

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE MEDICAL OFFICER OF HEALTH

for the year ended 31st December, 1967

To the Chairman and Members of the Rural District Council of Hexham.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present my Annual Report for the year ending 31st December, 1967.

The year saw no material changes in the circumstances of the District. The total population is virtually stationary, although redistribution is taking place from the smaller to the larger communities, and further private housing developments indicate that this trend will continue. The balance between town and country has largely been destroyed, and the outlook of the town is supplanting the rural outlook. The Council must therefore try to combine the services appropriate to a Rural District with those appropriate to large residential areas, and have so far achieved this successfully. The Future is however made uncertain by the possibility of major changes in Local Government and by lack of a definitive plan of development for the District.

This very large Rural District still has agriculture, with its ancillary trades, as the major industry, followed by the distributive trades. Tourists are being attracted in increasing numbers, and there are over 60 hotels and inns. The Council wish to avoid further rural depopulation and to offer a wider diversity of employment, and have made recommendations accordingly towards the County's Development Plan for growth and concentration. They consider that suitable light industry should be sited in Allendale, Wylam and Ovington, that the villages near Hexham might well share in industrial development there, and that the other villages require little in the way of expansion either of housing or industry. If such a long-term plan is accepted it will allow housing and other services to be provided where they are needed, whereas at present such things as the availability of land are the major considerations.

The estimated mid-year population is given as 20,470, a reduction of 20. The number of births also exactly balances the number of deaths, but while there were 17 fewer births there were 41 fewer deaths compared with 1966. The birth rate and death rate are both below the national average, and the infant mortality rate at 12.11 per 1,000 live births is considerably below the national figure of 18.3. The causes of death follow the pattern elsewhere in the country, and as in previous years vascular lesions of the nervous system and various forms of heart disease account for the majority of the deaths. Almost half the deaths occurred in people over 75, the highest age group classified. The vital statistics indicate a stable population, just maintaining its numbers, and with a favourable health record compared with the country generally.

The most frequent infectious disease notified during 1967 was measles, with almost 400 notifications, and two small outbreaks of dysentery among children attending two village schools, and affecting 15 children. One resident developed typhoid fever while on holiday abroad. As he, his wife and several members of his family, who were abroad with him, had hospital appointments in a number of places, the circle of contacts was very large, and entailed many investigations, but no further case developed. No new case of tuberculosis was notified during the year, and the disease caused no deaths. Its virtual disappearance is due in part to improved environment and the availability of specific drugs in treatment, but it is in the main an outstanding achievement in preventive medicine. The vigorous application of preventive measures might well now be directed to undulant fever, caused largely by the consumption of milk infected with Brucella abortus. Some progress is being made in that a voluntary eradication scheme has been promoted by the Ministry of Agriculture, but there is no control over the disposal of infected animals and no compensation is paid. Until the animal reservoirs of infection are eliminated the Health Department can assist by ensuring so far as possible that untreated milk is safe, and by tracing back a positive sample to its source. During the year all 56 dairy herds from which milk is sold untreated were investigated. One investigation was undertaken when a retail sample of milk was found to be infected. Two cases of Undulant fever were notified during the year — informally, as the disease is not statutorily notifiable — and investigation of the milk supply

of these patients brought other infected animals to light. In the last two circumstances discovery is too late, and early detection in the herd is of the first importance.

Only six houses were completed by the Council during 1967, but 82 at Acomb and Haydon Bridge were under construction. 80 private houses were completed during the year and a further 98 were under construction. The Council plan to build further houses at Acomb, Barrasford, Gunnerton and Newbrough and later at Allendale. These are not the villages where the housing need is most pressing, but where land has been or can be acquired and where there are facilities for sewage disposal. The greatest demand is for houses in and East of Corbridge, but building cannot take place until the mid-Tyne sewerage and sewage disposal scheme is constructed. The Council plan to build two special bungalows for paraplegic patients, one at Wylam and one at Allendale, the first construction of special housing of this type. Excellent use continues to be made of the scheme for improvement grants, and 1,300 houses have now been modernised with grant aid. The number of grants fell slightly during 1967, but the prospect of higher grants may have caused postponement and it is hoped that the numbers will increase under the more attractive system proposed. value of the scheme to the Rural District has been very great, enabling many houses of the right type and in the right place to be kept in use.

