which is sufficient and satisfactory.

To allow Council houses to be erected in the village, an electric pump has been installed and additional water is pumped as necessary.

The Woodbine area is supplied by the Council, but the quantity is insufficient.

Newton Parish.

The village has a private supply, but the quantity is not sufficient for future needs.

Newton Hall Parish.

The quantity of water available from the private supply is insufficient for modern sanitation.

Ovingham Parish.

Is adequately supplied by the Newcastle and Gateshead Water Co.

Ovington Parish.

The village is adequately supplied by the Newcastle and Gateshead Water Co.

Riding Parish.

Riding Mill is supplied by Riding Mill Estate Co., and the supply is generally sufficient.

Sandhoe Parish.

The villages of Sandhoe and Anick have private supplies which are insufficient. They are both included in the new Hexhamshire-Acomb scheme.

Oakwood-See Acomb Parish.

Shotley High Quarter.

Blanchland is supplied by the Lord Crewe Trustees and the supply is generally sufficient.

Shotley Low Quarter.

The Snods has a private supply which is generally sufficient.

Simonburn Parish.

Simonburn village has a private supply which is insufficient.

Nunwick Town Head has a private supply which is adquaate.

Slaley Parish.

Slaley is supplied by the Council but the supply is insufficient in dry seasons. The area is included in the Hexhamshire-Acomb scheme.

Wall Parish.

Wall village is supplied by the Council. An additional supply

(formerly used by the military) was connected to the main. The quality is satisfactory and the quantity sufficient for present demands.

Warden Parish.

Hardhaugh has a private supply which is adequate.

Fourstones—The old village of Fourstones has a private supply which is adequate.

The remainder of the village is supplied by a private supply which is inadequate.

West Allen Parish.

Ninebanks and Carrshield villages are each partly supplied by private piped supplies.

Great Whittington Parish.

The village is supplied by the Council. The quality is not entirely satisfactory. The quantity is sufficient for present needs.

Four unsatisfactory samples were obtained during the year, and the water is being chlorinated.

Whittonstall Parish.

The village still depends on a well from which water is pumped by hand.

Water was carted by the Council during the drought.

Wylam Parish.

The area is adequately supplied by the Newcastle and Gateshead Water Co.

WATER SUPPLIES: FUTURE POSITION.

The Hexhamshire—Acomb and the Allendale (Old Town) schemes have already been approved in principle by the Minister of Housing and Local Government.

In June, 1951, the Council gave further consideration to the supply of water to other parts of the District and the proposals approved by the Council, together with the two schemes referred to above are as follows:—

Hexhamshire—Acomb Scheme.

To supply water from springs at King's Law and Moor Gair to Slaley, portions of Hexham Low and Middle Quarters and Corbridge, and to pump water from Holly Hall Springs to a reservoir at Sandhoe and supply by gravity, Sandhoe, Anick, Oakwood and Acomb.

2. Allendale (Old Town) Scheme.

To augment the supply at Allendale from springs at Loaningside Allotment and pump water from the mains at Catton to a reservoir at Catton Beacon to give a gravity supply to the Old Town area.

Proposals for Colwell, Barrasford, Chollerton, Humshaugh, Wall and Gunnerton.

To supply water from springs at Colwell to Barrasford, Chollerton, Humshaugh and Wall by gravity and to instal a booster pump at Barrasford to supply Gunnerton.

4. Proposal for Whittington.

To supply Whittington from the Newcastle and Gateshead Water Company's pipe line at Matfen.

Proposal for Whittonstall.

To pump a supply to Whittonstall and Newlands from the Durham County Water Board's mains at Ebchester.

6. Proposal for Whittle-Dene to Haydon Bridge.

To pump water from Newcastle and Gateshead Filter Station at Whittle Dene to a reservoir at Newton Hall, to give a gravity supply to Stelling, Newton Hall, Newton, Thornbrough, Corbridge, Sandhoe, Anick, Oakwood, Acomb, Warden, Fourstones, Newbrough, Allerwash, Brokenheugh and Haydon Bridge.

7. Proposal for Riding Mill and Broomhaugh.

To supply Riding Mill and Broomhaugh by an extension of the main from Farnley, Corbridge.

When the scheme from Whittle Dene (No. 6) is installed, the pump at Holly Hill in scheme No. I would not be required as it will then be possible to give a gravity feed from Newton Hall reservoir to the area supplied by that pump.

Scheme No. 7 would also be dependent on the installation of the Whittle Dene scheme and water from Hexhamshire would then be diverted to Riding Mill and Broomhaugh.

The proposals outlined above were submitted to the Minister of Housing and Local Government. In his reply, the Minister stated that each proposal would be considered on its merits when submitted for approval.

Regular gaugings are being taken of all springs required for the above schemes.

Simonburn.

Gaugings are being taken of springs at Sharpley with a view to supplying the village from this source should the yield be adequate.

Isolated samples from these supplies have fallen below the satisfactory standard but subsequent samples have indicated that the slight contamination did not persist.

Colwell.

Chlorination is being maintained. All samples taken after treatment have been satisfactory.

Humshaugh and Whittington.

Chlorinators have been installed on both these supplies and are being maintained until the springs are clear.

At Humshaugh after the first unsatisfactory result was obtained in January, a batch of three samples was taken from collecting chambers and further investigations made, the water meanwhile being chlorinated. A sample taken in February showed the pollution to have decreased and by the beginning of March it had disappeared entirely. Until October 18th the samples proved satisfactory and then the pollution showed again. The chlorination was resumed and further investigation proceeds.

Hazeldean.

