

ANNUAL REPORT For the year 1956

To the Chairman and Members of the Hinckley Urban District Council.

Ladies and Gentlemen,

I present herewith the Annual Report on the Sanitary State of Hinckley for the year 1956.

The General Health of the Community

This continues good and I find no evidence of any diminution in the nutritional level.

Notifiable Diseases

The incidence of these remained at a normal low level, except for Dysentery and Food Poisoning.

The note in last year's Report that Dysentery was on the increase has been fully borne out by the figure of 213 confirmed cases against 79 in 1955. There was also a rise in the number of notified cases of Food Poisoning, 41 against 19 in 1955 and 1 in 1954. It is somewhat ironical to have to note this in the face of our Food Hygiene Campaign and the Food Hygiene Regulations which came into force during the year.

In passing, I should mention that the investigation of cases of dysentery and food poisoning has thrown a very heavy burden on our staff of Public Health Inspectors - and I must pay some tribute to the uncomplaining way in which they carried out this work - which must have precedence to the detriment, I fear, of some of their other duties.

Tuberculosis

The general position continues to improve.

Diphtheria Immunisation

The need to have children protected is as great as ever and will remain so until the disease has been entirely stamped out in the world.

Poliomyelitis Vaccination

Immunisation against poliomyelitis has started, but is as yet available for children in selected groups only owing to shortage of supplies of vaccine.

The above mentioned figures are not reaching the required standard of 75% of the babies being immunised before their first birthday. Of the 593 children born during 1956, 42 were immunised, of the 569 children born in 1955, 243 were immunised during 1956. This equals a percentage of 24.5 which bearing in mind the movement of children to and from the district is sufficient to indicate that parents are not having their children protected to anything like the degree they should.

The young parents of today are not familiar with the toll that Diphtheria used to exact from its victims and I would urge them to utilise to the full the protection to be gained from immunisation.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting my twenty-ninth Annual Report upon the administration of your Public Health Inspectors' Department.

New legislation came into being which will increase to a considerable degree the responsibilities of the department. We had the Clean Air Act, the Food Hygiene Regulations, the Slum Clearance Compensation Act, the Housing Subsidies Act and the Agriculture (Safety, Health and Welfare Provisions) Act, 1956.

This "onslaught" coincides with a time when the technical staff of the department is the same with the exception of one pupil as it was in 1937 when our population was 7,000 less than it is now.

With the support of the Council, the department will do its best to administer the existing and new legislation but it is obvious that all the duties cannot be performed.

The 86 houses which it was decided should be dealt with as the year's programme for slum clearance were inspected and details prepared for the end of the year.

The Housing Surveys of 1944 and 1952, when the sub-standard houses in the town were classified according to the extent of their deficiences from the Housing Act standard, have proved most valuable in dealing with the considerable number of enquiries made by "official search" through the Clerk's Department or by informal application.

For the first nine months, constant work was being done to gain compliance with the Food Hygiene Regulations.

One hundred per cent Meat and Food inspection was again maintained throughout the year.

Despite all difficulties, progress has been made. This would not have been possible without the co-operation and understanding of the Members and Officers of the Council, of Dr. W. D. Cruickshank, the Medical Officer of Health and the members of the Health Department staff, to whom I am most grateful.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA

1. WATER SUPPLY

The quality of the public supply has been satisfactory.

The quantity of water available is insufficient. Owing to the shortage and other abnormal items relating to distribution the supply failed for very short periods on a few occasions in certain parts of the district.

A Booster Pumping Station at Stoke Golding was brought into use to obviate these periods of shortage by accelerating the bulk supply from the Desford main.

The affected persons were acutely ill for the first few days, then recovered from symptoms but in most cases the causative organisms persisted for some weeks.

In 11 of the Salmonella Heidelberg cases, it was suspected that pressed beef prepared by a large firm distributing their products nationally may have been the causative food. Unfortunately, in no case was it possible for remnants of the suspected food to be obtained from the households. Two samples of pressed beef produced by the firm were obtained from shops and submitted for laboratory examination, but these gave negative results.

The 5 Salmonella Stanley cases occurred in two households. In these cases pressed meat was suspected which was prepared in a neighbouring authority. Close liaison was maintained with the Public Health Laboratory who investigated the outbreak so far as the food handlers at the processing firm's premises were concerned.

There were 14 unnotified cases, 12 of Salmonella Heidelberg and 2 of Salmonella Typhi-murium. These were investigated in conjunction with the notified cases previously referred to.

During the year 81 investigations were made regarding food poisoning and 381 regarding dysentery. 3,303 follow-up visits were made after these investigations.