Almost the whole of the Rural District is served by the South-West Northumberland scheme, and mains water of satisfactory quality and quantity is supplied by the Newcastle and Gateshead Water Company. Regular sampling is carried out and any remedial measures necessary are taken by the Company, who keep the Council informed. In addition less frequent check samples are taken by the Health Department. The mains supply is not unduly plumbo-solvent but has a low natural fluoride content. The satisfactory chlorination of local sources presents difficulties, but these appear to have been overcome. The Council remain responsible for private and proposed supplies and advise on unsatisfactory samples.

No chemical analysis was carried out during the year.

Minor extensions to the South-West Northumberland Scheme continue to be put forward where the cost can be considered reasonable. The proposed extension to serve properties between Brunton Crossroads and St. Oswald's Hill was re-considered by the Ministry, and, a satisfactory case having been made out, has been allowed to proceed. An extension of the main supply from Acomb to Fallowfield has also been approved, being an urgent matter as the new caravan site at Fallowfield Dene is without an adequate water supply. An extension has also been agreed to the houses at Settlingstones now acquired by the Council. The attempt to provide a mains supply to Keenley at a reasonable cost continues, and with these and a few possible additions the area will be adequately supplied.

Westwards of Corbridge the sewage disposal facilities are adequate, although small works at Newton, Allenheads, Hardhaugh and Wall are under consideration. The Acomb, Oakwood and Anick Sewerage Scheme was completed during the year, to connect these villages to the new joint treatment works with Hexham Urban District, and the Blanchland scheme was almost completed. The proposed Mid-Tyne sewerage and sewage disposal scheme is being prepared by Consultants. It will be complex and costly, but is urgently necessary to serve the most densely populated part of the District and the inadequate facilities now provided are holding up housing development in many places. Phase I of the scheme, to provide treatment works at Broomley for Corbridge, Riding Mill and Stocksfield, received the approval of the Ministry towards the end of 1967 and the work is out to tender. The Ministry enquiry into Phase II was awaited at the end of the year, when the treatment of sewage from Ovington, Ovingham and Wylam, perhaps in conjunction with the town of Prudhoe, will be considered.

I have to thank the Councillors for their continued interest in the work of the Health Department and their support, and the Clerk and other Officers for their help and co-operation. The staff of the Department have worked well together and have carried out their duties satisfactorily.

HEALTH SERVICES OF THE AREA

(1) Hospitals

There are in the District three hospitals under the management of the Hexham and District Hospital Management Committee. These comprise the Charlotte Straker Hospital and the Bridge End Maternity Hospital at Corbridge, and Wooley Hospital. These hospitals together with the Hexham General Hospital, the Hexham War Memorial Hospital and the Newcastle group of hospitals are available to cases from the area.

Cases of infectious disease requiring admission to hospital are referred to the City Hospital for Infectious Diseases, Newcastle upon Tyne.

(2) Ambulance Service

The British Red Cross Society, acting as agents for the Northumberland County Council, provide an ambulance service which serves the District. Ambulance Stations are situated at Corbridge and at Hexham. Patients requiring transport, but not an ambulance are brought in by car. In an extensive area with poor communications this is a very valuable service. Some of the cars are provided by the British Red Cross Society, others by agents in the various villages.

(3) Home Help Service

The Northumberland County Council Home Help Service is in operation in the District. Home Helps are available to households where such help is required owing to illness or confinement, and their services are obtained through the office of the West Area Health Sub-Committee, Priory Buildings, Hexham.

HOUSING

Council House Building

Only 6 Council Houses were completed during the year. These were Old Person's bungalows, part of an estate of 47 houses being constructed at Acomb. It is anticipated, however, that considerable progress will be made next year in spite of restrictions in the Eastern part of the District, resulting from the present lack of adequate seweage disposal facilities.

A scheme for the erection of 41 houses at Haydon Bridge is in progress and tenders have been accepted for the construction of 3 Old Persons' bungalows at Wall. The Council has approved plans for the erection of further houses at Acomb, Barrasford, Gunnerton and Newbrough. Approval has also been given for the provision of 2 individual houses, one at Wylam and one at Allendale, for disabled persons and one house at Corbridge is being extended to provide a ground-floor bedroom and toilet facilities for the same prupose.

