

To the Chairman and Members of the Hexham Urban District Council:—

### LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

I have pleasure in presenting the Annual Report for the year ending 31st December, 1947. In so doing, I beg to remind you that the work of which the report gives an account was carried out during the term of office of the late Dr. C. McCulloch and after his death by Drs. J. Hurley and R. Scott. I can claim neither personal knowledge nor any credit for it.

The birth rate is 18.5 per 1,000 of the estimated population. While the rate is below the average of 20.5 for England and Wales it has reached the highest figure since 1926.

The death rate is 14.3 per 1,000 of the estimated population. This figure has again increased and is also higher than the average of 12.0 for England and Wales.

During the year there were 10 deaths of infants under one year of age, 7 of which were neonatal death. The infant mortality rate is thus 54.9 per 1,000 live births and compares with 41.0 per 1,000 live births for England and Wales.

Infectious diseases notified show a decrease over last year, viz., 90 cases against 135. Outstanding among them were 26 cases of acute poliomyelitis and 1 case of acute polioencephalitis with 3 deaths.

There were 6 cases of tuberculosis notified during the year, a decrease of 1 from 1946.

The water supply for the area was direct from springs except for the late summer and autumn months when water was supplied from the storage reservoir after sand filtration and chlorination. Regular samples taken for chemical and bacteriological examination throughout the year show that the water is of excellent quality in both respects.

Sewage disposal continued as in previous years.