A further sample submitted for a full examination indicated that the slight contamination was due to the spring not being protected.

SEWERAGE AND DRAINAGE.

Acomb Parish.

The village of Acomb is adequately sewered and the works consist of settling tanks and bacteria beds with rotary sprinklers.

Oakwood is sewered and the sewerage system also serves Anick (Sandhoe Parish). The works consist of a settling tank and bacteria bed.

Allendale Parish.

Allendale Town and Catton Village (except Wentworth Terrace) are sewered to a works near Catton. The works consist of settling tanks, bacteria beds with rotary sprinklers and land treatment.

The main sewer between Allendale Town and the works is inadequate.

Wentworth Terrace is sewered to a small settling tank and bacteria

Allenheads and Ropehaugh—There are no public sewers. A portion of Allenheads village is sewered to a septic tank. Many of the other drains deliver into the River East Allen. A scheme is required.

Broomhaugh and Riding Parishes.

There is an adequate system of sewers and a sewage works (settling tanks and bacteria beds). The whole of the sewage is pumped.

Broomley Parish.

Broomley village is sewered to a works consisting of settling tanks and bacteria beds.

Stocksfield and New Ridley are sewered to a works consisting of settling tanks and bacteria beds. This works requires extension.

Chollerton.

Barrasford village is sewered to a works (settling tanks and bacteria beds).

Colwell village—A small portion is sewered to a settling tank. A scheme is required.

Gunnerton village is sewered to a works consisting of settling tanks and bacteria beds.

Corbridge Parish.

Most of Corbridge is sewered. The drainage from the remainder of the houses either goes into the River Tyne or into cesspools.

There is a small works (tanks and bacteria beds) dealing with the sewage at Farnley, but the bulk of the sewage goes into the River Tyne untreated.

A scheme is required.

Hallington Parish.

The village of Hallington is provided with a sewer leading to a settling tank.

Haydon Parish.

Haydon Bridge is mostly sewered, but Brigwood Bungalows have soakaways on the river bank, and Chesterwood sewage goes into a ditch. The bulk of the sewage goes direct into the South Tyne.

A scheme has been approved by the Ministry of Health, the requisite land purchased, but permission to commence the work has not yet been received.

Langley Hill Head and Sawmill Cottages have no proper sewers or works.

Haughton Parish.

The drainage from Haughton Castle district goes to a works (settling tanks and filters) near the old papermill.

Hedley Parish.

The village is sewered to a works consisting of settling tanks and bacteria beds.

Hexham Low Quarter.

Juniper is sewered to a works (settling tank and bacteria bed).

Horsley Parish.

Horsley village is sewered. A works is provided but this requires renovation.

Humshaugh Parish.

Humshaugh village has an old system of sewers discharging into a stone conduit, thence to the North Tyne.

A scheme is required.

Newbrough Parish.

Newbrough village is sewered, but there is no treatment. Settlingstones is sewered to a septic tank which is now inadequate.

Newton Parish.

Sewers are provided in the village but they discharge into a stream.

Newton Hall Parish.

Sewers are provided in the village, but there is no treatment.

Ovingham Parish.

The village is sewered and there are two separate works.

Ovington Parish.

The village is sewered, but there is no treatment of the sewage which goes into an open runner leading to the River Tyne. A scheme is required.

Riding Parish.

See Broomhaugh Parish.

Sandhoe Parish.

Sandhoe Village-There are drains and a private sewer.

Anick village and Oakwood are sewered to a works consisting of settling tanks and bacteria bed.

Shotley High Quarter Parish.

Blanchland—There is no piped sewerage system, but the sewage, carried by piped drains and small enclosed conduits, causes no nuisance. There is a constant flow of water through the system.

Shotley Low Quarter Parish.

The Snods—There is no proper sewerage system.

Simonburn Parish.

Simonburn village has no proper sewerage system.

Slaley Parish.

The village is sewered to a works consisting of settling tanks and bacteria beds.

Wall Parish.

The village is sewered to a works consisting of settling tanks and bacteria beds.

Warden Parish.

Hardhaugh Cottages have a sewer which delivers into the South Tyne.

Fourstones village—The new houses and part of the old village are sewered to a septic tank. The rest of the village has no proper sewerage system. A scheme is required.

West Allen Parish.

Carrshield and Ninebanks villages-No proper sewerage systems exist.

Great Whittington Parish.

There are sewers leading to settling tanks.

Whittonstall Parish.

No proper sewerage system.

Wylam Parish.

North and South Wylam are principally served by piped sewers but the sewage is discharged untreated into the River Tyne.

Privy Conversions. During the year privy conversion schemes were prepared for Wall, Wylam, Allendale, Catton and Humshaugh. In the two former villages, the schemes have been completed and in the remainder, tenders have been accepted by the Council, but the work has not yet begun.

It is proposed to proceed with schemes for Haydon Bridge, Broomhaugh, Newbrough, Ovingham and Whittington in 1952.

DESTRUCTION OF RATS AND MICE.

Prevention of Damage by Pests Act, 1949.

During the year the inspection of the district by the Council's Pest Officer in accordance with the provisions of the Act has proceeded. Agricultural properties, domestic and business premises and the Council's refuse tips and sewage works have been inspected and serviced. In addition a 10% test baiting of sewers throughout the area has been effected. Where practicable, block control schemes have been carried out, several in conjunction with the Northumberland Agricultural Executive Committee.

Copies of the Prevention of Damage by Pests (Threshing and Dismantling of Ricks) Regulations, 1950, were circulated to all threshing contractors who operate in the district.