Plans for building which are being held up by Mid-Tyne Sewerage scheme are at Corbridge, Ovington, Ovingham and Stocksfield.

Negotiations are at present taking place for the acquisition of land at Allendale.

The completion of the above programme will provide the Council with approximately a further 300 houses.

Arising from the anticipated closure of Settlingstones Mines the Council agreed to purchase 16 houses at present leased to the Mines and owned by the Duke of Northumberland.

The total number of houses owned by the Council is now 968 of which 115 are Old Persons' bungalows.

Garages

The Council has now 74 lock-up garages situated on various estates. There are also two pieces of land providing sites for 19 garages erected by tenants.

Council House Applications

At the end of the year, there were 433 applications for general purpose houses, approximately half of which were classified as in need of re-housing. Applications for Old Persons' accommodation numbered 268. Approximately one-third of these applications are from persons wishing to be housed in Corbridge.

23 families were housed during the year, 6 in new houses and 17 as a result of casual vacancies. By exchange of tenancies a further 4 families were moved to houses more suitable for their needs.

Council House Maintenance

Tenders were let for the external painting of 187 houses. Contracts for 72 houses were for one reason or another not carried out and have been carried forward to 1968.

Major improvements were carried out to 8 houses at Leazes Terrace, Corbridge, built in 1922. The work consisted mainly of the modernisation and enlargement of kitchens, renewal of all windows, extensive re-plastering and renewal of the electrical system. Plans for similar improvements to 26 pre-war houses at Orchard Avenue, Acomb, are proceeding.

2616 visits were made in connection with allocation of tenants and general management of Council Houses.

Improvement Grants

66 grants were approved during the year comprising 45 Discretionary grants and 21 Standard grants. This is 8 fewer than the previous year.

Unfit Houses

Action was taken under Section 16, Housing Act 1957 in respect of 5 houses which were considered to be unfit for habitation. One Demolition Order and 2 Closing Orders were made by the Council. I Undertaking was accepted and action is pending in respect of 1 house as the estate is in the hands of the Treasury Solicitor.

Rent Act, 1957

No applications were received for certificates of disrepair.

Privy Conversions

7 grants towards the cost of converting privies to water closets were made during the year.

SUPERVISION OF FOOD

Slaughterhouses Act, 1958

Since last year 3 slaughterhouses have closed down. There are now 6 licensed slaughterhouses in the District, 5 of which are in regular use. Of the 3 closures, one butcher closed down owing to ill-health, the other 2 butchers were not prepared to keep their slaughterhouses at the required standard as laid down in the Slaughterhouses (Prevention of Cruelty) Regulations and the Slaughterhouses (Hygiene) Regulations and allowed their current licences to lapse.

Food & Drugs Act, 1955 Meat Inspection Regulations, 1963

2072 animals were slaughtered during the year. Inspection was carried out in all cases and the carcases were stamped in accordance with the above regulations.

The figures in the accompanying tables give details of the meat condemned. No tuberculosis was found in the 476 bovine carcases and offals inspected. One pig head was condemned for tuberculosis.

The most common cause of condemnation was cirrhosis of the liver.

Assistance is given to Haltwhistle Rural District Council by carrying out meat inspection on occasions when their Public Health Inspector is on holiday.

All condemned meat, before being disposed of, is stained in accordance with the Ministry's recommendations, small quantities are taken by the Council's refuse collectors and buried in tips, larger amounts are accepted at the Hexham Abattoir and disposed of with the condemned meat from Hexham.

The Slaughter of Poultry Act, 1967

Although this Act has been passed it will not come into force until a date appointed by the Ministry.

The act provides that all turkeys and domestic poultry intended for sale for human consumption shall be slaughtered instantaneously or rendered insensible until death supervenes. The premises must be registered with the Local Authority.

Food Hygiene (General) Regulations 1960

221 visits were made to food premises during the year. The standard of cleanliness of both premises and personel continues to be satisfactory.

No prosecutions were taken under the above regulations during the year.

Milk

Milk Sampling: Brucellosis

As part of the Ministry's campaign for the eradication of Brucellosis in milk herds, Ministry of Health Circular 17/66 recommends that Local Authorities should take monthly samples from all herds producing milk which is not to be heat treated.

In the past routine samples were taken from time to time by the County Public Health Officer and where an infected herd was found, the matter was passed on to this Authority and the investigation and individual sampling from each cow as carried out by this department.

As a result of this directive the County Public Health Officer could no longer continue to undertake milk sampling in the County and District Councils were requested to take over this work.

There are 56 herds in this District producing milk which is not to be heat treated, which is 40% of the total number of herds in Northumberland, and the County Council have appreciated the difficulties of this Council and agreed with a suggestion that sampling be carried out quarterly.

During the year two cases of Undulant fever were informally notified to this department, both occurring on farms where the milk was being sent for pasteurisation. As a precautionary measure advice was given regarding the consumption of untreated milk from the herd.

Bulk Sampling

Routine sampling was started in March and all farms were sampled on more than one occasion during the year, 236 samples being taken.

As a precaution against the spread of Foot and Mouth disease sampling was suspended in the latter part of the year.

The results of the sampling are very encouraging and if they continue to give satisfactory results it may well be that more dairy farmers may wish to take part in the Ministry's Brucellosis (Accredited Herds) Scheme (eventually reducing the volume of routine work in milk sampling).

The Food (Control of Irradiation) Regulations, 1967

These regulations prohibit the application of ionising radiation of food intended for sale for human consumption. An exception is made in respect of low level radiation.

The regulations also prohibit the sale or importation of food which has been subjected to ionising radiation other than that permitted by regulation 4.

Civic Amenities Act, 1967

Part III of this Act deals with the disposal of abandoned vehicles and other refuse.

Its requirements generally place a duty on the Local Authority to remove and dispose of abandoned vehicles and it also requires the Local Authority to provide, free of charge, places for the disposal of refuse by residents living within the District.

REFUSE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL

Refuse collection by direct labour is carried out by one 18 cubic yard 'Karrier' rear loader, two 14 cubic yard Shelvoke and Drewry rear loaders and two 10 cubic yard Bedford side loaders. A further 'Karrier' is on order to replace one of the smaller side-loaders. Both of these larger vehicles are fitted with compression plates which increase their capacity to 23 cubic yards. Collection is carried out by contract in the Allendale, Allenheads and West Allen areas.

The only extensions to the collection area made during the year apart from new houses were at Sparty Lea where 12 houses were included and the collection from Allenheads, Carrshield and St. Peter's schools which was taken over from a private contractor.

Reaverhill tip, Barrasford has been closed. The tip was full and surplus soil from the Acomb Housing site was used to cover the site. There are now 12 tips in regular use.

PREVENTION OF DAMAGE BY PESTS ACT, 1949

All tips and sewage disposal works are regularly treated and are relatively free from rodent infestation. A total of 254 inspections were carried out at the Council's refuse tips and sewage disposal works.

Sewers have been test baited and found free from infestation.

At the latter end of the year rodent control work was suspended where access to the tips and agricultural premises was over farm land, due to stringent precautions adopted against the spread of Foot and Mouth disease.

Owing to illness, the rodent operator was absent for some 12 weeks and the routine work was suspended. However, where treatments were necessary they were carried out by other members of the department.

Three new applications and four applications for renewal of licence to keep a boarding establishment were received. The premises were all satisfactory and licences were issued.

Pet Animals Act, 1951

The owner of the only pet shop in the District, which was licenced the previous year, did not renew his licence.

Common Lodging Houses

There are no Common Lodging Houses in the District.

MOVEABLE DWELLINGS

Caravan Sites and Control of Development Act, 1960

Other than individual sites there are 6 sites providing accommodation for between 15 and 40 caravans.

The Orchard, Corbridge (40 caravans)
The Hermitage, Ovingham (15 caravans)
Lilswood, Hexhamshire (15 caravans)
Allendale Station (40 caravans)
East Lands End, Haydon Bridge (23 caravans)

Town Foot, Slaley (Caravan Club site - Unlicenced).

A new application for a site licence for 6 caravans was

applied for, this was not licenced during the year as the work required was not carried out.

Advice has been given to the applicant so as the provisions of the above act can be satisfactorily complied with.

Planning permission has been given for the use of Barrasford Park as a site to accommodate approximately 150 caravans. The developer has not yet applied for a site licence.

Work has commenced on the development of part of Fallowfield Dene as a caravan site. When fully developed, it will provide accommodation for approximately 90 caravans, but as it will be under the control of the Caravan Club, no site licence will be required.
